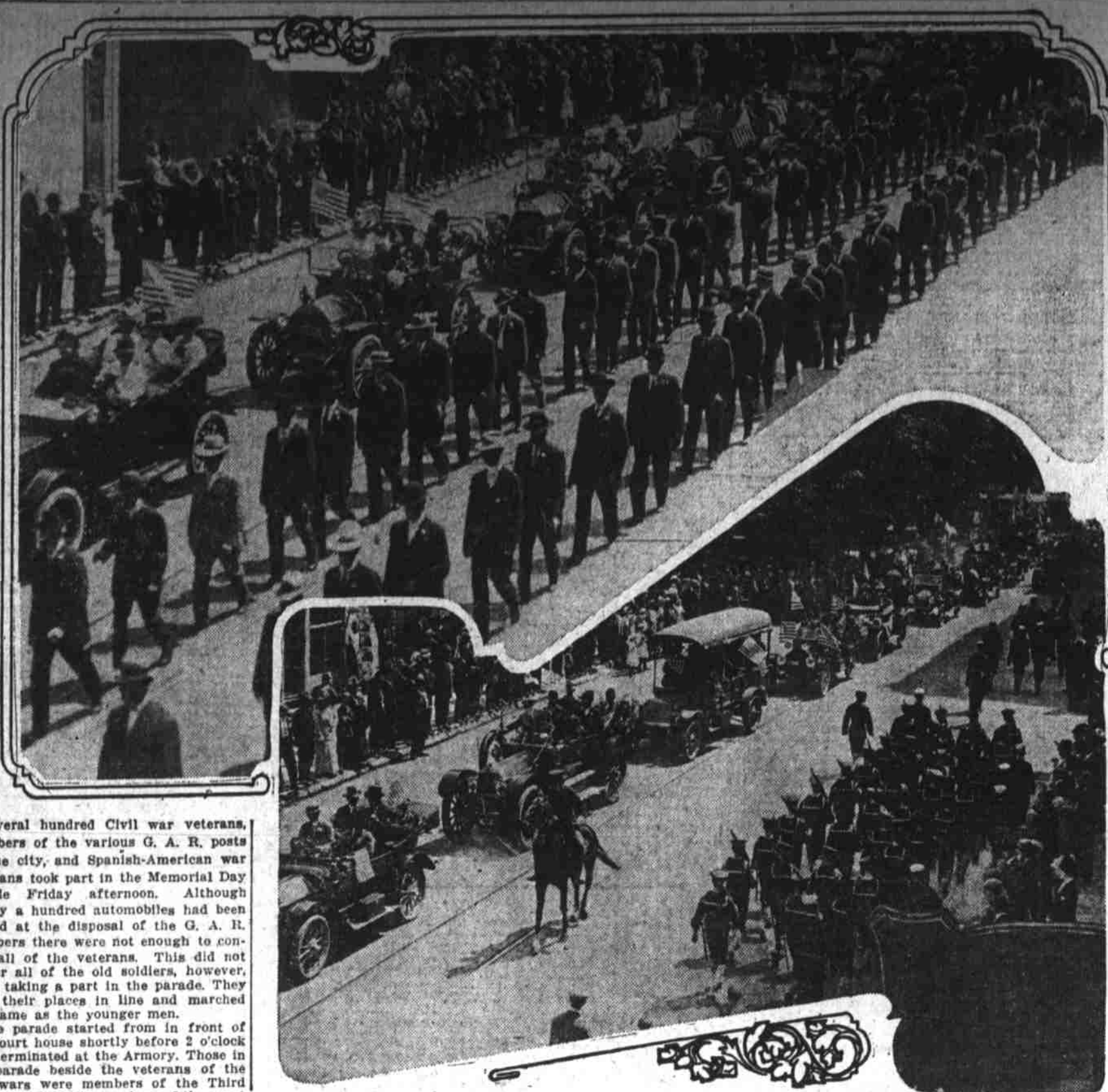


HUNDREDS OF WAR VETERANS MARCH IN PARADE



Several hundred Civil war veterans, members of the various G. A. R. posts of the city, and Spanish-American war veterans took part in the Memorial Day parade Friday afternoon. Although nearly a hundred automobiles had been placed at the disposal of the G. A. R. members there were not enough to convey all of the veterans. This did not hinder all of the old soldiers, however, from taking a part in the parade. They took their places in line and marched the same as the younger men.

The parade started from in front of the court house shortly before 2 o'clock and terminated at the Armory. Those in the parade beside the veterans of the two wars were members of the Third Regiment O. N. G., members of the coast artillery; members of Battery A; and members of the Oregon Naval Militia.

At the head of the procession was a platoon of police in command of Captain Riley, of the first night relief. W. G. Copley acted as grand marshal of the parade and was instrumental in getting the procession started without delay.

Comrades all—it made no difference whether the veteran wore a tattered blue uniform or one that was as good as newness—they were still comrades and so they sat in the various machines, living the battles over again.

The Spanish-American war veterans nearly 250 strong were escorted by the Letter Carriers' band. Other bands in the parade were those of the coast artillery, naval militia and Third regiment, O. N. G. A drill team consisting of members of the Woodmen of the World also had a place in the parade.

ART SCHOLARSHIPS AWARDED

According to its regular custom the school of the Portland Art Association has awarded scholarship prizes for excellency of work during the past year, the awards having been made yesterday, the closing day of the art school for the year.

The committee passed upon the point, which had not previously been made definite, that no student would be eligible for awards or mentions who had previously received an honorary scholarship; so that the excellent work of the scholarship students was not considered in the awards.

The meritorious work done by the evening life class and the fact that the evening students are practically excluded from participation in the general scholarship, led the committee to offer a separate scholarship to students in the evening life class, to be decided upon in the same manner as the general scholarship and to consist of free tuition the following year in the evening classes.

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M'KENNA ORATORS BOMBARD CROWDS

Parade and Street Corner Spell Binding Wind Up His Campaign.

C. L. McKenna's campaign for mayor closed in a whirl of oratory last night following the final meeting in the hall at 129 Fourth street of the 16 affiliated McKenna clubs. I. E. Staples presided and reports were received from the various clubs, to the effect that meetings had been held in every section of the city and that "McKenna would surely win." The candidate himself made a short talk, after which the staff of spellbinders selected by his campaign committee and the publicity committee of the affiliated clubs got into automobiles and following an auto in which was a brass band, went through the downtown section where meetings were held on various corners.

Mr. McKenna in his closing talk of the campaign reiterated his former utterances as to prosecution of white slavery cases, common-user clauses in all franchises, publicity as to the emergency fund of \$20,000 which the commission can use and which the new charter says it need make no account of, public markets, more playgrounds, public docks and better regulation and municipal ownership of public utilities.

Speaking to an immense crowd at one of the street meetings last night, H. S. Hudson said:

"The one thing of moment in this campaign is to get the city government out of the hands of the politicians. The first battle has been won. We have adopted the commission form of government. We must not waste that victory by placing the new government into the hands of political manipulators. That is the big issue in this campaign. Free the city government of politics and we will have better administration and lower taxes."

"The politicians are after the job of mayor. They see in this position a stepping stone to the senate and governor's chair. Most of the candidates are well known because they are politicians. Mr. McKenna is known not as a politician but as a business man of great executive force. He will have no political henchmen to reward. He will have no political enemies to punish. He does not want to be governor or senator. His friends wanted him to be mayor because they knew his ability."

"He was forced into the fight by these friends. He has made a fair-

fight, a forceful fight, and he will make a fair, forceful mayor free from newspaper influence, free from special privilege influence, free from every influence but the influence of the people and the good of the city. It is time to say down with the politician in our business affairs and up with the business man—because it is the only way to get efficient government, lower taxes, better public service and cheaper paving."

"Make McKenna your mayor and the average citizen will be the gainer."

Special efforts are being made to interest juvenile exhibitors, and it is expected that the show this year will be a much greater success than any which have ever been held before. The committee in charge of the show, consisting of C. C. Currin, C. H. Boyd and S. W. Rogers, has nearly completed all arrangements. All women who wish to exhibit at the show are requested to leave their names with the committee.

At a recent meeting of the St. Johns volunteer fire department it was decided that the Fourth of July celebration should be held two days, the fourth and fifth. It was at first thought that this would be impossible, but so many features have been decided upon, and so much financial encouragement has been given by the citizens that the two day celebration is assured. The members started out to raise \$1000 but that amount has now been passed, and it is expected that nearly \$1500 will be donated. Every form of athletic exercises and sport will be held and substantial cash prizes will be given for all events.

P. G. Gilmore, chairman of the celebration committee, announced today that all people who wished to secure concessions should apply to him immediately. The members are now planning to hold a goddess of liberty contest, but definite plans have not yet been formulated. Mr. Gilmore stated that definite announcement would probably be made within a short time.

COMMENCEMENT HELD IN FAIRVIEW SCHOOL

Fairview, Or., May 31.—The commencement exercises for the local public school were held Wednesday evening in the city hall. Harold Robinson was the only graduate, but the exercises were good, and the hall was filled with an appreciative audience of local people.
