

"SPEED" M'DONNELL WON'T BE MEMBER OF M'GINNITY'S TOSSERS

Los Angeles Refuses to Waive
but "Iron Man" Will Use
Other Means to Strengthen.

Tacoma, Wash., May 13.—"Iron Man" McGinnity, manager of the Tacoma Tigers, is not satisfied with the playing of his men.
"There is going to be a shake-up," he said today. "I am going to start something to see if we can't keep within striking distance of the flag."
Ed Kennedy will be taken from center field and given a tryout at first base in today's game. He has played that position before and if he shows anything, Nordyke will rest until his hitting improves.
Len Burrill, the infielder secured from the Coast league, will be given a chance, although it is not known just where he will be used.
"Speed" McDonnell will not be with the Tacoma team this year, according to a telegram from President Berry of the Los Angeles team. Berry changed his mind and has decided not to waive on the youth.
It is likely that Ruell will get into the game in a day or two.

ANDERSON SLATED TO BE FAVORITE IN BOUT WITH MANDOT TUESDAY

Vancouver Boy Goes Through
Full Training Camp Program
to Reduce Avoirdupois.

Los Angeles, May 13.—Road work and boxing was the program today at Venice, where Joe Mandot is conditioning himself for his 20 round bout with Bud Anderson at Vernon May 20.
After a rest yesterday Joe took to the road early today for a five mile run. Twelve rounds of boxing completed his day's work.

Anderson, although he has been at his training only two days, went through a full program. He will find it necessary to peel off several surplus pounds from his body, and Trainer Mohan has instituted a busy regime at Doyle's camp, where Bud is training.
Several small bets were registered yesterday on the battle at even money. It is believed, however, that Anderson will go into the ring a slight favorite.

Tells Home Folks He'll Win.
Vancouver, Wash., May 13.—Confident in his own mind that he will put Joe Mandot to sleep much easier than he did Kayo Brown, Bud Anderson has written to his friends in this city not to feel worried as to the outcome of the fight.

Continuing in his letter Bud says, "I think Brock the biggest fellow of the duo and he can beat lots of the corners yet. I figure that Mandot is a clever boy but do not think he can hit very hard, but he is not so fast what I can hit him. I can land with either hand and the power behind my blows is equally strong. I think by this method that I will be able to show down Mandot. The Medford crowd gave me a grand support. I am feeling fine and will easily make the weight, 143. I expect to win before the twentieth round."

TOM M'CAREY'S FIELD SCENE OF INCURSION OF RIVAL PROMOTERS

Los Angeles, May 13.—An attempt to break Tom Carey's monopoly on the fight game in southern California is to be made by Bill Aldridge and Harry Gilmore of Venice, according to assertions today of those promoters. As a starter, \$17,500 will be dangled before the eyes of Billy Nolan as a bait for a Ritchie-Rivers match July 4.
According to Gilmore, the pair will begin work at once on a pavilion at Venice and will deposit \$25,000 as a guarantee to the managers of Ritchie and Rivers of their interest in the proposed match.
Aldridge has promoted weekly four-round fights at Venice. Gilmore is a former manager of fighters.

BASEBALL NOTES

Talk about your brotherly love on a baseball club! The Portland Colts have the world beaten. Out at the Bosanta apartments on Twenty-third street a whole flock of them are domiciled. They are housed in connecting apartments. Edwin Fries, Chris Mahoney, Dan Murray, Elmer Martini, Bobby Coltrin and Jimmy Agnew are the present batchers. Before they were released "Skin" Harris and Ed Doty belonged to the bunch, and a couple more will take their places. Agnew is chef, Coltrin dishwasher, Fries the garcon and Murray the chore lad at present.

The protest lodged by Manager Mitze over the Tuesday game against Venice will probably be passed up to the National commission for a decision, says the San Francisco Post. The parent body will have to hand down a ruling on the 20 men limit for class AA clubs. If the National commission decides that a twenty-first player on the bench is ineligible it may be that several games in the Coast league will be thrown out, as Oakland, Venice and Sacramento all had 21 men under contract. The rule is a new one and a decision on it will be awaited with interest.

Rowdy Elliott is the twenty-first player mentioned above, and is the one who drew a protest from Manager McCredie because he sat on the bench May 1 in Portland, although Hogan had suspended him for being out of condition, which was all a stall to come within the 20 man limit.

First Baseman Brooks of the Victoria club and First Baseman Derrick of the Portland Coastiers were roommates for two years at the Georgia College of Technology. Derrick played at first on the college team, while Brooks was an outfielder. When he played at New Orleans three years ago they made him over into a first baseman, because he possessed a lot of natural speed and was a left hander. Brooks and Derrick have not seen each other for five years, although they live within a few miles of each other in Georgia.

Lamb, the nifty looking third baseman of the Victoria Bees, was a magnate last year. No joke. He owned a club in the Kansas State league, but decided that he would rather play the parttime as one of the hired help, and signed up with President Wattaleat.

Nick Williams was so stiff and sore from squatting behind the bat yesterday that he needed a good run from Doc Ackerman last night.
