

YOUNG DAVE GREGG BECOMES CLEVELAND PITCHER IN TRADE WITH TOLEDO : BEES WIN FIRST GAME

FORMER PORTLANDER CALLED BY MAJORS IN BASKETBALL EXCHANGE

Brother of the Famous Vean, Boosted by McCredie, Will Show Wares to Naps.

(Special to The Journal.)
Cleveland, Ohio, May 12.—The Cleveland American league team today traded pitcher Jim Baskette to Toledo of the American association for Dave Gregg, brother of Vean Gregg. Both are right handers.

That succinct message from the Port City this morning will be of a great deal of interest to Portland followers of baseball in general and the famous Gregg brothers of Clarkston, Wash., in particular.

Vean Gregg is the greatest southpaw in the major leagues today with the possible exception of Nap Rucker of Brooklyn. When Cleveland took him from Portland in the spring of 1911, he was ripe for the major leagues. With a mediocre team he has been a sensation. His work has been an inspiration to his much larger though considerably younger brother.

Dave Gregg was taken by McCredie in the fall of 1911 and finished up a few games. He had had no pitching experience except in three or four bush games around Clarkston. McCredie was able to teach him a little and last year he was with the Beavers most of the season during his training camp experience at Sacramento with Nick Williams' Colts.

He Lacked Strength.

Although Dave was a big fellow he did not have his full strength and he tired rapidly toward the end of a game. For a while he was a winning pitcher, but being on a poor club lessened his chances for victories and he finished the season with one-third of his games to the good.

Although Dave wasn't a consistent winner on account of his inexperience he showed a lot of "stuff" and the other players in the league predicted a bright future for him when he became older. Also, the big fellow, who is 6 feet 4 inches tall and weighs 200 pounds, did not take the national press seriously. It was a sort of a laugh for him. That is, it was until brother Vean in quite a caustic manner slipped him a few paragraphs of advice. Then Dave settled down and pitched great ball toward the end of the season.

Manager Walter McCredie is the man who realized his possibilities. He held on to Dave as a great pitcher, one against the advice of his players and a lot of fans. He thought that he would be a big winner with more age and experience this year, but when Charley Somers of Cleveland assisted in the strengthening of the Beaver team for this year's season, he was switching over a number of the Toledo players, also owned by him, he wanted to return some of Mac's surplus material for Toledo. He offered to trade Harry Krause for Dave Gregg, or, to put it another way, McCredie wanted Southpaw Krause and he offered Dave Gregg in exchange. However it happened, for this is private business, Krause came to Portland and Gregg went to Toledo.

When the papers were signed Manager Mac looked up from them and said: "Krause is a great pitcher, one of the best southpaws in the minor leagues, but I can't help believe that I have let a prize slip away from me in big Dave. I think that boy will eventually be one of the greatest right-handers that ever pitched a ball in the major leagues." Now that Somers and his wise assistants have looked Dave over, it appears that they have the same opinion as Manager Walter. At any rate the big youth will have a trial with the Naps shortly. He ought to develop rapidly inasmuch as he will be under the wise counsel of his famous brother, and that will help him more than anything else, for, as Bill James says, the older pitchers are not telling a young fellow anything for fear of losing their own jobs.

If memory does not fail, it is the first time in years that one major league club has had a pair of brothers on its pitching staff.

BROOKS' DOUBLE IN TENTH INNING PUTS EQUINE TEAM TO ROUT

Martinoni Has Rare Chance to Start Triple Play but Delays Trifle Too Long.

With all sails set for a triple play in the tenth inning yesterday, Pitcher Martinoni, who had relieved Lefty Stanley with the bases full and none out, hesitated a trifle too long and the best he could do was a double. Immediately afterwards Brooks drove a long double to left center and cleared the bases, breaking up a one to one tie that had existed from the fifth inning.

Stanley, who worked a baffling change of pace, keeping his slow curve and his fast ball mixed up, had allowed but two hits, both scratches and both gathered by Mike Lynch, up to the tenth inning. He pitched until the seventh. Then he lost control and walked Danny Shea. Narveson bunted. Stanley fielded the ball low to second and both were safe. Felts bunted down the third base line and beat it out, striking the cushions. Manager Nick concluded that Martinoni was warmed up sufficiently to relieve Stanley and rushed him to the center of the diamond.

Stanley hit a scorcher back at Martinoni on a hit and run sign which found all the Bees in motion. Marty flagged the ball, made a bluff at third, then at second and finally tossed it to Specs to double Felts. Had he gotten rid of the ball sooner to third or second instead of first, Brooks would never have had a chance to tear off the two-ply to center. Lynch was an easy third-out.

Plenty of Action.

There was enough of the unusual to the game to fill a couple of columns. We saw Bobby Coltrin push Big Mike Lynch all over the territory around first base in an effort to field the ball and Umpire Casey make the Bee manager stick on third despite his bellowing. A moment later we saw Coltrin take a liner off Lamb's bat and double Mike out at third in the same inning, the ninth. And we saw Billy Specs outguess the Bee infield and score from second base on an infield out. Although the Colts lost, the new lineup worked in great form and it is the kind of baseball played yesterday that should bring the fans out to see the Northwestern league games.

Victoria went into the lead momentarily in the fifth inning. After Melchior had walked and was out stealing, Delmas drew a pass and stole. Mohler made a quick throw of Lamb's grounder and Specs, playing his first game this season at first, dropped the ball, letting Del reach third, whence he scored after Shea's long fly to Mahoney. Narveson fanned for the third out.

Specs Fleet on Paths.

Specs' great baserunning in the second portion of the inning, evened the count. Bill beat out a hit to Rawlings, took third on Mahoney's second sacrifice, and scored on Williams' out. Delmas, who was out stealing, stole from Brooks by fooling both Del and Brooks by his sprint. Bill was on his native yesterday and came near stealing home in the first inning, but Casey called him out on a close decision at the plate that could have been called either way.

RITCHIE IS OFFERED FIGHT WITH RIVERS AT VERNON ON JULY 4

It All Depends on What Lightweight Champion Thinks of Terms of McCarey.

Los Angeles, May 13.—Joe Rivers will battle Ritchie for the lightweight championship of the world at Vernon on the afternoon of July 4, if Ritchie accepts terms that have been wired him today by Promoter Tom McCarey. This became known following a long conference between McCarey and Joe Levy, Rivers' manager, who arrived here from New York with his boy late yesterday.

It is understood that McCarey, who was not expected here to bid for Ritchie's services on Independence day, has made the champion a generous offer, and that the match now rests with the Ritchie camp. McCarey would not state the terms of his offer.

Rivers will leave Los Angeles today for Wheeler Springs with his bride for a two weeks' outing. He will not appear in a ring until July 4. The Mexican appears to be in perfect health. He is willing to take on the winner of the coming Mando Anderson fight if the Ritchie match is not made.

Poston, Professional, Takes Chingren Medal; Order of Events Changed Today.
