

### OREGON STATE TRACK MEET NEXT SATURDAY GETS FIFTY SCHOOLS

Attendance of Athletes Will Be Record Breaker With 140 Stars Already Enrolled.

(Special to The Journal.) University of Oregon, Eugene, Or., May 7.—Though four days before the meet, and with the entries not all in, a fourth more high school athletes from all portions of Oregon are entered in the fourth annual intercollegiate track meet, which is held in Eugene next Saturday. The attendance will be a record breaker. Seventeen schools which entered no teams last year have sent in their entries; 50 high schools will send teams where but 31 entered last year. Walker came east last fall with the hope of breaking into the big show. Reno sports as a result of their fast round bout here last night. Moore had the better of the earlier rounds but it was nip and tuck throughout the latter periods.



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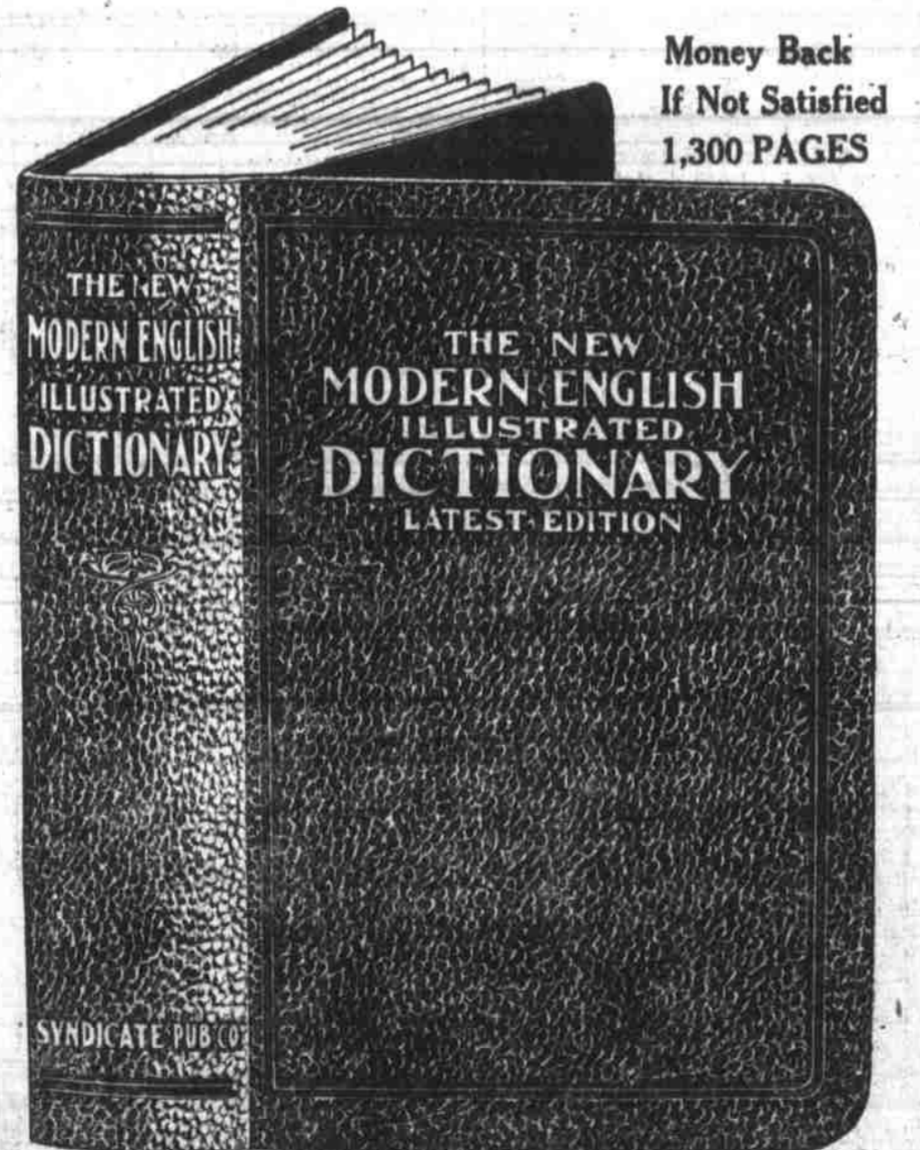
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
