Boys Reprimanded by Court.—Quick action was taken last Tuesday afternoon at the hall park in handling three boys who were trying to save money. To see the game they went over the fence rather than to pay their entrance fee. Patrolman F. M. West met them as they landed on the ground. Judge Gatena, of the juvenile court, happened to be at the box office at the time the boys were led up, and gave them a severe reprimand and a chance to reform. The boys were Clarence James, 17, of 846 Northwick street; James Gibson, 16, of 842 Cook avenue, and George Munley, 16, of 612 East Thirteenth street.

To Investigate Boys' Acts.—The practice of residents of the neighborhood of the Portland Flouring Mills of sending their children to the riverfront with garbage to dump along the banks is to be investigated by the juvenile court, and action taken against the parents unless it is stopped. A boy of 15 years was caught in the act yesterday by the police and his parents will be called into court Saturday to explain his statement that they had given him instructions to dump the trash there. Warnings will be sent to all who are known to have practiced this method of getting rid of garbage and more stringent action will be taken unless it is ended.

Bankruptcy Petitions.—Listing liabilities amounting to \$14,371.32 and assets of \$16,775, a petition in bankruptcy has been filed with the clerk of the federal court by Gross & Co., a corporation of Eugene engaged in the clothing business. A bankruptcy petition was also filed by William Wanner, proprietor of a hardware store at 142 Fourth street. His debts are \$1678.73 and assets, \$793. Theodore J. Brandt, a Gresham merchant, also petitioned for relief from his creditors, citing liabilities of \$5477 and assets of \$5500.

Ad Club to Invite Friends.—At a meeting of the committee in charge of the Ad club's excursion to Sacramento on May 19, 20 and 21, it was decided to invite the friends of the Ad club to go on the special train. The Portland Ad club is sending 20 delegates. Many of the delegates are taking their wives. At the conclusion of the convention at Sacramento a considerable number of the Portland delegates will visit for a few days in San Francisco.

Captain Moore instructed the sergeant this morning to take the trustees and remove the material from the street to the basement of the house. The building was started in February, partly completed, then work stopped. It appears ownership changed several times, the police being unable to determine who is responsible for the material blocking the street.

He was employed by the Near & Rarr Fuel company. Hindel is 57 years old, and was taken to the Good Samaritan hospital. Captain John Anderson of the shipping firm of Anderson & Crowe fell into the hold of a boat yesterday evening, sustaining a compound fracture of the left leg. He is at St. Vincent's hospital.

Painted Over Auto Tag.—Patrolman Cameron this morning arrested W. R. Rhodes on a charge of operating his automobile without a license, following the discovery by Cameron that the license tag on the rear of the man's machine was a 1912 tag, painted over to make the figure look like 1913. The number which had been forged was 6471, the 1913 tag of which is owned by P. Richardson. The case will come up for trial on Saturday.

Ferdinand Hafer Arrested.—Detectives Vaughn and Hyde this morning arrested Ferdinand Hafer, a tailor, who is charged with obtaining goods under false pretenses. The man, in some manner, secured a list of credit customers from several department stores and secured goods through having them charged to these accounts. It is suspected the arrest was made as the man was about to depart for Carson Springs, he having already shipped his trunks.

Arrested for Non-Support.—While making his escape yesterday, George D. Gibson was arrested by the sheriff of Wasco county at The Dalles on a charge of non-support. County Agent Harry Bulger telephoned to the sheriff to watch for him, as he expected Gibson would attempt to leave. Gibson refuses to support his wife and several small children, and will be brought back to face the charge in the county court.

IN EARLIER DAYS

"God must love Jim Hawley," said a friend to me a day or two ago. "You know Lincoln said, 'God must love the common people—he made so many of them,' and Jim Hawley is one of the common people."

"Who is Jim Hawley?" I asked. "He is one of Portland's pioneer draymen, and is the type of citizen that is the backbone of our republic. He is square as a dye, absolutely reliable, and intensely loyal to Portland. In other words, he is one of the good, old-fashioned kind of Americans."

Shortly thereafter, I saw a gray-haired, chunkily built, drayman in the warehouse district, and learning that he was Mr. Hawley, I asked him to stop and talk a few moments.

Charlie, the gray horse that he has driven for many years, seemed perfectly willing to have him stop as long as he wanted to.

"You are one of the pioneer teamsters of Portland, are you not?" I inquired when we had found seats on some dry goods boxes.

He took off his black felt hat, scratched his head meditatively and said, "George Evans, who works for the Northwest Transfer company, came here in 1872 and Ed Campton has been a teamster here since 1878. I am the next oldest in the service. I have been driving here in Portland for the past 33 years. For the first few years I worked for the Oregon Transfer company but for the last 20 years I have been in business for myself."

"Tomorrow will be the twenty-sixth anniversary of my wedding and I am living in the home that I built at 375 Larrabee street before I was married. My house is right at the end of the Broadway bridge."

"When I first moved there, it frequently took us an hour to get across the river to the east side. We had to depend on the O. & C. company's ferry, and as it was used for their own freight and passenger traffic, the side passenger business being more or less of a pickup, they were not particularly interested in giving good service to the general public. The bulk of the passenger business in those days was handled by two little boats that ran from Albion to the foot of Stark street. Captain Spencer had one of them and Captain J. B. Montgomery ran the other. You can understand that, having lived for the last quarter of a century near Broadway and Larrabee streets, how much interested I was in the building of the Broadway bridge. I don't believe any man in Portland has worked harder to have it built or watched its building more closely than I have."

"Old Charlie, my horse, was the first horse to be driven across that bridge. We crossed before the official opening. Another reason I am so interested in it, is that my oldest boy, who is a civil engineer, worked on the Broadway bridge during his vacation."

"I do hauling for the American Press company, the California Ink company, the Portland Photo company, and Stewart Brothers, and because I am so much interested in Portland's progress and in Portland's early history, they are always threatening to send Charlie and me to the historical society as an exhibit."

"I am not going to tell you that the draying business is a short cut to wealth, because it is like any other business. If you do business well, and watch the business closely you can make a good living at it, and if you don't do that, you can't make a good living at anything. Nevertheless, old Charlie and his predecessors have sent my family to the coast for a few weeks' outing each year. In fact, my wife has never missed going to the coast a single year since we have been married."

"I have two boys, George and Henry, and a girl. Both of the boys were graduated from the Holladay grammar school, and later from the Lincoln high school. They were both 16 years old when they came out of the high school, and I'll tell you right now, I am proud of them. They came out with flying colors. The two boys at Stanford now, George is to be graduated on the fifteenth of this month. Henry, the youngest, took the examination for Annapolis and passed with a high mark but was barred out by the physical examination on account of a weak heart."

"My oldest boy is a student instructor and they tell me he is going to make an excellent civil engineer."

"I figure that it is a man's duty to his country to raise a family and to raise them so that they will be citizens, and I can truthfully say that my children have had good home training and are securing a good education."

"In 1878 I helped clear a road just north of St. Vincent's hospital. They were working at that time on the improvement of Cleveland street. In those days the Clarendon hotel, at First and Flinders streets, was one of the leading hotels here. I remember very distinctly when the first electric car was run in Portland. It was run on Larrabee street from the shops in Lower Albion to the Steel bridge. It didn't get started until well along in the evening, and I believe it was October, 1888, that the first car ran."

"One of the advantages of being a drayman is that you don't have a very big fuel bill to pay. I have only used three cords of wood in the last twelve years. After my day's work I can go around where they are tearing down some old building and get free wood to haul home, or if work is a little slack, I can take home a load or two of old boxes."

FOSSIL TO CELEBRATE FOURTH DURING 3 DAYS

Condon, Or., May 8.—A mass meeting was held in Fossil Tuesday night to decide on a Fourth of July celebration. It was decided to hold a three day celebration, and \$5000 was raised at the meeting. This sum is to be expended in providing a good time for visitors and in making them comfortable. The prizes for baseball, horse races and other sports are not included in the amount already raised but will be secured later. The Condon ball team will play at the Fossil celebration. J. C. Cooper was appointed as manager of the celebration with power to appoint all committees.

DUNIWAY WARNS VOTERS' MEETING

Obstructionist Says He Will Prove That Charter Is Unconstitutional.

Ralph Duniway, the obstructionist attorney, came to the meeting of the Municipal association in the auditorium of the Journal building last night. He warned those in attendance that they ought to do nothing toward the accomplishing of the purpose of their meeting—passing on the qualifications of candidates for office under commission government—until his suit contesting the constitutionality of the charter has been settled. He predicted that he would be successful in his effort to invalidate the amendments to the charter of 1902, which approved by the people at the special election May 3, make commission government possible.

Asked to state his exact reasons for believing that the charter is not good, Duniway replied that the people of Portland, legally, lack the power to amend their charter and that only the legislature has authority to make such changes as were involved in the commission plan amendments.

Duniway's remarks, apparently, were received with scant approval for after talking 15 minutes he sat down in a dead silence.

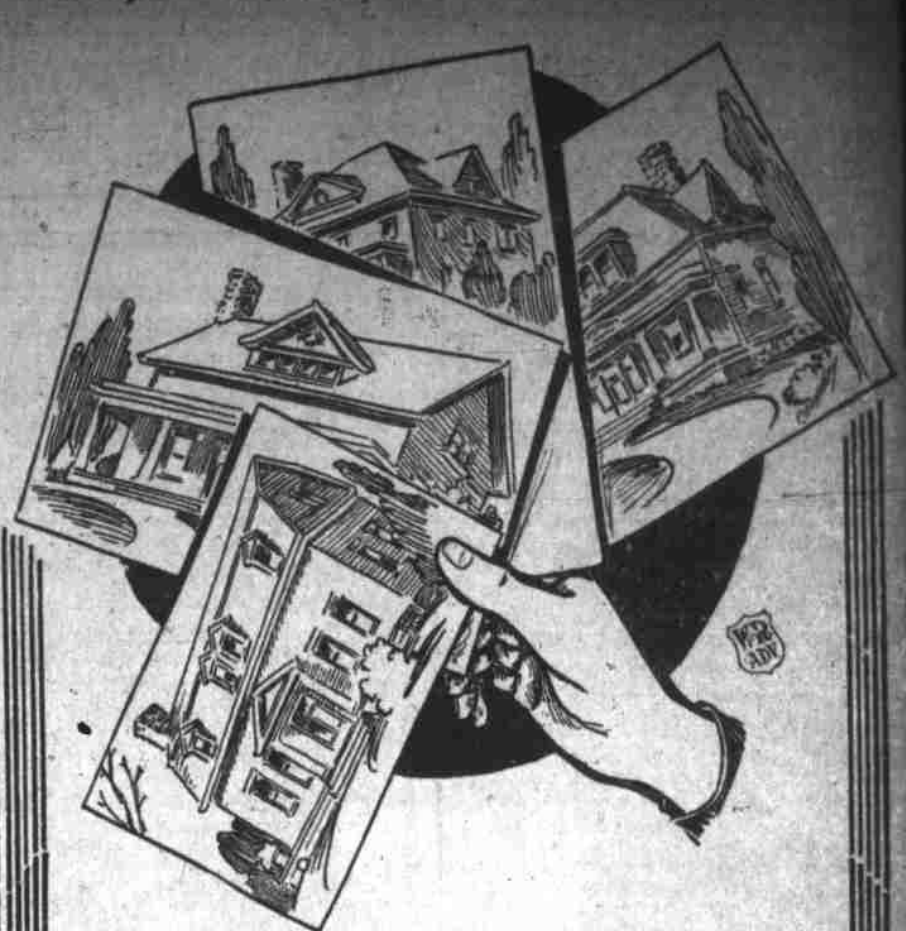
