**Woman's Club Open Meeting.**

The Portland Women's club held an open meeting yesterday in Women of Woodcraft hall, which was well attended. The various issues of the campaign were discussed by well known speakers. Arthur M. Churchill, secretary of the committee of 100, explained the preferential system of voting and answered several questions on the subject. His advice was to vote all three choices.

George A. Thatcher spoke on the bond issue for the erection of a detention home for women, declaring such a home to be the only correct and humane way of handling the women of the underworld. For through the home they will be given a chance to change their lives, heal their minds and bodies and make themselves better women. L. H. Weir advocated more parks and playgrounds for the city, and urged the people to vote for the park bond, issue. Mr. Weir declared that Portland has a record of 10 children killed while playing on the streets last year. So long as there are children they will play and as long as there is no other place to play they will play in the street.

The great need of the city for garbage incinerators was mentioned by Dr. George B. Story. The voting of these bonds was urged both from the standpoint of health and economy. Battalion Chief Young spoke of the firemen's relief and pension bill. The purchase of Council Crest for a municipal park was urged by T. J. Geisler, who dwelt on the great advertisement which this slightly eminence is to the city of Portland. George H. Himes urged the passage of the measure providing for the erection of homes for the Historical society. Mr. Hunt spoke on the Heister franchise. The construction of a bridge in South Portland was urged by B. C. Jones. Many of the speakers were piled with questions and the meeting was both interesting and instructive.

## CHORUS RECITAL AT REED SUCCESS

Difficult "In a Persian Garden" Brought Much Applause.

The appearance of the Reed College chorus yesterday afternoon, in the first of two recitals of the song cycle "In a Persian Garden," with Mrs. Rose Bloch Bauer and Mrs. Delphine Marx assisting, met with immediate success. An audience composed largely of Reed students and their friends filled the college chapel. Every number was well received.

Although the piece is exceedingly difficult and the attempt to give it with a chorus of more than professional singers was most ambitious, the work of both the chorus and the student principal was such as to bring forth a great deal of applause.

"In a Persian Garden" is the words of Fitzgerald's translation of the Rubayyat set to music by Ezra Lehmann. The score is written for four voices and a piano accompaniment. The chorus sang the quartet parts, while the baritone solos were sung by Raymond Branton and the tenor solos by Harry Wemmer. Because of the difficulty of the soprano and contralto parts, it was feared that student talent would not be able to handle them, and Mrs. Bauer and Mrs. Marx were asked to take these parts. These artists are well known in Portland. Their participation in the concert did much toward its success. Howard Barlow conducted and secured a nicety of expression and delicacy of interpretation far above the ordinary. Mildred Linden was the accompanist.

The chorus is composed of 50 voices. The members have organized in order to give concrete expression to their love of music. They have spent several weeks in preparing for these concerts, the last of which will be given tomorrow night. Because of limited seating room in the chapel the recital is limited to invited guests. Yesterday's recital was open to the public.

## LAZY HUSBANDS WILL BE PUT TO REAL WORK

(United Press-Associated Press.) Seattle, Wash., May 29.—Impressed by the arguments presented by a committee of the Federated Women's Clubs, headed by Mrs. H. P. Fish, and preparing for the "lazy husband" law which goes into effect June 14, the county commissioners are planning a stockade on the 65 acres of public land near Ballard. The first work which convicted "lazy husbands" will find confronting them is clearing the land of stumps.

The new law specifically requires that persons convicted of abandoning their families shall be put to work by the county, their wages, not to exceed \$1.50 per day, to go to their dependents.

If the scalp be too dry, it requires one kind of tonic; if it be too oily, another remedy should be applied. The experience and knowledge you have acquired through your wide investigation of municipal questions will be of inestimable value to the city in the position to which you aspire. I appointed you assistant city attorney to investigate and determine questions of great magnitude, and of the first importance to the city and the public, and I know better than any one else how faithfully you labored, and how efficiently you performed the service. Many of these questions, like the Fourth street franchise, the public levee and the usurpation of public property by private interests, are now settled, and the property reclaimed through the processes you set in operation. In addition to the experience thus acquired, your service on two charter commissions, with the study and research you have given the subject, has brought you into contact with charters in the making. If there ever was a time when capitalism is demanded, it is now, when a new system is put in operation. Questions innumerable will arise, questions that must be disposed of at once, which may involve the city in great disasters. In this, as in business, questions wait upon the man who knows; and among the candidates you are the man who knows.
