Foreign Corporations.—Foreign corporations may be sued in any county in the state in which service may be had if they do business in the state, according to Circuit Judge McGinn. The decision was made this morning in denying a motion to quash summons in the case of Krishna Ramaswamy against the Hammond Lumber company for personal damages. The company maintains its main offices and plant in Clatsop county. Service was secured on the local branch office head, Judge McGinn declared that if it remained for the defense to elect in what county a suit would be tried a judge might be found partial to a company and all suits would then be brought before that judge.

Ladies' Auxiliary to Meet.—The Ladies' Auxiliary of the North Portland Commercial club is to have a meeting in the North Portland branch library Thursday which the members are especially urged to attend. One of the prominent subjects for discussion will be the North Portland out of doors rose show which it is proposed to hold in the garden of Peninsula park. Fourteen thousand rose bushes have been planted in the garden. There will be a number of other matters for consideration.

Birthday Present for Oldest Cop.—Benjamin Branch, day jailer at the police station, was called before the day relief this morning as it was assembled for roll call, and Captains Keller and Moore reprimanded the jailer for neglect of duty. The jailer recently passed his seventieth birthday. After the reprimand, the two captains presented Branch with a large Morris chair, as the compliments of the 232 patrolmen. He is the oldest man in point of service on the force.

Plans Boys' Summer Camp.—Rabbi Wise has a plan which he will present before the Boys' Club Seminary at the Portland hotel tonight, to establish almost within the city limits of Portland a large summer camp for boys. The camp as Rabbi Wise has planned it will give the boys all the advantages of outdoor life. He will not divulge any information concerning it until the meeting tonight. L. H. Weil will preside, and it is probable an organization will be perfected.

Worked Girl Too Many Hours.—Working a girl employee in his restaurant more than 60 hours a week as allowed by the state law, cost John Andanopolis, proprietor of the Palace restaurant, Twelfth and Washington, \$25 yesterday afternoon, when he was fined by Justice Jones. According to the evidence submitted the girl had been made to work 63 hours during a week. The charge was brought at the instigation of State Labor Commissioner Hoff.

Illinois Society Meeting.—Election of officers of the Illinois society for the ensuing year will be held at 8:30 o'clock this evening in the Masonic temple, West Park and Yamhill streets. Other matters of importance to the society will also be proposed. The executive committee has made plans for the permanent headquarters which will greatly assist in perpetuating the society and its standing among like state societies in the city.

Runaway Victims Will Recover.—Although seriously injured, John Kiermeyer and Mrs. Mary Fleming, will not die as the result of being thrown from a vehicle yesterday afternoon on Front street, where their horse became frightened. Mrs. Fleming has a compound fracture of the arm, while Kiermeyer has a broken arm and leg. Both are in the St. Vincent hospital. They live on the Slavia road at the edge of the city.

Woman Arrested for Speeding.—Mrs. E. D. Connell, 50 Mt. Adams drive, was arrested yesterday afternoon by Motorcycle Patrolmen Coulter and Bewley for speeding 40 miles an hour on Sandy boulevard. Mrs. Connell had a new chauffeur out for a trial, when caught by the officers. The case will be heard Thursday morning in the municipal court. Max Cohen appeared for her this morning, and had the case set over until that date.

Kamm, William R. Mackenzie and W. W. Cotton, executors of the estate of the late Jacob Kamm, filed yesterday, shows that \$116,916.42 in cash was received by them between December 13 and March 21. They paid out from these receipts \$28,230.05, largely for taxes, insurance and running expenses of the estate.

Funeral of Mrs. J. W. Dickey.—The funeral of Mrs. J. W. Dickey, an Oregon pioneer, who died Sunday at her home, 1294 Mixter street, was held yesterday at La Grande. Mrs. Baker, who before her marriage was Malissia A. Baker, was born March 12, 1834, in Illinois. She moved with her parents to Iowa when a child. In 1857 she was married to J. W. Dickey, and the couple, with other settlers, came to Oregon with an ox team in 1862, arriving here after three months. They settled in the Grande Ronde valley. In 1865, they moved to Albany, but after a year there they returned to La Grande. There they lived for 49 years. The couple traveled through the west for several years after leaving La Grande, and made their home in Portland last August. The death of Mrs. Dickey occurred just one week after the fifty-fifth anniversary of her marriage. Three children, two grand children and the husband survive her. Mrs. Dickey was a sincere and devoted church worker all her life, having joined with the Baptist church while a child. She had scores of friends throughout the entire state, especially among the pioneers.

HE MADE A PARADISE WHILE OTHERS DREAMED

Horace Walker of Stanfield, Or., arrived in Portland Monday with a shipment of cattle, which he disposed of at a fancy price. Mr. Walker was formerly a member of the Umatilla county court, serving continuously as commissioner for 12 years and 6 months. He stood for permanent improvements, and many substantial steel bridges throughout the county attest his work in that particular. He is an advocate of county bonding for good roads.

Mr. Walker considers the "Furnish ditch" as among the greatest monuments in eastern Oregon to individual enterprise. It was conceived and built by William J. Furnish, who redeemed 10,000 acres from the sagebrush and created an agricultural empire which now seethes with activity.

"While others were dreaming, he made a paradise out of the desert," said Mr. Walker, "and hundreds of peaceful homes attest his foresight and energy. He made his dollars count."

According to Mr. Walker, settlers under the Furnish project are adopting eastern methods in dairying, and are shipping in many Holstein cattle.

IN EARLIER DAYS

During the past score or more of years, hundreds of thousands of travelers have passed through Barlow, not far from Oregon City, and noticed the avenue of beautiful and stately walnut trees which leads from the roadway to the doors of the commodious, old-fashioned house. The history of those walnut trees and of the man who planted them is quite interesting.

In the spring of 1845 a large number of prospective emigrants to Oregon—divisions or trains of these emigrants were formed. One, which left St. Joseph, Mo., was under the command of W. G. T. Vault, Oregon's first postmaster general. One, consisting of 25 wagons, was under command of Presley Welch, who chose Joel Palmer and Samuel K. Barlow as his aides.

Near Fort Boise, one of the trains from Independence was persuaded by a man named White to try a new road to the Willamette valley. For several weeks those who followed him wandered through the arid and barren country of what is now Malheur county, finally reaching the headwaters of the Deschutes. It was this party that found what was afterward called the Blue Bucket diggings which have never since been relocated.

The train under the charge of Welch had been divided, Barlow having charge of one part and Barlow of another. At the Dalles there were a large number of emigrants awaiting transportation. Barlow, fearing that they would not get through that year, went 25 miles to the westward, seeking for a pass over the mountains. Palmer, with a train of 22 wagons, decided to leave the Dalles, not trusting to river transportation but joining Barlow in his effort to find an overland route.

On October 3, 1845, Palmer's party joined that of Barlow, and the next week or 10 days the whole party were engaged in the heart-breaking task of clearing a trail for the wagons over the

Cascade range, which was covered thickly with a heavy growth of timber. The alder and hazel thickets were chopped down or burned out, and the wagons continued to make slow progress toward the summit of the Cascades. Grass becoming scarce, many of the oxen were sent back to the Dalles to be wintered. The rainy season having set in, the wagons and baggage were left in charge of one of the party and the women and children were put on horses and started for the Willamette valley.

Residents of Oregon City who had been told of the attempt of Barlow and Palmer to cross the Cascades by a new road sent out a train of pack horses loaded with flour and other provisions, and met them.

Part of the Barlow and Palmer party went through to Oregon City, while some of the others returned with provisions for those who had been left behind.

On the 30th of October Palmer arrived at the ranch of Samuel McSwain. This ranch was later recognized by all emigrants as the Barlow trail as the ranch of Philip Foster, who purchased it from McSwain. The next day's travel took the party to the home of Peter H. Hatch, who had come from the Sandwich Islands, and who lived at that time in the Clackamas valley. It was nearly two months before the entire party succeeded in straggling through and reaching Oregon City.

At the meeting of the territorial legislature in December, 1845, Governor Abernathy, among other things, recommended the construction of a new road into the Willamette valley. Three different men asked the territorial legislature for a charter to build a road—Thomas McKay, Stephen Meek and Samuel K. Barlow. Mr. Barlow was invited to discuss his plans for a road over the Cascades with the territorial legislature. He told the members of the legislature that his own wagons and baggage, as well as that of most of his party, were still in the mountains where they had been left the fall before at what was called Fort Deposit. He requested permission to build a toll road from Fort Deposit to the Willamette valley. This permission was given him.

and the construction of the Barlow road was begun shortly.
 "In July, the first wagons were brought over the new road and thereafter a large part of the immigration came into Oregon by way of the Barlow trail."
 Mr. Barlow, who was born in Kentucky and had lived in the middle west, missed the spreading black walnut trees that he had known in his boyhood, and so in 1852 he imported from Illinois a bushel of black walnuts, which he planted in a double row from his house to the road. To these walnuts, planted more than 60 years ago, many of the walnut trees of the Willamette valley owe their origin. Mr. Barlow narrowly missed being one of the proprietors of the town of Portland. Mr. Lowndale wanted him to put up \$2500 and secure a half interest in the town of Portland. Mr. Barlow, however, did not think there was room for another town so close to Oregon City, so he invested his money elsewhere.

Stovall claims that he lost his head at what he thought an unjust ruling and has no defense for his conduct.
