Uniformed Force, 86 Strong, Will Meet All Incoming Delegations at Depot and Escort Them to Quarters.

The Royal Rosarians will have an important part in the ceremonies and activities of the Rose Festival week.

VON KLEIN CONSENTS TO EMPLOY LAWYERS

Von Klein is still in the county jail, having been unable to procure \$5000 bonds for his liberty. Ethel Newcomb is scheduled to arrive in Portland from Chicago this evening, thereby making the preliminary hearing for Von Klein Monday morning in the municipal court.

Von Klein was returned to Portland May 31 from Chicago, where he made a six weeks' fight against extradition. Upon his arrival and ever since he has stated that he would be his own lawyer, but friends joined in procuring counsel. He is accused of marrying Miss Newcomb in Los Angeles under the name of George B. Lewis, bringing her to Portland, where he deserted her October 21, taking \$3500 worth of diamonds.

INGER TO TRY FOR PACIFIC COAST RECORD

If conditions are favorable, Ed Unger, balloonist, and owner of the balloon "California," which under charter by The Journal, made a successful flight Friday, will make an effort to break the Pacific Coast endurance record of 150 miles next Wednesday afternoon.

Unger is casting about for passengers to accompany him on this trip, in addition to The Journal correspondent.

Under present plans, provisions will be carried for more than two days and, barring accidents, the balloon will remain in the air at least 15 hours. An effort will be made to land in eastern Oregon or Western Idaho. If it is

possible, the balloon will take a course directly up the channel of the Columbia river.

"No one need fear a trip in a gas balloon," said Unger yesterday, "for there have never been but two deaths from an accident with a gas balloon and that was to men who went up while drunk and who did not understand how to manage the balloon. It can be controlled just as easy as an automobile, and there is far less danger of a collision, for there are not many people traveling the same route you do."

The trip made last Thursday by Unger and three others was a success in every detail. The balloon was in the air nearly four hours and travelled more than 60 miles, which was a short

distance, however. This was due to an unusual lack of wind.

The landing was effected near La Center, Wash., in Stevens county. Its sudden appearance in that vicinity without being heralded created a flurry of excitement throughout the entire neighborhood, and many persons for the first time in their life saw a real balloon, and in addition to that, helped it make a landing.

Applications for passage in the big balloon that will sail next Wednesday on this cross country record seeking trip, will be received by Ed Unger, care of The Journal, up to Wednesday morning. The "out-ward" will occur promptly at 2 o'clock at East Seventh and East Taylor streets where Unger has a captive balloon in operation.

START TO SWAT WEED PEST EARLY

Drastic Ordinance Probably Will Be Passed by Council This Week.

An effective weapon for the annual combat against weeds will be placed in the hands of the executive authorities of Portland if the city council this week passes a drastic ordinance which has been prepared by City Attorney Frank S. Grant, and will be submitted to the council next Wednesday.

Under existing ordinances the police have been powerless to compel non-residents to clean up vacant lots. The new ordinance provides that the city engineer shall post a notice on all property on which weeds or other vegetable nuisances are permitted, and that if the law is not complied with inside of five days after the posting of such notices a lien against the property is automatically effected. The proposed ordinance also provides for the removal of earth, rock or other debris from the sidewalks.

"If the owner or owners," reads the ordinance, "for agent or agents of such owner or owners, or other person in possession of any such lot, part thereof or of parcel of land shall neglect or refuse to cut all weeds, grass, vines, bushes, plants, shrubs or trees upon such property, except such as are grown for use or ornament, or for food, or for the making of fuel, or for manure or for fuel, or to remove any earth, rock or other debris from the sidewalk abutting upon such property within five days from the date of posting said notice, the city engineer shall cut said weeds, grass, vines, bushes, plants, shrubs or trees from such sidewalk, rock or other debris from such sidewalk, as the case may be, and keep an accurate account of the cost of the labor in performing such work upon or in front of each lot, lot, part thereof or parcel of land, and shall report monthly to the executive board, or to labor and a deputy of the lot, lot, part thereof or parcel of land such labor was performed upon or in front of."

"The executive board, or its successor in office, shall inspect the reports of cost of labor in cutting said weeds, grass, vines, bushes, plants, shrubs or trees upon any such property, or to remove the earth, rock or other debris from the sidewalk abutting upon such property, performed by the city engineer, and if it deems the same to be reasonable, it shall approve said reports and transmit them to the council."

"The council shall, at least once each year, by ordinance, assess upon each of the lots or parts thereof, or parcels of land upon which such labor has been performed, the cost of performing such labor as approved by the executive board, or its successor in office, and the same shall be entered on the docket of city liens and collected in the same manner as is provided for special assessments for street improvements."

Will Make Speeches.

'EASTERNER,' MUCH SOUGHT BY BANKER THOMPSON, SOUGHT

Roy Shelton, Alleged Principal in Pendleton Transaction, Is Caught at Union, Or., and Held Under \$2500 Bonds.

Pendleton, Or., June 7.—Roy Shelton, the "mysterious Easterner," who is alleged to have been the tool by which W. L. Thompson, president of the American National bank, was made the victim of an alleged bunco game by Henry T. Hill of La Grande and James Johns of this city, has been found and is now occupying space in the county jail. He was given a preliminary hearing this morning in the justice court on a charge of obtaining money under false pretenses and was held under \$2500 bonds.

Shelton was arrested at Union and was brought back here this morning by Sheriff Taylor. It is said he is a farmhand who has been in the employ of Hill's partner. It is further said that prior to the commencement of suit by Mr. Thompson, he fled to Canada and recently returned for his wife and was then arrested.

Thompson alleges in the complaint of his \$15,000 damage suit, filed several weeks ago, that Shelton was represented to him as an Easterner, willing to purchase a farm in Washington for \$8000 and which Hill wished to trade for Thompson's stock in the Hartman Abstract company, of which Johns is president. The deal was made and the "Easterner" paid \$1000 to bind the deal. Subsequently, it is alleged, the land was found to be worth only \$500. Thompson maintains that Shelton was a tool for Hill and Johns.

**AMUSEMENT PARK TO
DISPLAY FIREWORKS**

Two elaborate fireworks displays at the Oaks amusement park are scheduled on the official program for Monday and Friday nights as being part of the stellar attractions of the Rose Festival.

The display Friday will be in honor of Rex Oregonus and his court, who will sit in official royal boxes to watch the pyrotechnics. They will be conveyed to the Oaks in the private car of B. S. Josselyn, president of the Portland Railway, Light & Power company.

Another unusual feature of the festival program at the Oaks will be a performance Saturday night, which will begin at 10 o'clock, immediately after the electric parade.

Both Monday and Friday several hundred rockets will be fired. Friday night the arrival of the King will be greeted with a royal salute of 21 bombs, hurled sky high.

CONGRESS TO BE TOLD NOT TO CHANGE BILL

Members of congress interested in currency legislation have advised the president and Secretary McAdoo that any plan of currency reform must be presented in prepared form and must not be left open to amendment or change in either house or senate. The bill as it comes from the White House will be the law.

**PARIS GIVES RECEPTION
TO ADMIRAL PEARY**

Paris, June 7.—Rear Admiral Robert E. Peary was accorded a remarkable reception here tonight when he was escorted through the Champs Elysees with American Ambassador Myron T. Herrick to the office of the newspaper Excelsior. Peary was the guest of honor at a reception tendered by the paper. Flags of France and the United States were arranged about the excelsior buildings, bands playing patriotic airs of both countries, while thousands cheered the Arctic explorer.

GOVERNORS VOTE FOR LIBERALITY IN PUBLIC RESERVES

Western Executives Want a More Liberal Policy in Administration of Government Lands; Carey President.

Salt Lake City, Utah, June 7.—When the national conference of governors meets in Colorado Springs next August, it will be asked by the western governors to go on record against the conservation policy pursued by the last three national administrations.

This was made certain this afternoon when the western conference officers, at its closing session declared for a more liberal administration of the public lands by the national government. Some of the governors believe that more of the land now in the forest reserves should be thrown open to settlers. This is in line with the policy advocated by Governor Ammons of Colorado.

Governor Joseph M. Carey, of Wyoming, was elected president of the conference for the ensuing year, and Governor Ammons was named chairman. The next conference will meet in Denver next year.

PRESS CLUB MEN TO TAKE AUTO RIDE

At 9:30 o'clock this morning about 25 autos will leave the Portland Press club's quarters for St. Helena. The auto excursion is upon invitation of W. C. Garbe, secretary treasurer of the Oregon Motor car company, and at St. Helena the crowd will be entertained by the St. Helena Commercial club at luncheon.

As the Press club has some 700 members, counting active, associate and life members, it was impossible to make the invitation general, and so it was confined to the active list, which contains about 150 names. A large number of these have signified their intention to join the excursion this morning.

The road to St. Helena is reported in excellent condition practically the entire distance, and it is expected to make the run in an hour and 15 minutes. At St. Helena the pencil pushers will be shown a number of important industries developed from a very small beginning within the past two or three years, including a couple of sawmills, a ship-building plant and a croqueting plant that bids fair to soon become the largest on the western coast.

"AMERICAN ANGEL" OF MEXICO BACK IN UNITED STATES

Wife of Ambassador Wilson Denies That She or Her Husband Knew of the Impending Death of Madero.

New York, June 7.—Mrs. Alice Wilson, wife of Henry Lane Wilson, United States Ambassador to Mexico, arrived today to spend a month or six weeks with her three sons.

After husband, she says, was on the verge of a breakdown just before the revolution and it was only his nerve that enabled him to perform his duties during the bombardment and the reign of terror in Mexico City.

Mr. Wilson has so far received no notification from Secretary of State Bryan as to whether he will be appointed, or how much longer he is required to stay in Mexico, she says. The present government of Mexico is still awaiting recognition by the United States.

When Mrs. Wilson was told that the Madero family here practically accused the ambassador as being the cause of President Madero's death, she replied: "Ridiculous. My husband and I felt keenly for Madero and I visited her to see what I could do for her before her husband's death. She seemed thankful then, she is regarded in Mexico as a very ambitious woman and her power is felt there at the present time."

"It is suspected that she is supplying the funds for the continuance of the revolution of Carranza. She has no intention of remaining an exile."

Mrs. Wilson, by her acts of kindness and sympathy to the refugees in the height of the revolution was called the "American angel." She converted the American embassy into a refuge and no one was turned away. She is a modest woman and disclaimed the subject with "I did what all other American women would do under the circumstances."

She was met at the pier by her sister, Mrs. C. B. Verhee, who came from Philadelphia. Mrs. Wilson is going to meet her son in Exeter and then go to her father's home in Indianapolis, where her other sons, one from Cornell and one from a Chicago law school, will join her.
