

MOVING PICTURE MEN JOURNEY TO COL. HANLEY'S RANCHES FOR EXCITEMENT.

(Special to The Journal.)
Burns, Or., May 31.—Moving pictures are being taken of the great central Oregon country, so the millions of people in the United States may see the actual development of this territory. In order to get scenic and industrial pictures of Harney county stock raisers, Ralph E. Earle of Portland, in charge of the picture taking outfit, accompanied by Lloyd W. McDowell, publicity manager for the Hill railroad lines, is spending a week on Colonel William Hanley's ranches in order to secure real "backdrop" scenes and reproduce methods used in handling large herds of cattle.
Earle and McDowell arrived in Burns last Tuesday and first secured photos of old Indians and settlers, then went to the "H" ranch and several days around the "backdrop" camp. Then Earle secured views of the surrounding country and other interesting pictures of ranch and farm life in Harney county.
It is through Louis W. Hill, former president of the Great Northern railroad, that the Pathé's Weekly is enabled to get these pictures. He considers the moving picture one of the greatest things of the present generation to help educate the people regarding their own country.
The reels depicting the wonders of this part of Oregon will be sent to Jersey City at once, where they will be developed and placed into a machine, where it will be possible to produce 300 to 500 positives from the one original negative. When the reels are made up in the proper order and completely ready they are sent to general film companies, which distribute them to all parts of the United States. They are to be released on a certain so that the people in Portland and Tacoma may see them as soon as those in New York.
The reels are given to the big houses first and then to others and finally to outside towns. In the large cities the pictures are shown 10 times a week, while in country towns they are flashed on the canvas three times a week, making a total of 50,000,000 people, estimated, who have seen one set of films. The sets run from six months to a year.

ROOSEVELT GIVEN 6 CENT VERDICT IN HIS LIBEL SUIT

said they had always been intimate friends and he had accompanied the former president on his hunting trips. He said:
"I have been more intimate with him than any other living man. I will swear to it. I have never seen him with a woman who would have been possible for him to have been under the influence of liquor." He also declared that Roosevelt never used profanity or obscenity.
William Loebe Jr., formerly Roosevelt's private secretary, testified to intimacy with the plaintiff, declaring:
"He is as temperate as any man I know. I have seen him on trips, by a doctor's prescription, take a little milk punch, which is about as intoxicating as grape juice."
Loebe insisted that at the Cannon dinner Roosevelt was not intoxicated in the slightest degree and then repeated the substance of Roosevelt's own testimony regarding light wines he sometimes took in moderation.
Frank Tyree, United States marshal for West Virginia, who followed, testified that he was at the colonel's elbow as a secret service operative during most of the Roosevelt administration and that he accompanied the former president on every trip he made. He said Roosevelt was always sober. He described how closely the secret service operatives watched Roosevelt and absolutely corroborated the colonel's testimony that he is a teetotaler.
James Sloan, who was personal bodyguard to Roosevelt and Taft and who now guards President Wilson, testified that he described the elaborate precautions taken to guard a president, and said: "I always knew who was on the president at every banquet and was informed in advance of what he would eat and drink. I watched everyone who approached him. Usually the president's waiter was a secret service man. Whenever he was around him I was within a few feet of him until he went to bed and then I occupied the stateroom next to his."
The crowds on the president's trips everywhere were very large. Tyree usually went ahead, I behind, and two other men on each side. Often I would take the colonel's arm because he is most nearsighted and would stumble. At night I always took his arm."
Sloan testified that Roosevelt was always sober.
W. F. Schaeffer, a Cleveland railroad man, who rode the colonel's train last year, testified that the colonel never tasted more than a single glass of mildly alcoholic milk on any one occasion.
There are rumors current that the suit may abruptly terminate before Monday and through the actions of the attorneys for the defense, this is generally credited. DEATH DEALING GALE ALONG VIRGINIA COAST CAUSES BIG DAMAGE

Several Fishing Boats Missing, Government Wireless Station Wrecked.
(United Press Leased Wire.)
Norfolk, Va., May 31.—Incomplete reports today from sections of the Virginia coast devastated by last night's wind and rain storm indicate that from 5 to 10 lives were lost. Only two persons are positively known to have perished—the occupants of a rowboat which was swamped at Plumer's point. Their bodies were not recovered.
A score or more of fishing boats were out when the storm broke, and several of these are missing. A dozen schooners anchored off Lambert's point were dashed against the piers and badly damaged. The United States receiving ship Franklin was badly damaged. The government wireless station here was wrecked.
South of Norfolk the storm took on the proportions of a tornado and much damage was done.

SWINGS TWICE TO FACE OF HER SON-IN-LAW

Enraged, it is said, because Charles H. Niman, her son-in-law, said derogatory things about his wife, Mildred Niman, Mrs. J. F. McMahon swung her handbag against the back of his head in the main corridor of the court house this morning and then hit him twice in the face with the flat of the blows out his face slightly. Bystanders, including Mrs. McMahon's husband, stepped between the two and stopped the quarrel.
Niman is being sued by his wife for divorce and was on his way to Circuit Judge Kavanaugh's court where the case was to have been heard, when he passed Mrs. McMahon near the court house elevator. He had hardly passed when she swung her bag against him. She said afterward that he had said mean things and had bumped into her.
Niman and his wife have had much trouble during their married life and she claims that he treated her with cruelty and failed to provide for her. He claimed that her parents interfered in their family and once started suit for \$50,000 against the McMahons for alienation of affections.
For several weeks the case has been brought into court each Saturday because Niman has failed to observe the orders of Judge Kavanaugh to provide for her. He is a painter by trade but each time he has appeared he has claimed he could get no steady work and could do no more than provide for himself. Last Saturday Judge Kavanaugh ordered him to pay his wife \$40 for her maintenance.

BEELE MENACES FORESTS

The bark beetle isn't very large. You could place fifty of him and his brethren on his school book name, which, by the way, is Dendroctonus Monticola. Nevertheless, to experts of the United States forest service, the bark beetle is almost as big a menace as a forest fire, because he is industriously but surely making away with our pine forests.
Down in Wheeler county, ten miles due south of the town of Mitchell, in the Coconino National Forest, the government maintains a "bug" camp. It is no open air institution for the mentally incapacitated, but a live, bustling place out of where 40 men are working, waging war against the beetle pest. There is a tract close to the camp containing more than a thousand acres, containing lodge pole and yellow pine, in which practically every tree is infested with the pestiferous insects.
Great Damage Done.
T. T. Munger, forest assistant from the Portland district forester's office, recently visited the bug camp and has brought back with him some wood and bark samples which illustrate vividly the work of the beetle.
When and where the beetle came from no one seems to know. At any rate the biologists and botanists of the forest service have been working on it for several years ago, chewing away on the big yellow pine of the Blue mountains, in Wallawa county, north and east of the camp. At the present time, in that section alone, in one tract, the industrious destroyer has killed the trees on 200,000 acres, and they are still at work.

Pendleton, Or., May 31.—Julia Walker, the 20-year-old mixed blood girl who Monday escaped from Morrow county deputy sheriffs after they had captured her and her brother-in-law, Willie Jordan, is one of the cleverest horse thieves in eastern Oregon, according to local officers. The two are wanted here now for stealing two horses from paddocks in this city several weeks ago. Sheriff Taylor struck their trail immediately and has kept track of them ever since, but it has cost him time and money to do it. The girl is a daughter of notorious "Old Bill" Walker of John Day, and has lived on the frontier nearly all her life. Her first visit to a city was about four years ago, and she was an object of curiosity, but all three told him in the roughest of men's attire.
Jordan married her elder sister, but his wife died in the county poorhouse about a year ago, and her body now occupies a pauper's grave. Since her death, Julia has taken up with the big fellow, who has already served three terms in the Oregon penitentiary.
