

HASTENING WORK ON BROADWAY STREET CARLINE

Satisfied that all difficulties in regard to franchises, and problems of construction will be settled in the near future, the Portland Railway, Light & Power company has two crews of workmen busy laying tracks that will go to make up their line on Broadway and over the new Broadway bridge.

In this connection Vice President Fuller said he anticipated that cars will be operating over the structure and up Broadway to Jefferson street before September. On the east side 100 workmen are employed. They have just completed putting

in the curves and switches at the intersection of Williams avenue and Broadway. The rails for one track are almost entirely laid from Union avenue to Williams and the trench of the second track is excavated from Williams to Larrabee. In all, approximately one-third of the work is done, although ac-

tual construction work has been under way only 15 days. On the west side 20 workmen are laying rails from Jefferson street toward Salmon on Broadway and are putting in connecting tracks, frogs and switches at Jefferson street. Rails for the double tracks from the west approach of the bridge to Burnside street are laid already, along with the third rail to handle broad gauge cars in event the proposed Heuser franchise is granted by the voters at the election June 2.

EASTERN OREGON HOSPITAL PLEASURES

State Officials Are Surprised at Progress and Fine Condition of Institution.

Following a visit to Maryhill, where they spent Sunday with Samuel Hill, investigating the hard surfaced roads on the Hill estate, and Monday, making their annual visit to the Eastern Oregon hospital at Pendleton, State Treasurer Thomas E. Kay and Secretary of State Ben W. Olcott reached Portland yesterday morning on their way back to the state capital.

In speaking of the visit to Samuel Hill's estate on the upper Columbia, Mr. Kay said: "Mr. Olcott and myself, together with President Young of the North Bank road, left Portland Saturday night for Maryhill upon the invitation of Samuel Hill, to spend Sunday inspecting the various kinds of hard surface highways which he has built there for demonstration purposes.

"We found that Mr. Hill had about 10 miles of splendid roads at Maryhill. We made a careful examination of them and gleaned some information which will be of value to the state highway board which was created by the last

legislature, and which will be organized early in June.

"Leaving Maryhill Sunday night, Mr. Olcott and myself went on to Pendleton, where we spent Monday inspecting the Eastern Oregon hospital, located in that city. Both of us were very much pleased with what has been accomplished by Superintendent McNary. We found that wonderful progress had been made in clearing up and improving the farm surrounding the hospital grounds. Although it has been less than four months since Dr. McNary and his corps of able assistants opened the Pendleton institution, we found that they have a fine garden planted from which they will take sufficient vegetables and gar-

den truck for the use of the hospital for the remainder of the year, and from the alfalfa fields, they will cut sufficient hay to supply the institution's dairy herd and other livestock.

"Dr. McNary has made fine progress in leveling up the rough grounds surrounding the hospital and will soon have several acres of lawn around the institution buildings. He has his force well in hand and conditions at the institution are more favorable than we thought it possible for them to be in so short a time.

Mr. Kay is spending the day in Portland visiting relatives, while Mr. Olcott returned to Salem on the early morning train.

GOOD ROADS PARTY IS OFF FOR KELSO

Governor Lister and Highway Commissioner Will Come as Far as Vancouver.

(Special to The Journal.) Olympia, Wash., May 21.—Governor Lister and all the other members of the state highway commission, accompanied by Will B. White, chief engineer, and by C. J. Lord and C. Will Shaffer, left at 8 o'clock this morning for a week-end tour of the Pacific highway between Olympia and Vancouver. They will travel in the Lord and Shaffer automobiles as far as Chehalis. From there on they expect to be the guests of the commissioners of the counties through which the highway extends.

The tour today leads through Tenino, Bucoda and Centralia to Chehalis, where the party will be guests of the Citizens' club at luncheon. The travelers plan to reach Toledo to spend the night. Thursday they will drive through Carterrock and to Kelso, where the afternoon and evening will be spent with the Southwestern Washington Development association delegates.

Friday, by way of Kalama, Woodland and La Center, they will drive on to Vancouver. The members of the party except Treasurer Meath will start home to Olympia either Friday night or Saturday morning. Meath plans to visit Portland before returning.

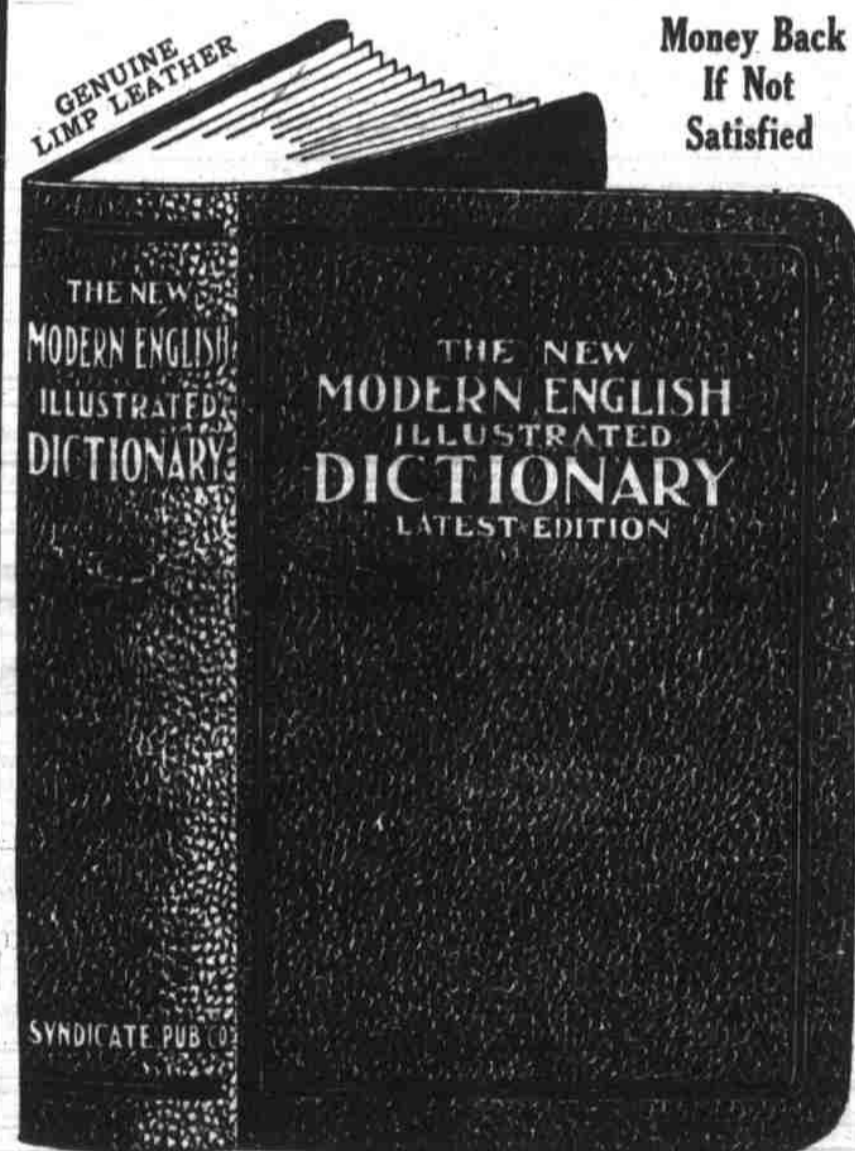

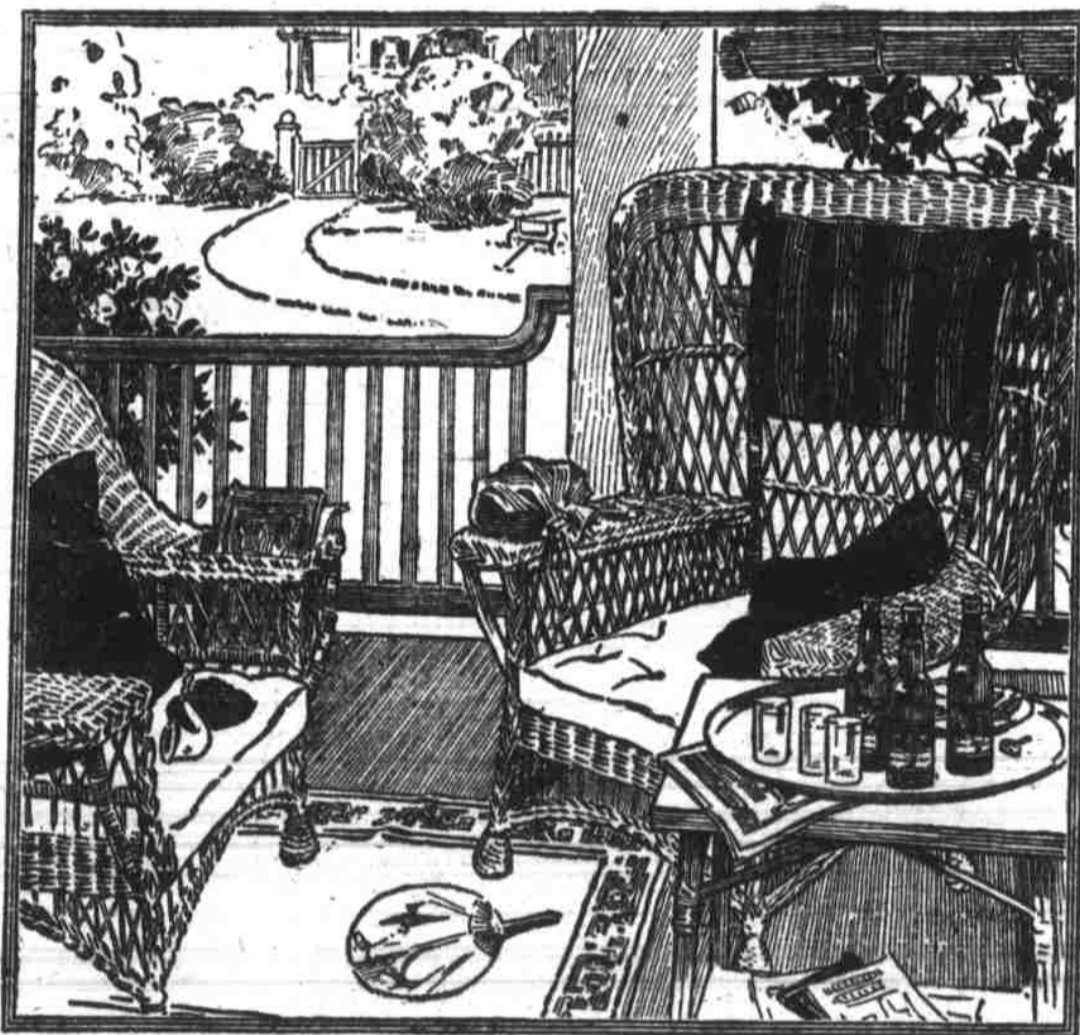

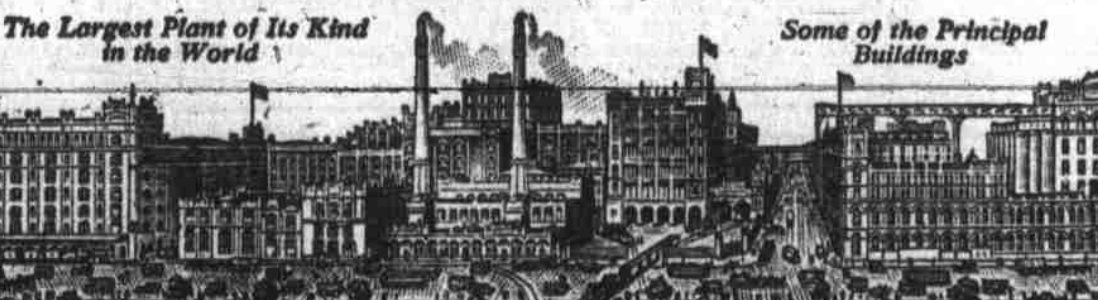
