

ALBEE ENEMY OF STATEMENT NO. 1: ALSO INITIATIVE

Legislative and Council Record Shows Mayoralty Candidate Opposed to Progressive Measures, Says James.

Portland, Or., May 27.—To the Editor of The Journal.—In your editorial of May 26, on Albee and the Oregonian, you hit the nail on the head. You are right. It is the tactics the Oregonian pursues that is the cause of the defeat of the candidates who are so unlucky as to have its endorsement. Intentionally or otherwise, the Oregonian is putting the knife in Albee's hopes of election.

I intended voting for Albee until the Oregonian came out for him. I have since looked up his record and found that the Oregonian has picked a candidate who is the standard bearer for all the Oregonian stands for. In fighting the Initiative, Referendum and Statement No. 1 the Oregonian had a valuable ally in the person of Mr. Albee. WILSON APPROVES OF DIRECT ELECTION PLAN

Washington, May 28.—President Wilson's support was sought today by Congressman Britten of Illinois in connection with his bill for a constitutional amendment providing direct presidential nominations and elections.

It was asserted that the president emphatically approved of the bill, but did not give it his specific endorsement. President Wilson called Britten's attention to his record as governor of New Jersey, where he came out in favor of presidential primaries.

DIRECT ELECTION TO BE EFFECTIVE SATURDAY

Washington, May 28.—Secretary of State Bryan announced today that a proclamation would be issued Saturday declaring effective the constitutional amendment providing for the direct election of United States senators. He invited statesmen prominent in the movement to attend the formal signing of the proclamation.

Lord Justice Farwell Resigns.

London, May 28.—Sir George Farwell, Lord Justice since 1906, resigned office today. As Justice of the high court Sir George Farwell was the author of the famous Taff Vale decision in 1900.

RANCHMAN WITH ROPE PULLS OUT TONGUE OF HORSE; ANIMAL KILLED

(Special to The Journal.)
Hillsboro, Or., May 28.—William Penny, a ranchman from the Hills above Forest Grove, was arrested yesterday on a complaint charging him with wantonly wounding and disfiguring an animal. It is claimed that Penny became incensed at a balky horse he was driving and that he fastened a rope to the animal's tongue and pulled it out. The suffering animal was then, it is charged, turned into a field, where it remained for 24 hours before being found and killed. The horse was owned by E. McCoy, father-in-law of defendant, and the complaint was sworn to by A. A. Draughn, of Buxton, member of the Humane society. Justice Smith placed Penny under \$1000 bonds.

WATKINS DENIES SALOON CONNECTIONS

"There are certain people in the city who have issued a card recommending certain candidates and condemning others. I am one who was condemned, it being said that I am a friend of the liquor interests," declared Councilman Frank E. Watkins, at Green's hall, in Woodlawn, last night, where he spoke in behalf of his candidacy.

"If these people are to be fair in their statements they should say that I am the friend of every man, woman and child in Portland, for I have given every other person in the city the same treatment. There is no one in the city that can say that I have not done so," he said.

"The people of Portland decreed that there should be saloons, and the task of dealing with the liquor interests was placed on the members of the council. We are compelled to deal fairly with them, for they have a recognized standing in court, and would make us give them what they are entitled to, through the charter of the city. If we did not do so, without formality of court proceedings, I do not drink. I have no connection with the liquor people in any way. I have no saloon, and incidentally receive taxes to just that extent, and they propose to see that they get something for that money." He was loudly applauded.

SPANISH VETERANS INDORSE RUSHLIGHT

By almost unanimous vote, the Bolocub, a strong political organization of Spanish-American war veterans, who belong to Scout Young Camp, last night endorsed A. G. Rushlight for mayor. Nearly 100 members of the club attended a meeting in the Grand Army headquarters on the fifth floor of the court house at which the endorsement was made. Expected opposition to Mayor Rushlight didn't develop. When a ballot was taken, after brief discussion, there were only five votes for Albee, all the rest being for Rushlight. The endorsement was enthusiastic.

SENATE COMMITTEE TO VISIT COAL STRIKERS

Washington, May 28.—Most of the members of the senate sub-committee are going to West Virginia this week to begin the inquiry into the coal miners' strike in the Palm Creek and Cabin Creek districts. Senators Swanson, Shields and Borah are sure to leave before the end of the week, and Senators Kenyon and Martine are expected to join them later. All the members of the committee expect Senator Swanson, favor the abolition of alleged terrorism.

QUINE'S ASSAILANTS GET 10 TO 20 YEARS

Roseburg, Or., May 28.—Eugene Owen Smith, John Devitt and Stanley Gilbert, the three young men who last Friday night attacked Sheriff Quine in an unsuccessful attempt to escape from jail, have pleaded guilty to a charge of assault with a deadly weapon and were sentenced to the penitentiary from 10 to 20 years. All three Monday pleaded guilty to the charges for which they were arrested and were sentenced, Smith from 2 to 20 years and Devitt and Gilbert from 2 to 5 years. They will be compelled to serve both sentences.

NEW YORK SENATOR IS GIVEN 4 TO 8 YEARS

New York, May 28.—A sentence of not less than four years imprisonment nor more than eight years, today was imposed on State Senator Stephen S. Wells, recently convicted of bribery in connection with charges by President Randall of the New York Bank Note company. A stay of execution for three days was granted.

PRISONER ADMITS HE FLED ENAVILLE

Arrested at Castlegar, B. C., He Is Said to Have Confessed He Is Luoma.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Nelson, B. C., May 28.—While on a Great Northern train between the Union depot and Mountain station yesterday the man arrested by Provincial Constable King at Castlegar admitted to Chief Constable Black he is John Luoma, who is charged with having murdered John Lundquist, wounding Sylvester Jarvey and shot at Ben Jarvey at Enaville, Idaho, last September. Until that time he had refused to admit his identity, although Joseph Hill, deputy sheriff from Kellogg, Idaho, claimed to have recognized him as the man wanted.

On a piece of scrap paper Luoma wrote down the name and address of his wife, who lives on his ranch at Enaville, in order that the authorities here might forward the money which is due Luoma for work at the Edgewood Lumber company's mill at Castlegar.

FROZEN MEATS ARE POOR, IT IS STATED

Shrinkage and Loss of Flavor Makes Them Expensive, Says Veterinarian.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Sacramento, Cal., May 28.—That the shrinkage, loss of flavor and quick decomposition of frozen meats will in the long run make them more expensive than the home products, although originally they are lower by about 3 cents a pound, is the arraignment of the meats being imported in large quantities from Australia, made today by State Veterinarian Keane.

"Housewives who flock to the butchers to buy Australian frozen meats," said Keane, "in the belief that the meat will reduce the cost of living are deluded and they will soon find this to be true. Frozen meat has a big shrinkage when thawed, and becomes soft. The juice runs out and this more than offsets the cheaper price. It also becomes tainted very quickly."

MRS. PANKHURST ON HUNGER STRIKE AGAIN

London, May 28.—Mrs. Emmeline Pankhurst, the militant suffragette leader who is in Holloway jail serving a part of her sentence for inciting to violence, has refused to eat since her latest incarceration and is very weak. It is expected she will persist in her hunger strike, and as the government probably would not face the opprobrium should she die, it is believed she will soon be released again.

The plan of the government, it is said, is to continue arresting and releasing Mrs. Pankhurst until her spirit is broken and she consents to abandon her militant attitude.

He told them of his early struggles in this city between 1889 and 1900; how like thousands of others he had gone down in the early 90's owing a large sum of money, every dollar of which he had since paid, and was now possessed of a comfortable fortune.

commissioner," concluded Mr. Ward, "and that because of my business as a contractor, I am peculiarly well qualified to serve the city under the commission charter."

DAWSON DREDGES RUN FULL BLAST

Three of Largest in World Being Placed; Estimate Year's Yield at \$5,000,000.

Dawson, Y. T., May 28.—Dredges and hydraulic plants within 50 miles of Dawson are now running full blast and cleaning up on an average of \$30,000 of gold daily. It is estimated that the total yield this year will exceed \$5,000,000, which was the high mark last year.

Three of the largest gold dredges in the world are being placed on Boyle concession, two of which are finished and started to work within the last few days.

The first steamers from Dawson with Yukon gold for the Vancouver assay office and the Yukon mint will be leaving here within 10 days; just as soon as Lake Labarge is open. The first steamers from Labarge with freight and passengers for Dawson, Fairbanks, Ruby and Iditarod are on their way down the river, and are due here today.
