

NEW CHARTER TO MEAN DELAY FOR CROSSTOWN LINE

P. R. L. & P. Co. Officials Notify East Side Clubs That It Must Wait to Apply for Franchise.

Last week it was thought that the east side's fight for a cross town, carline service had come to an end, but the new commission charter has put a new aspect on the case which may result in the delaying of this long needed improvement for some time.

Last week P. J. Fuller, vice president of the Portland Railway, Light & Power Co., notified L. M. Lepper, president of the Greater East Side United Improvement Clubs association, that the company had prepared a petition for a franchise on East Twenty-eighth street, which they would submit to the council at the next meeting. This latter part of the week Mr. Fuller notified Mr. Lepper that the company would not seek the franchise until after the new commission government had gone into effect, July 1. He stated that the changes in the charter regarding the granting of franchises made this step necessary.

At the last meeting of the affiliated east side clubs this action of the street railway officials met with a storm of disapproval. The members were united in the belief that if the company desired they could build the cross town connection at once. The president, L. M. Lepper, was requested to address the following communication to Mr. Fuller: "In the matter of cross town carline franchise: The Greater East Side

United Improvement Clubs association request that your company apply for a franchise permit at the council meeting next Wednesday, for this proposed cross town carline route. This would enable you to proceed at once per Mr. Griffith's promise and desire to get this cross town carline going this year. The affiliated east side clubs argue, and with reason, that you have operated under other revocable permits for years, and can do so in this case, until such time as you can apply for and get a franchise under the amended charter.

"Will you not get this permit at once and get going on the construction of this cross town carline, and make good Mr. Clark's and Mr. Griffith's promises?" "We are anxious that this cross town line be connected up soon."

PAYS TAXES FOR YEARS ON NON-EXISTENT LOT

Aberdeen, Wash., May 13.—R. H. Fleet, a well known resident of Montesano, has been paying taxes for five years on a lot which he thought he owned in Elima. He purchased it in 1907 and the deed calls for a three cornered piece of land 28 feet wide and 25 feet long. The other day, Mr. Fleet went to Elima to locate the property and dispose of it. The lot could not be found, and although an engineer was hired to survey the tract, the description of the lot in Mr. Fleet's deed did not tally with anything in Elima. He has asked the county commissioners to erase the lot from the tax list.

HONOR SYSTEM IS NOT NECESSARY, PUPILS PLAY FAIR

Harmonious Spirit Prevails at Clinton-Kelly School, by the Untiring Efforts of Principal and Teachers.

The principal reason for the success of the Clinton Kelly school is because of the unusual spirit of fairness and co-operation which exists between teachers and pupils. There is no honor system in vogue at the school, nor is there need for such a system, for through the untiring efforts of the teachers, the pupils have become imbued with the spirit of "playing fair." Not only in the classroom is this spirit of fairness apparent, but in all branches of the school work.

"This harmonious spirit which prevades throughout the school is due in a great measure to the splendid environment," stated Principal Reed. "The school board has provided us with one of the best playgrounds in the city with the resultant benefit of both healthy minds and bodies for the pupils."

"I would like to state that the Portland school board is composed of the fairest body of men whom I have ever met. They are conscientious in all that they do, and they are always striving to increase the efficiency of the schools. The people of this district greatly appreciate all that the board has done for the school."

Drainage System Perfect.
The playgrounds of the school are covered with a soft, fine gravel, while

a perfect system of drainage has also been installed. Even after the hardest rain the grounds are in good shape within a few hours. An outdoor court for indoor baseball has been installed on the girls' side of the grounds, and they have organized a school team for the purpose of competing with other east side schools. The boys always have present grammar school series. At present they are enthused with baseball, and they have a dandy team. They have lost but one game during this present grammar school series. At present there is no athletic apparatus on the playgrounds but the Parent-Teachers' circle of the district will take up this phase of the matter shortly and arrange some plan for the installation of suitable apparatus.

It was the first that the school has entered the school garden contest with a community garden, and at the unusual enthusiasm of the pupils is any criterion the school is certain to carry off a number of prizes. The plot of ground north of the school, which was recently purchased by the school board, was divided into 160 plots for garden purposes. It was planned to allot one plot to each pupil but the demand was so great that many of the plots had to be sub-divided.

Garden All Planted.
Two weeks ago the ground was plowed for the first time; today every garden has been planted and in some instances the vegetables have begun to sprout. Such interest is more than remarkable.

The Clinton Kelly school is provided with a fine concrete manual training building, which is also fitted up for sewing and cooking classes. Many of the boys have become very clever in the manual training and are turning out some very excellent pieces of furniture. The sewing classes have recently begun the machine work and the girls are now making their own garments.

The attendance at the school numbers 160 pupils. Eighteen teachers are employed. For the last five years the school has enjoyed a rapid and consistent growth, necessitating the addition of one teacher each year.

With such ideal surroundings, and with such a spirit of harmony existing between parents, teachers and pupils,

the Clinton Kelly school is truly a credit to the district, and to the city of Portland.

NAVAL MILITIA TO HAVE NEW DIVISION

A reorganization of the Oregon Naval militia, preparatory to the annual cruise on the United States cruiser "St. Louis" is now under way. The first and second divisions, as they now exist, are to be consolidated as the first division and a new first and second division is to be organized. B. B. Montag, with the rank of ensign, will be in command of the new second division. Claire Bristow and Henry Robinson will also be ensigns.

The reorganized first division will be in command of Ensign Charles J. Mitchell. About 40 new members have joined the organization within the last few weeks and 30 more are expected this week. An officer will be stationed on the cruiser "Boston" all the time, ready to take enlistments.

The cruise this year will be taken immediately after the Rose Festival on the "St. Louis." It is not known exactly where it will go. The navy department has not yet issued orders, but it is expected the cruise will be to Victoria and Vancouver, B. C., with target practice and drills on Puget Sound. A trip to the 1913 fair at San Francisco is one of the things ahead of the organization. Regular weekly rifle practice on the Clackamas range is to be held this summer.

The present engineer's division will be retained under the reorganization.

Rev. R. N. McLean Resigns.

Rev. Robert N. McLean, of the Ansel Presbyterian church, tendered his resignation Sunday, asking that it take effect on June 20. The failure of the congregation to enlarge the church is said to be the cause of the resignation. It is the intention of Dr. McLean to enter missionary work in Porto Rico.

FOUR THOUSAND CHILDREN ARE TO MARCH IN PARADE

Drilling Will Begin at Once for East Side Feature for Rose Festival Week; Parade of Human Rosebuds.

"Enough pupils have now been promised for the children's parade to make it an assured success," stated C. C. Hall yesterday noon at the regular weekly meeting of the East Side Business Men's club.

"At first the parents were reluctant to let their children stay after school hours to prepare for the parade, but through personal appeals to the civic pride and patriotism of the parents we have gained remarkable headway.
