

MASS MEETING IS HELD BY WOMEN. ISSUES DISCUSSED

Judge Gatens and Mrs. Abigail Scott Duniway Speak to Woman's Good Government Club at Bungalow Theatre.

The first of a series of mass meetings held by the Woman's Good Government Club in the Bungalow theatre last night. Judge W. N. Gatens and Mrs. Abigail Scott Duniway were the speakers. Alice R. Nugent, president of the club, introduced the speakers. No candidates for office were heard from last night, but it was stated that equal opportunity for hearing would be given at all meetings to be held. It is likely that mass meetings will be held each night, beginning with Monday. The club's regular Thursday afternoon meetings will be held in the Bungalow theatre until the election is over.

After the addresses, the president stated she had been asked to tell about the women's pension bill, that it is intended to take care of men disabled in performance of duty, or ill, or who after many years of service are retired. One of the proposals of the bill is that firemen who have served twenty years or more may be retired, if physically disabled or unable to continue work, on half pay, or if firemen who have served twenty years die, their widows and children may have the benefit of a pension amounting to half their pay.

Judge Gatens in his address lifted an indictment that has long rested against the department stores. He said the department stores do not furnish the bulk of the prostitutes as has been charged against them. He cited his juvenile court experience as proof. He said that his experience has been that women are women's worst enemies, that they are more uncharitable. He declared that non-professional prostitutes spread the germs of the social evil more than the professionals and that men do more than both together.

"You cannot legislate morality into people," said Judge Gatens. "The only effective and permanent way to eradicate the social evil is by education, by protection of our women and girls and by the men of our land doing their part, demanding of their sex the same standard of morality required of their wives and daughters."

"The principal reason that there are so many immoral women is that men have been brought up to believe that it is their privilege to destroy the virtue of women. What would be the result if men, when it became known they were leading immoral lives, were to be made social outcasts?"

Not Loyal to Own Sex.
"One of the principal reasons why men are given this unfair advantage over women is because women, themselves, are not loyal to their own sex. Men and women uphold men in immorality, while women turn their own sisters and daughters out of home for what their own sons and fathers do promiscuously."

"My experience," said Judge Gatens, "convinced his address, 'has shown me that in the majority of cases back of the broken home, the unfaithful wife and the delinquent child, the cause lies

KLAMATH PROJECT IS GIVEN CRITICISM

Abel Adey Tells Sec. Lane Man in Charge Favors Speculators Over Homesteaders.

Washington, May 14.—Abel Adey occupied the attention of Secretary Lane at a hearing this afternoon concerning the Klamath reclamation project, speaking as a water user. Senators Chamberlain and Lane, Representatives Sinnott and Hawley were present.

Adey read correspondence to lay a foundation for statements that he intended to make revealing contentions between Supervising Engineer Hopson and the water users, and then commented caustically on them. Adey said that for trying to protect the people of the Klamath project, who were threatened with abandonment of it, he was persecuted by the reclamation chiefs. He conceded the ability of the engineers, but criticized the system and said the policy of the man in charge was not in sympathy with the settlers, speculators being given privileges not accorded homesteaders.

Mrs. Duniway took issue with him on this point and declared that no separation but clean rearing and proper educational method is the necessity. She also disagreed with Judge Gatens that women are women's worst enemies, saying that when women know the facts and the woman deserves pity she gets it from her sisters.

AD MEN OF N.-W. WILL GATHER HERE

Delegations From Many Cities on Way to Los Angeles Convention.

Portland will be the "grand rendezvous" of Northwest Ad men tomorrow. From 11 o'clock until the special Ad men's train leaves tomorrow night for the Pacific coast advertising convention in Sacramento, May 19, 20, 21, the advertising experts will be entertained here.

When the Spokane Ad men arrive in the Union station tomorrow morning they will be greeted by the local Ad club in a body. Other delegations from Vancouver, Victoria, Seattle, Tacoma, will be greeted in the same way. The Ad men will be taken to the ball game in the afternoon to see the game between the Portland and Victoria teams. The crowd is expected to produce several different kinds of rooting for the two teams.

The evening of the day will be the dinner given in the Hotel Portland at 6:30 o'clock. It is announced there will be little by way of formal speeches but that everything essential to good cheer and entertainment will be supplied.

A. C. Black has been elected delegate at large from the Portland Ad club to the Sacramento convention. There will be 16 others from Portland, all pledges to make the California cities learn as much as possible about the desirability of the Rose Festival and the desirability of spending the week of June 9-14 in Portland.

Miss Mildred Tucker, five years old, is to accompany the Portland Ad men on the journey south. She will be the chief speaker for Portland on all social occasions. young that they are going to vote for the candidates they regard fitted for the positions regardless of personal feelings. Practically every voter has the good government of the city at heart and is not looking for the advancement of any friend for purely selfish reasons.

World Give Unfit Chance.
"Now if the voters are not electing candidates for selfish reasons, they ought to try to elect men who are fit for the offices, as against the 50 or 60 men in the field who should not be elected under any circumstances."

"An unfit candidate has as many, or almost as many personal friends, perhaps, as the fit candidate. And restricting the choices to 4 means the probability that unfit candidates with strong personal followings will be elected." Marshall N. Dana is even more emphatic.

photo in defining his position as contrary to the stand suggested in the advertisement.

"The advice of the People's Progressive League to vote only first choice for candidates under the preferential system to be used in the June election does not coincide with my personal views," he said. "The intent of the preferential system of voting, in permitting first, second and third choice votes, is to elect candidates by majority vote or as near majority vote as possible. It was reasonable to believe that with so many candidates for commissioner in the field, any will receive a majority of first choice votes. Second and third choice votes will be added to the first choice votes, I am sure, before any candidate is declared elected."

Full Expression Made Possible.
"In practical effect, second and third choice votes will be worth as much to candidates as first choice votes. I have, from the beginning, been in favor of giving the people the largest opportunity to express their varying degrees of favor for the candidates who have offered themselves. If I am to be elected, I hope to be elected consistently with the spirit of the commission charter."

"In making this statement I do not wish to appear unappreciative of the support volunteered my candidacy. The endorsement of the gentlemen composing the league was given without my solicitation. They did not ask if I desired their support. They merely informed me that they had examined my record and found it satisfactory, that they were convinced that I was fit for the office both as to character and training, and that they placed myself in the way of support and approval from all classes. This is true. I value the vigorous support which has been given me without the semblance of a pledge from me. I am satisfied these men will see the best elected to office and that this is their only motive. At the same time I desire the people to know the facts. I have not been asked nor shall I divert myself of any personal beliefs for the sake of any support. It would seem to me unfortunate to have the results of the election dependent upon the success of a struggle between minorities. I believe all voters should use their second and third choices as well as the first choice. I give pledge—to do my most efficient best to think and serve in the interests of the entire public."

A Fair Test at Least.
To prove or disprove the objections raised to the preferential voting plan, it should be given an absolutely fair trial, this election, Albert G. Clark believes.

"The city has approved this system of voting by adopting the commission charter," he said "and the people should in the full spirit of the plan give it a fair trial. This is a failure and does not result in the election of the real choices of the people to the offices, as some contend it will not, it should and undoubtedly will be discarded. But as a candidate I could not take a stand for election by any other method than the full system indorsed and adopted by the voters of the city in adopting the new charter."

T. H. Stoppenbach, the fourth candidate indorsed by the league, declared this morning that he had no objection to the suggestion was published, and said that it did not express his idea or wish.

"I have not had time to fully study the results to be obtained from the new voting plan," he said, "and, not being a politician, will not like to take a stand on it until I see it fairly tested or until its benefits or objections are fully demonstrated to me. After a trial, if it is found that it does not put in office fit candidates approved by the people, then it should be dropped."

STRIKERS PARADE BUT STREET CARS OPERATE

Cincinnati, May 16.—Extension of the street car service was made here today, despite the efforts of the striking employees of the Cincinnati Traction company. Thirty-seven cars were operated on four lines and there was no violence.

The strikers' activities were centered today in monster parades through the principal streets and a mass meeting at the Cincinnati baseball park. The parades were the largest labor gatherings in the city's history.

CANNERY TO GO UP FOR CLATSKANIE VEGETABLES

Schwartz, who conducts a tailor shop in the room where the fire broke out was damaged to the extent of about \$1000.

INCOME TAX MAY AID ROCKEFELLER

Rockefeller Foundation Said to Be Exempt; Entire Fortune Might Be Put in It.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
New York, May 16.—Probability of John D. Rockefeller's entire fortune escaping income and inheritance taxation is seen here today as a result of the opinion declared in Washington today by Representative Hull of Tennessee that the Rockefeller foundation would be exempt under the terms of the income tax law.

Many able lawyers voiced the opinion that Rockefeller could place his entire fortune in the hands of the foundation and this would mean that his annual income of between \$3,000,000 and \$4,000,000 would be exempt from taxation.

The Rockefeller foundation, which congress failed to indorse, was created by the New York legislature, just closed, to "promote the well being of mankind throughout the world." It is not specified how the promotion of the well being of mankind is to be accomplished and leaves the men in control free to use the funds of the foundation as they wish.

Not Created for Profit.

Washington, May 16.—Declaration that the Rockefeller foundation will be exempt under the terms of the measure was made here today by Representative Hull of New York, who drafted the income tax provision.

"Under the provision of the law," said Hull, "only corporations created for profit are taxable. The Rockefeller institution."

O.-W. BEGINS SURVEY TO SOUTH UMATILLA

(Special to The Journal.)
Pendleton, Or., May 16.—The O.-W. R. & N. company this morning sent a crew of surveyors, in charge of Engineer H. T. Roberts, to Pilot Rock for surveying the line of the proposed extension of the Umatilla Central into the stock and timber belt of the southern end of the county. The crew will commence work about 10 miles from Pilot Rock.

Close on the heels of the announcement by General Manager J. C. O'Brien that his company would commence the survey of this survey comes the rumor that the Northern Pacific is seriously considering racing with its rival to tap the undeveloped country. There is real reason why the Northern Pacific should take this step, as at this time practically all the cattle shipments from that country are made over its lines. Inasmuch as there are probably 10,000 head shipped annually from the ranges of the Umatilla country, the business amounts to something. It is reported that if the Northern Pacific pushes its line to the south end it will go by way of Tutuila and across a rich section of the Umatilla reservation in order to secure large wheat shipments now being received by the O.-W. R. & N.

BANKER BIXBY FAILS TO APPEAR IN COURT

Bixby, Long Beach banker, charged with contributing to the delinquency of two minor girls, again failed to appear to answer contempt charges preferred when he failed to testify at the preliminary hearing of Mrs. Josie Rosenberg, who was charged with pandering. Bixby's case then was continued until this afternoon, when it was expected, his attorney, Oscar Lawler, would appear in his behalf.
