

M'NEILL "RUNS OUT" AGAIN RATHER THAN FACE WALT WILLIAMS

Matchmakers in Future Will Probably Shy From Adding Bantam to Club Cards.

Allen McNeill killed the boxing smoker last night in the Bungalow theatre and clouded the record of the Brooklyn club by failing to appear for his bout with Walter Williams. This was to have been the feature card of the evening. Whether it was a red blister on McNeill's arm or a yellow streak in his neck that caused his defection is open to argument. Yesterday morning McNeill's trainer said he was in splendid shape and would surely go on against Williams. The matchmaker asserts that he took McNeill to a physician and that the latter said he was alright, and that the sunburn received from canoeing would not affect his work in the ring. Just before the bouts started McNeill showed up at the theatre with a card from another physician stating that he was physically unfit to go on.

This makes the third time that McNeill has run out of matches with Williams and the fourth, if the fact that he failed to enter the city championships, can be counted. Williams was the only other entry in the 115 pound class. It looks on the surface pretty much as if McNeill was afraid to meet Williams.

McNeill is in so badly with the fans and the amateur clubs from his several runouts that it is unlikely that he will ever be carded again as a feature. The matchmakers will doubtless refuse to endanger the standing of their club by staging him.

McNeill is a terrific fighter and it is problematical whether Williams could beat him.

The first bout of the evening resulted in a victory for Allen of the Columbus club in three rounds. Dix of Vancouver was his much lighter opponent. The decision of the judges in calling an extra round in the Driscoll-Boatright bout did not meet with the approval of the fans. Driscoll had the better of the go at the end of the third round, but in the fourth he was shaded.

Hunter of Vancouver, who possesses nothing but a terrific right swing, lasted about four minutes with Earl Miebus of Multnomah. Miebus' cleverness in sidestepping Hunter's swings and countering with a straight left was too much for the soldier.

Groat of Columbus club beat Mahoney, unattached, in a three round affair. Monpere of Multnomah sent Santo to the mat in about 15 seconds. An uppercut did the work. Santo's head hit the floor, and he was not properly padded, and he was unable to continue.

Kelly of Vancouver couldn't stand up before the clever Gruman of the Columbus club, and was counted out in the second. The clever Columbus club boy got away from every one of Kelly's rushes and neatly jabbed him with a left, that made Kelly quit. The bell saved him from a knockout in the first round.

Walter Knowlton, Allen McNeill, Lyle Calhoun, Myers and Masurski, all carded to appear, were not to be seen around the building. McNeill was around the building early in the evening but disappeared.

Walter Williams boxed a fast three round exhibition with Leonard Powers, after being presented the medal that McNeill ran away from.

The work of the referee in the first bout was not satisfactory, according to the crowd, and his place was taken by Dudley Evans, manager of the Pendleton Athletic club, who filled the bill perfectly. A. Sieberts and J. Lonergan were the judges.

TRACK RECORDS WILL FALL TOMORROW WITH ANY KIND OF FOOTING

Multnomah Field to Be Scene of Biggest Gathering of Athletes in P. N. A. History.

The banner track and field meet of the 1913 season will be staged tomorrow afternoon on Multnomah field. Eighty-five athletes, all in the best of condition, will vie for the Pacific Northwest championships. The first event will start promptly at 2 o'clock.

The prospect of good weather is not very bright, according to the daily report issued by the weather bureau this morning. The rains of last night did not make the track very soggy and if it clears up tomorrow morning the track will be in good condition.

The Multnomah team is counted on as sure first place winner. The Seattle Athletic club will likely finish second and the Vancouver, B. C., club, O. A. C., and University of Oregon teams will fight it out for third place.

P. N. A. Marks May Go. A number of the present P. N. A. records will be bettered if the daily report issued by the weather bureau as well as break the shot mark. The Juvenile record will also go by the boards and the pole vault record should be easily bettered.

Another event of the meet, which will attract a great deal of attention is the mile relay event. This event will likely be won by the Seattle Athletic club team, which has a very strong bunch of sprinters in line.

Competition in the dashes will be very close, four of the crack sprinters of the northwest being entered in the meet. Close races are also expected in the middle distance runs.

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SEATTLE "PORK AND" STAYS WITH F. WELSH

Britisher Can't Put Third Rater Out in 15 Rounds at Vancouver.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Vancouver, B. C., June 12.—Outpointing his opponent throughout and showing great cleverness in the infighting, Freddie Welsh won the decision over Ray Campbell, of Seattle, last night at the Brighouse arena over the 15 round route.

Welsh was easily the master, landing half a dozen blows to the other's one, but Campbell evinced a gameness that had scarcely been looked for in a comparatively inexperienced boxer. In the first few rounds the Seattle boy about held his own in the out-fighting, but as the contest continued, Welsh steadily assumed the leadership, out-pointing his adversary not only in the tricky boxing in the clinches, but also with more distant exchanges.

The British champion landed many stiff left hand jabs as the preliminary to a series of body blows that made Campbell wince, and it redounds to the youngster's credit that he stayed the 15 rounds. Eddie Moy, Welsh's sparring partner, beat Percy Cove, the human toothpick, in six rounds. Moy was about 15 pounds the heavier.
