#### First Time in Politics.

LOUIS GERLINGER JR.—President of Gerlinger-Richards company, general insurance and real estate agents, office in Gerlinger building. Home address, 751 Marshall street. Age, 34 years. Born in Chicago. Came to Oregon in 1894, has lived here since except for seven years residence in Dallas, Ore., while manager of Salem, Falls City & Western railway. Attended Chicago public schools, Bishop Scott academy and University of Oregon law school, Portland, and Stanford university. For past two years president of Gerlinger-Richards company, and before that with Salem, Falls City & Western. Prior to that, manager Portland, Vancouver & Yakima railway, now Yacolt branch of Northern Pacific. Subsequent to leaving school, established sawmill in Clackamas county and acted as superintendent and general manager of lumber and logging interests. Has not been in politics before. Income over \$9000 yearly.

#### Able as Business Man.

T. O. DALY—Manager Monarch Oil Refining company, office at 107 First street. Not to be confused with Will H. Daly, present candidate, also candidate. T. O. Daly is 39 years old. Born in San Francisco. Had completed second year at St. Ignace college when father died and he had to shift for himself. Took up mechanical and practical engineering. Went to sea in engine room of steamer, worked up until he got federal chief engineer's license. Traveled around world four times in such work. While at sea, completed commercial course with view to going into business. Quit sea about six years ago to become engineer in Spreckels' sugar refinery in San Francisco. Soon after undertook superintending of electric steam plants along Pacific coast. Salary for this work ranged from \$500 to \$1000 a month. After three years of this took northwestern management of Monarch company, headquarters in Portland, about 12 years ago, with salary of more than \$8000 a year. Married and has two children. Lives at 740 Irving street. Member of Commercial club, Elks, Knights of Columbus, Progressive Business Men's association. Never active in politics before last primary, when he was nominated for councilman in Second ward. Politically ambitious. Personal integrity unquestioned. Regarded as able business man, but political strength doubtful.

#### Apparently Well Qualified.

NORMAN C. THORNE—Instructor of chemistry and geography at Portland academy. In Portland nearly nine years, coming here to join academy faculty. Married, has one child. Home at 841 Brooklyn avenue. Born in Central Valley, N. Y. Age, 36 years. His father died before Thorne's 14th birthday, leaving wife and five children with slight means of support. From time of father's illness was principal dependence of family, taking entire charge of father's country store and market, and assuming his duties as head of household. Determined to get education, he learned carpenter's trade. Worked at plumbing, carpentering, tin-smithing, as baker's assistant, farm hand and at tutoring to put himself through school. Graduated from Yale in 1902. Took one year honors in science. Elected to Sigma Xi honor society because of good work in science. Received Cuyler fellowship of \$150 a year for 1902-03 and worked as laboratory assistant while taking graduate work in chemistry and geology. Came to Portland academy after getting master's degree in 1904. Has held no positions in public service and has taken active part in civic affairs. Has very strong following in First M. E. church, members of which asked him to become candidate. Regarded as man of absolute integrity and has shown much ability as educator. Friends say he has fine judgment in business and administrative matters. Apparently well qualified for commissioner.

#### Has News Held Office.

M. O. COLLINS—Native of Portland, 42 years old. Attended public schools. When 18 started as fireman in electric light plant at old Hogus sawmill. There two years. During spare time studied electrical and steam engineering. Later studied mechanical and civil engineering. Surveyor several years. Studied law and admitted to practice when past 30. Married Mrs. Catharina Hawthorne Beck, one of two heirs of Hawthorne estate. In 1912 after bitter family fight, succeeded Whitney L. Boies to management of estate. This is his present occupation. In 1911 appointed by Governor West to Port of Portland commission under law passed by legislature. Supreme court later ruled law ineffective. Associated with Dan Kellaher in litigation by east side business men against vacating streets for east approach to O. W. R. & N. bridge. Has never held public office. Integrity unquestioned. Business record before legislature ordinary. Member of East Side Business Men's club, United Improvement Clubs association and Multnomah club. Qualifications not conspicuous.

#### Considerable Personal Following.

JOHN DRISCOLL—Resident of Portland since 1899. Born in Ireland in 1852, came to Connecticut with parents in 1864. Grammar school education. Retail and wholesale meat dealer here for many years. Now president of Boston Packing company and director of Hibernia savings bank. In 1901 and 1907 served in Oregon legislature. Resigned from Port of Portland commission in 1911 after serving on it eight years. Conservative business man, successful and honest. Usually accounted a reactionary in politics. Has considerable personal following.

JAMES N. DAVIS—Lawyer. Born in Illinois, and is 55 years old. Graduate of school of law, University of Kansas, in 1885, having been admitted to the bar in 1885. As deputy county attorney for Douglas county, Kan., obtained first conviction in state under prohibition amendment to constitution. Came to Portland in 1890. From 1892 to 1901, in firm of Davis, Gantebain and Yeager, partner in contract to lay first Bull Run submerged pipe line; right-of-way agent for Oregon Water Power & Railway company, buying what is now Oregon City line right-of-way from Hawthorne avenue to city limits, paying out \$200,000 in his own checks for it; partner in Klamath Irrigation project; located power sites for Northwestern Electric company on Kieckit and Lewis rivers, Washington. Claims credit for bringing Northwestern Electric to Portland. Now with Northwestern Electric as attorney and water rights agent, also has private practice. Member of legislature in 1907. Did not align with either faction striving to elect United States senator, but took independent course. Lives at 861 Hawthorne avenue. Owns home and considerable property. Married and has family. Integrity unquestioned but political record not prominent.

#### W. L. COTTEL—In drug business at First and Grant streets since he came to Portland in 1887. Born in Maine and is 61 years old. Raised on farm. Graduated from medical department of University of Louisville in 1877. Practiced medicine in Illinois 10 years before coming to Portland. Served two terms in city council and one term in legislature. In both positions he proved weak, vacillating and incapable, though his personal honesty was not questioned. Has some personal following but no prospect of election.

### LORD KITCHENER KILLS SIX COBRAS IN EGYPT

(United Press Leased Wire.) Cairo, Egypt, May 21.—As a relaxation from the cares of his duties as British agent general in Egypt, Lord Kitchener has taken up snake hunting. A few days ago, when it was reported that a 12 foot cobra had been seen near the Giza Sporting club's grandstand, and he learned that the native police and keepers were not eager to interview the reptile, Kitchener sent for a snake charmer. On the promise that the famous soldier would personally attend to the snake, the native began whistling softly. Soon, to the horror of the bystanders, not one reptile but six crawled from under the stand. The natives promptly bolted, but Lord Kitchener with four of his aides waded in with stout cudgels and after an exciting fight killed the snakes.

#### Kitchener was so pleased with the afternoon's sport that he had the snake charmer permanently retained on his staff.

### STATE FORESTER CAN PATROL TIMBER AND CHARGE THE OWNERS

(Salem Bureau of The Journal.) Salem, Ore., May 21.—In reply to a query from the state forester, the attorney general today advised him that he has authority under the law passed by the legislature to provide a forest fire patrol for the timber holdings of any owners who neglect or refuse to do so themselves and have the cost assessed up to the land, providing the cost does not exceed 5 cents an acre per annum. Under this law the state forester will be able to see that every acre of timber land in the state which needs patrolling is patrolled during the forest fire season.

### LIFE SIZE STATUE OF A. E. MEAD PLANNED

Bellingham, Wash., May 21.—Fathered by the Chamber of Commerce and State Historical society, a movement is on way today for a statewide campaign for funds to erect a life-size statue here of the late Governor A.
