On the following day I visited Warrenton and had a very enjoyable visit with Mrs. Munson.

"I am one of the survivors of the Whitman Massacre," said Mrs. Munson. That subject has been so thoroughly discussed that little new light can be thrown on it at this late day.

There are one or two minor incidents of the massacre that I have never seen printed. When my father was shot in the arm he hurried to the mission house and with Mrs. Whitman and some of the others went upstairs.

After my father's death, the Indians heard from some one that he had considerable money. They only found a little money on his body.
