Mr. Coffey attended the hearing of the telephone inquiry before the public service commission of Washington, which was held in Seattle. The results of the inquiry are now being considered by the commission. From Seattle he went to Walla Walla where he was subpoenaed as a witness in the trial of Harry Raymond for perjury. Raymond was convicted. In a trial for burglary he had declared he had never served time in Portland. Mr. Coffey took records which proved he had been in the county jail here for a year for robbing the house of Julius Pincus. Joe Hoyle, a deputy under ex-Sheriff Stevens, who was stationed at the rockpile, was also a witness and identified him as having been at Kelly Butte for a year. Raymond went under the name of Kilmann in Walla Walla.

He was to have appeared before Judge Jones Saturday morning when the bail was to have been raised to a much larger amount. When he did not appear a search was started but it was learned that he had left Portland. An order of arrest has been issued by Judge Jones.

IN EARLIER DAYS

"When we were away from our base of supplies," said Captain William Gadsby, in speaking of his experiences in the British army in India, "it was often difficult to secure rations for the men and forage for the horses. The natives of India have implicit confidence in the English government because at all times it tries to keep faith with them."

"It was my duty while sergeant in the commissary department, to secure supplies for the troops. I would frequently take an escort and go out into the native villages and purchase cattle, sheep, goats, forage and other supplies. In payment for these supplies I would give each native from whom I secured material, a receipt for the goods with a statement of the price at which it was purchased. These they knew were redeemable in cash when presented at Bombay."

"Occasionally there would be an excellent linguist among the troopers, who could talk Hindustani or other native dialects. He would get on to the system and would go out among the natives, purchase half a dozen ducks or chickens or get a lamb and sneak it into camp for his messmates. Months afterwards I would find it in the receipt from Ghinga, Dun or whoever the native happened to be—of six chickens and one lamb. Kindly charge the same to the account of Tommy Atkins and pay the bearer whatever you think they are worth."

"The natives would take these in good faith, supposing that Tommy Atkins was a member of the commissary department and was authorized to contract debts for the British government. Months later when these fictitious 'Tommy Atkins' orders would turn up the government would make good to the natives rather than have them lose their faith in the white men and at some future time refuse to issue supplies to authorized representatives of the commissary department."

"During the Afghan campaign, a chum of mine, a sergeant named Floyd, and myself happened to see a little dust away from the beaten line of travel one day."

"That must be a camel train," said Floyd. "Rather queer what the beggars are doing off the regular trail. What do you say we go out and see what it is?"

"Having nothing else on hand, I very willingly agreed. We saddled our horses, strapped on our guns and rode out across the desert. We found that it was a camel train in charge of some merchants. Being in the commissary department I was always interested in good stock and equipment. The camels were fat and large and in comparison with our thin and worn animals they looked mighty good to me."

"Where did you get your fine camels?" I asked him. "Sentry I looked them all over and found they were all government camels. I pointed to the brands and said, 'How about the brands? What are you doing with government camels?'"

"The spokesman of the merchants said, 'These camels were worn and sick. They were condemned and we bought them at a sale of government stores.'"

"What have you in your packs?" Floyd asked. "They took from the top of several of their packs some Persian rugs and said, 'We are merchants. Our packs consist of rugs.'"

"I was greatly interested in the camel saddles. The pads were so large that my attention was attracted to them. I wondered what they were padded with, whether it was excelsior or hair, or what it was. Taking my knife I poked the blade into one of the saddle pads, and to my surprise I heard the chink of metal. I told Floyd and he said, 'There is something suspicious about this whole proposition. I believe we had better take them into camp.'"

"The merchants were getting very nervous. They told us not to interfere with their packs. They began muttering among themselves and I thought as if we were in for a nasty time. Floyd said, 'I will hold them off with my gun. You see what is in those packs.' He told them that the first man that interfered with me he would shoot and he would keep shooting with both guns until they were empty. He was one of the most fearless men that I have ever seen in all my army experience. I have seen him with a heavy short handed sword in a nasty fight sever a man's head with one stroke."

"I unpacked several of the camels and found under the rugs the coatsleeves of officers and pants legs of soldiers all bloody and hacked and tied around each end of the sleeve or pants leg would be a stout cord. Half of the coatsleeves I found they were filled with rupees. 'I'll tell you just what this is,' said Floyd. 'These fellows have waylaid the paymaster, killed the escort and stolen the money. It wouldn't be a very hard job to kill the bunch, for they certainly deserve it, hide the money and come back here later and get it.'"

"Yes, or we could let them go if they would give us a couple of camel loads of silver—however, we are not going to do any such thing. We are going to take them in with us and give them up. This proved, however, a harder job than we had anticipated. They knew what they would get if they were brought in. Floyd said, 'I'll stay here and keep them covered. The first man that budges I will shoot and I will keep shooting as long as any of them wiggle. You ride in as hard as you can, bring out some of the boys and we will take them into camp.'"

"I didn't know what minute they would start trouble, so I didn't waste any time getting in. We were back as fast as our horses could come and took them into camp. They were tired that afternoon and the whole bunch shot that night."

"The captain of the company who sent the troopers out to bring them in was mentioned for distinguished service and given a special reward of 10,000 rupees and our names were carefully kept out of the affair, the officer being afraid that if our names were mentioned in connection with it part of the reward would go to us."

FISH RECIPES

Trout, Friars.

Scales and clean a large trout, place in a saucepan, and pour over it a cup of boiling vinegar, which will have the effect of turning the trout blue, and an equal quantity of white wine. If necessary to cover the trout add sufficient water to do so. Add an onion stuck with cloves, a carrot, half a bunch of celery, a few bay leaves, a small bunch of parsley, half a teaspoonful of peppercorns, and salt to suit the taste, and boil over the fire for about 15 minutes, having the cover on the sauce pan. When done, remove and drain the fish, place on a folded napkin, spread on a dish, garnish with parsley, and serve with oil and vinegar or any favorite fish sauce in a sauceboat.

Flounder, Brussels.
 Clean and skin a flounder, sprinkle both sides with pepper and salt, and squeeze over a small quantity of lemon

juice. Dip the fish in warmed butter, cover well with finely grated bread-crumbs, place on a gridiron, and broil over a clear fire, turning to brown both sides equally. Bona an anchovy, put the fish into a mortar with a small lump of butter, and pound it, then place it in a small saucepan with a wineglass full of white wine and the strained juice of half a lemon, and stir over the fire for a few minutes. When cooled place the flounder on a hot dish, pour the anchovy sauce over it, and serve.

Baked Cod, Savoy.
 Prepare a fresh cod by tying up the head with a string and filling the inside with butter in which has been mixed two tablespoonfuls of chopped parsley to the quarter of a pound, a little salt and pepper, and the juice of two lemons. Put the fish, belly downward, on a buttered drain in a fish kettle and pour over a mixture made as follows: Melt half a pound of butter in a saucepan, add a pint of chopped mushrooms, a blanched and chopped shallot, a tablespoonful of chopped parsley, the juice of a lemon, and a crushed clove of garlic, all of these being partly cooked before being used. Season to taste. Now pour in a pint of white wine and bring the whole quickly to a boil, and allow to cook gently for an hour and a half, basting the fish every ten minutes with the liquor. When the flesh is firm put the fish on a dish, pour over half the sauce and put the rest in a sauceboat. This may be accompanied also by any other favorite fish sauce.

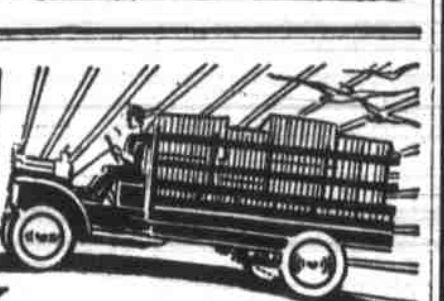
