

SEMI-PRETTY GIRL TELLS HOW NEGRO MISTREATED HER

Belle Schreiber Gives Testimony Against Jack Johnson; Ball Players Shake Hands With Defendant, Hear Case.

(United Press Leased Wire.)—Chicago, May 8.—Small, pretty and neatly clad, Belle Schreiber took the stand here today and told the court trying Jack Johnson for violation of the Mann white slave act the full story of her relations with the big negro prize fighter.

In an almost childish voice the girl, through the folds of a heavy veil, detailed how she met Johnson, their subsequent relations and of the trips they made from state to state.

Before the Schreiber girl was called several other government witnesses against the negro testified. Estelle Palmer, alias Henderson, said Belle Schreiber was an inmate of a Pittsburgh resort where she was known as Jacques Allen.

Charles Sampson testified that Johnson and the Schreiber girl came to his store in October, 1910, and that the negro bought \$196 worth of furniture for the girl.

Other witnesses described the character of the row of flats where the Schreiber girl lived in Chicago. Several Washington ball players were admitted to the court today although spectators generally were excluded.

They heard part of the testimony. In the corridor outside the court Johnson shook hands with several of the ball players.

Before the court met today Johnson drove in his automobile to the Union depot to meet several witnesses from the east. A crowd of men gathered about his machine but there was no attempt at a demonstration.

DR. OLMSTED DIES IN NORTH YAKIMA

Word was received here today of the death of Dr. James B. Olmsted of Portland, supreme medical director of the United Artisans, in North Yakima, Wash., at 2 o'clock this morning. He had been ill in the hospital at that place for three weeks, but was considered so nearly recovered that he was to have taken the train for his country ranch at Afton, near Dallas, in a day or two.

Dr. Olmsted was on a tour of inspection with his duties as supreme medical inspector of the United Artisans while on the train between Ellensburg and North Yakima three weeks ago. Yesterday he suffered a second stroke.

He was about 60 years old, and was very well known throughout the northwest. He had been connected with the United Artisans almost since the founding of that fraternal order.

Mrs. Olmsted was with him when he died. The body will be brought to Portland for burial.

MOTHER IS SEEKING FOR FLOYD FARRELL

To ease an anxious mother's heart, will any person who has seen, or may happen to see Floyd Farrell, 15 years old, who ran away from home two weeks ago, communicate with her and tell her where he is?

If he is happier away from home than in it, she will not try to force him to return. She told a Journal reporter last night that she is sure, for the first time, that he is safe, for the fear that he may be ill and unhappy, and in need of her, is more than she can bear. He was not a strong boy, she said.

The boy had words with his stepfather the night before and on Saturday morning, April 26, his stepfather sent him down town as he did not return. His mother has not even had a postcard from him since. She can not sleep nights any longer.

The mother's name is Mrs. George E. Link, and her address is Second and Kelly streets, Arden Park, Lewis, Or. Her son, she says, has light hair, blue eyes, is about 5 feet 6 inches tall, weighs about 120 pounds, and when he left home wore a dark navy blue coat, overalls, a black cap and black satin shirt.

LARGE ATTENDANCE AT "TWELVE O'CLOCK CLUB"

C. D. Mahaffie presided. Ira W. Carl was appointed as chairman for tomorrow. It was announced that reports would be made on A. G. Rishlight, candidate for mayor, and George L. Baker, candidate for commissioner. The club is to have meetings to which all are welcome from 12 to 12:30 o'clock each day until the election.

TEAL WILL DISCUSS CONSERVATION ISSUES

Joseph N. Teal, chairman of the state conservation commission, will discuss the problems of conservation before the Oregon Society of Engineers' regular monthly meeting of the organization held at 247 1/2 Stark street, at 8 o'clock this evening. BARTON ACCUSED BY GIRL ON STAND

Coos Legislator's Acts Sent Miss Yoakum Home Crying Witnesses Relate.

Couquille, Or., May 8.—Great interest is being taken in the case of J. S. Barton, state representative from Coos county, on the charge of attacking Miss Madge Yoakum, an employee. The courtroom is crowded daily with both men and women. A jury was secured late yesterday and witnesses are being examined. Miss Yoakum on the stand gave sensational evidence, alleging improper attention for some time. "She says the assault occurred in the vault in the office of the Title Guarantee & Trust company here, of which Barton is manager. The alleged date was Tuesday, April 8. Witnesses say Miss Yoakum came home crying with her hair and clothing badly disheveled."

Barton on the stand this morning denied all. He appeared confident and came through a severe cross examination by Prosecuting Attorney Brown successfully.

Barton's wife and mother were also on the witness stand. Other witnesses are to be brought up and Barton's past delved into. The case is nearing a close and will probably go to the jury late this afternoon.

Petitions were passed around on behalf of Barton to have a change of venue and also to have the case taken to another county on account of local sentiment, but they were not presented to the court.

U. S. WILL FINISH MT. RAINIER ROAD

Twenty-four thousand dollars is being set to be expended jointly by the government and Pierce county, Washington, in the construction of a three-mile strip of road from the west border of Rainier National park to the west border of Rainier National forest. Assistant District Forester C. H. Flory is now in Tacoma making final arrangements. Construction of the road will be started at once and it will be finished in time for late summer tourist travel.

This strip is the only bit of poor road from Seattle and Tacoma to Mt. Rainier, and when it is finished, it will be the finest stretch of road in the state. It is to be entirely rebuilt and finished off with crushed rock. All the scientific ideas of up-to-date road construction will be incorporated in this strip.

Money for the road is being appropriated by the government out of the revenue from the renting of grazing lands and the sale of timber.

SIX OF GALLO GANG ARRESTED HERE AFTER REIGN OF TERROR

Six members of Michael Gallo's bunco gang were arrested in Portland, July 1, 1910. Gallo escaped arrest, but was in and out of Portland during that year. One member of the gang, Stephen Ferrari, was turned over to the Oakland authorities convicted and sentenced to 10 years in San Quentin. Two others of the five Italian bunco men arrested were "floaters" out of Portland, suspended sentences being given.

The five gave the names of Benj. Stephano, Valentine Rosinini, Anselmo Breviglieri, Guespoli Daglio, and Pietro. These men were arrested by Detectives Tichnor, Howell, Hellyer, and Maloney. At the time of the gang's operation in and around Portland three complaints were made to the police of their activity. In each case, the victims were taken before the six men arrested, but did not identify "the men" as the ones who fleeced them. It is claimed. It was commonly understood among the police and detectives that the victims were afraid to identify the men.

One Italian saloonman lost \$1500 by the gang's operation. The officials at that time were positive the saloonman identified two members of the gang, but would not make complaint against them. Victims were too afraid of their lives to face any member of the gang. Ferrari was the leader of the gang. He fought extradition to Oakland several weeks, but was sent to prison.

The murder of "Danny" Partrix was a few months before the arrest of the gang. Partrix was a member of the gang. He was shot immediately outside Pete Bruno's saloon on Second and Everett streets shortly after dark. The man who fired the shot could not be found, although the best information obtained was that it was done by a member of the gang, and that the quarrel was over the division of loot. A few days before the murder, an Italian saloonkeeper was bunked out of \$500, and it was thought by the police that the division of this led to the murder.

All Italians questioned by the police, positively refused to talk. Pete Bruno seemed to know less than anyone, although the quarrel started in his presence and ended in the murder immediately outside his saloon door. It was soon after this that an effort was made to "black hand" Bruno by causing him to deposit money in the playground site on North Park street. Bruno moved to San Francisco, where he now conducts a saloon.

ELECTRICAL STRIKE PROCEEDS QUIETLY

Frisco Not Affected by Walk-out of Pacific Gas & Electric Workers.

(United Press Leased Wire.)—San Francisco, May 8.—Paralysis of the electrical and gas power of the Pacific Gas & Electric company throughout northern and central California will be the ultimate result of the walkout of 3000 of its employees, according to declarations today of union officials. Although officials of the corporation assert that only 834 men obeyed the strike order, the union men say the walkout is complete.

San Francisco was not noticeably affected by the strike. Predictions that the city would be in darkness last night were not borne out.

Demand 50 Cent Increase. The strikers are members of the light and power council of California. The walkout was ordered when officials of the corporation refused to accede to a demand for a wage increase of 50 cents a day. The company offered a flat increase of 25 cents but this offer was turned down.

Secretary Jenkins, of the council, was indignant today over General Manager John A. Britton's request to Mayor Ralph for police to furnish protection from the company's striking employees. "There was no occasion for such action," said Jenkins today. "The strikers will not resort to violence in any form."

Strike in Many Towns. Jenkins received word today that the corporation's employees at Napa, Dixon, Folsom, Newcastle, Alta, Deer Creek and Grass Valley also have quit work and he is expecting similar word from many other towns.

"Our operations," said General Manager Britton today, "have not been seriously affected by the strike. The places of the strikers have been filled, and at no time, excepting for a brief period of one half hour in Oakland, has the service of the company, either gas or electricity, been interfered with. Unless violence ensues the general public need not worry."

JUDGE GATENS WILL NOT RUN FOR MAYOR

"I shall not be a candidate for mayor. I thank my friends for their generous assurances of support, but I must decline the honor," said Judge Gatens this morning.

For several days much pressure has been brought to induce Judge Gatens to enter the field. The mail has brought him letters, and the telephone has been freely used, while several delegations of women and many of his friends among the men have urged Judge Gatens to become a candidate.

"The majority of Portland should be alluring to the ambition of any man, especially under the new charter, by which there is greater opportunity for efficiency and a splendid chance to render high service to the public," said Judge Gatens.

"But there is important work to do in the juvenile court, and for which I have plans that have not yet been developed. I should not want to lay down that work to enter the race for a position already sought by eminent gentlemen who are among my friends."

TROUTDALE MAYOR HAS NOT RESIGNED

Although he had promised Sheriff Word he would resign from office, Mayor Edmundson of Troutdale is still holding his position. Edmundson was arrested several weeks ago on a charge of selling liquor to a minor, but was released and the charge against him withdrawn upon his promise to resign from office.

Sheriff Word upon learning that he had not fulfilled his promise, went to Troutdale last night to learn the reason. Edmundson said that he would surely resign at the meeting of the city council next Tuesday night. One of the members of the council of that town, according to Word, said that Edmundson's resignation would not be accepted.

If Edmundson does not quit office he will be prosecuted on the charge brought by Sheriff Word. Edmundson is the proprietor of a saloon at Troutdale and a member of the city council is the proprietor of another.

GATEWAY HEARING STARTS TOMORROW

Legal talent representing the Harriman lines and a number of industries in the Pacific northwest will meet tomorrow morning in the federal court building to present testimony before Interstate Commerce Commission Examiner Carmalt relative to the closing of the Wallula, Spokane, Silver Bow and Butte gateways.

The West Coast Lumber Manufacturers' Association and the transportation committee of the Portland Chamber of Commerce will be particularly interested in keeping these gateways open for the reason it is alleged that to close them would mean restrictions to shippers that would prove damaging to industries in the Pacific northwest.

MRS. VIAL GETS DECREE, \$20,000

Wife Is Exonerated of Every Charge Made by Her Husband.

Mrs. Anna H. Vial was given a divorce from Leon L. Vial, member of a prominent pioneer family, at 2:30 o'clock today by Judge Davis. She is exonerated of all charges made by him. By a financial agreement made outside of court she gets \$20,000.

RUSSELL IS ARRESTED FOR ELEVENTH TIME

Although dismissed on similar charges but a few hours before, J. J. Russell was arrested last night by Sheriff Word's deputies on a charge of allowing gambling in his saloon at Second and Riverside streets. With him were arrested 10 men found playing cards. They were all taken to the county jail where they were released on bail.

This is the eleventh time that Russell has been arrested by men from the sheriff's office and so far no convictions have been secured. In all the cases heard both by the justice courts and by the grand juries, it is said no evidence was produced to show that gambling had been going on.

Justice Jones and Justice Bell sat on the preliminary hearing yesterday. Although a large number of witnesses for the state testified, they stated on the stand that they did not play for money or checks, nor was it a rule of the house that the losers should purchase the drinks. Even the deputy district attorney when asked by Justice Bell if he thought the state had enough evidence to hold Russell to the grand jury admitted that the evidence was insufficient.

Sheriff Word said this morning that he was sure the men were gambling, and that he was going to raid the place until card playing was discontinued.

ATCHISON RETURNS FROM WASHINGTON

Clyde B. Atchison, member of the Oregon State Railroad Commission, returned to Portland this afternoon from Washington, D. C., where he and Attorney-General Crawford left Thursday and Friday argued the Milwaukee rate case before the United States supreme court, to which it has been carried on appeal.

This is the case in which the commission ruled that the Portland Railway, Light & Power company must give Milwaukee and Oak Grove 5 cent car fare to Portland. Since the ruling was made, the company has been continuing to charge the old rate of 10 cents each way, giving patrons rebate checks good for five cents if the case is decided for the commission.

Franklin T. Griffith, general counsel, and president-elect of the Portland Railway, Light & Power company, and Joseph S. Clark of Philadelphia, opposed Mr. Atchison and Attorney-General Crawford before the court.

"If a decision is not handed down next Monday, we can not expect to have one for at least two weeks," said Mr. Atchison.

The commissioner left Portland on April 21. While in Washington he carried one or two minor matters before the Interstate Commerce Commission.

ROAD FOUND GUILTY; FINED \$100 BY JURY

The Oregon-Washington Railroad & Navigation Co. was found guilty by a jury in the United States district court this morning of violation of the 23 hour status regarding the interstate shipment of livestock. A fine of \$100 was decided upon by the jury. The case has been on in the federal court for the past three days.

The government's suit alleged 13 different violations by the company, but Judge Wolverton had these consolidated down to seven. While the railroad company complied with the regulation in regard to unloading the stock at the end of the 24 hour period, the government charged that the stockyards at Huntington and The Dalles were in such condition that the stock could not rest, while the water in the troughs was too high for the sheep to reach and the hay, being thrown on the ground for the sheep to eat, was trampled under foot.

Even Judge Wolverton was forced to laugh at an incident that occurred when the jury came in. The panel was on hand with a verdict at 10 o'clock when court opened. All were present but D. C. Rishlight, brother of the mayor, when the roll was called.

Attorney Cochran for the company got up and announced that he was perfectly willing to hear the verdict without Rishlight being present, and Judge Wolverton assented to this. Then one of the jurors announced from the box that Rishlight had been elected foreman and that he had the verdict. All the bailiffs in the room were ordered out to search for the absent one, and five minutes later he came steaming in and breathlessly rushed to the bar with the signed verdict.

MARCONI PEOPLE USE O. A. C. WIRELESS BOYS FOR STRIKEBREAKERS

Faculty Tries Vainly to Keep Them at School but Price Offered Is Too Great.

(Special to The Journal.)—Corvallis, May 8.—The department of electrical engineering at the Oregon Agricultural college wishes it understood that the students who gave up their college course to become wireless professionals and help the Marconi company through the present operators' strike, did so in spite of the earnest advice of the professors against such action.

"I do not consider that it is fair to organized labor, and on this ground as well as on the ground of the personal loss to the students in sacrificing their college educational opportunities. I urged the young men not to take the step," said Professor W. A. Hillsbrand.

"The Marconi company offered such glittering inducements to the boys, however, and they were so interested in the work that I could not keep them. The penalties for sailing without proper wireless facilities are so heavy, and loss from the delay of vessels is so

great that the authorities can, of course, offer very attractive terms to the boys rather than risk such losses."

Finley to California. To find out if possible what California sportsmen demand in the way of game protection, State Game Warden William L. Finley leaves tonight for San Francisco and Sacramento to be gone ten days. Finley has been appointed a member of the national commission that will draw up the new Weeks-McLean statute for the protection of birds that in their migrations traverse more than one state. Representing the Pacific northwest, Mr. Finley is endeavoring to get in touch as much as possible with the ideas of sportsmen and conservationists before going to Washington to meet next fall with the commission.
