

DISTRIBUTORS NAME THREE GRADES FOR APPLES OF THE N. W.

North Pacific Association Will Pack
Extra Fancy, Fancy and "C"
Grades This Season; Stringent
Rules to Be Enforced This Year.

Apple Grades Conflict.
Two distinct grades of apples
will be used in the Pacific north-
west this season and will likely
cause some confusion among the
trade. The North Pacific Dis-
tributors have just named extra
fancy, fancy and "C" grades,
while the Northwestern Fruit
Exchange some time ago made
three grades, naming them No.
1, No. 2 and No. 3, respectively.

Hood River, Or., June 12.—The new
grading rules to be placed in effect by
the North Pacific Fruit Distributors' as-
sociation in the state of Oregon, Wash-
ington, Idaho and Montana, for the pres-
ent season as applied to the apple crop,
are as follows:

Extra fancy grade shall consist of
sound, smooth, matured, clean, hand
picked, well formed apples only; free
from all insect pests, disease, blemishes,
bruises and other physical injuries;
stings, scald, sun scald, dry or
rotten, worm, worm holes, decay,
spray burns, limb rub, water core, skin
puncture, or skin broken at stem. All
apples must be of good matured color,
shape and condition characteristic of
the variety. The following varieties de-
fined as to color shall be admitted to
this grade:

Solid red varieties—Aiken Red, Arkan-
sas Black, Black Ben Davis, Fall Wine,
Gano, Jenton, Jonathan, King David,
Mammoth Black Twig, Missouri Pippin,
Oregon Red, Spitzbergen (Esopus),
Steele Red, Vanderpool Winesap.

Striped or partial red varieties—Ben
Davis, Delicious, Gravenstein, Hub-
bard, Nonesuch, Jeffries, King of Tom-
pkins Co., McIntosh Red, Northern Spy,
Rome Beauty, Stayton, Snow, Wagener,
Wealthy, York Imperial.

The color requirements for extra fancy
are as follows: Solid red varieties to
have not less than three-fourths good
red color, and the size of 1 1/2 and smaller
when admitted to this grade to have at
least 90 per cent good red color.

Striped or partial red varieties as de-
signed above to have not less than one-
half good red color and when the size of
1 1/2 or smaller is admitted to this
grade they must have at least one-
fourth good red color except that Graven-
stein, Jeffries and King of Tompkins
County in all sizes must be at least one-
third good red color. Red checked or
blushed varieties such as Hayes King,
Red Cheek Pippin, Winter Banana,
Maiden Blush, must have a red check-
Orley must be white, yellow or waxen.

Yellow or green varieties such as
Grimes Golden, White Winter Permain,
Yellow Newtown and Cox's Orange Pippin
must have the characteristic color
of the variety. All boxes must be lined
and cardboard must be used on top and
bottom, and no boxes admitted to this
grade smaller than the following: Aiken
Red, 200; Arkansas Black, 175; Ben Da-
vis, 145; Black Ben Davis, 145; Cox's
Orange Pippin, 165; Delicious, 150; Fall
Wine, 200; Gano, 165; Grimes Golden,
200; Gravenstein, 200; Hubbard, 165;
Jeffries, 150; Hayes King, 150; Jenton,
200; Jonathan, 200; Jeffries, 225; King
of Tompkins County, 165; King David,
200; Mammoth Black Twig, 150; Mis-
souri Pippin, 200; McIntosh Red, 200;
Maiden Blush, 165; Northern Spy, 150;
Oregon Red, 175; Orley, 175; Rome
Beauty, 165; Red Cheek Pippin, 165;
Spitzbergen (Esopus), 200; Steele Red,
165; Stayton, 165; Snow, 225; Vander-
pool, 165; Winesap, 200; Wagener, 200;
Winter Banana, 150; White Winter Per-
main, 200; Wealthy, 200; Yellow New-
town, 225; York Imperial, 165.

In the fancy grade, all apples must
be matured, hand picked, clean and
sound, free from insect pests, water core,
sun damage, broken skin, dry or rotten,
bitter rot, worm, worm holes, infec-
tious disease and all other defects equal-
ly detrimental, excepting that slight
limb rub or limb scratch or rubbing
setting will be permitted provided that
no apple shall show total blemishes ag-
gregating more than one-half inch
square. Fruit clearing mishap, bruised
or bearing evidence of rough
handling shall not be permitted in this
grade. All grades of varieties admitted
to this grade are the same as in the extra
fancy. Solid red varieties must have
fully one-third of good solid red color.
Striped or partial red varieties must
have at least one-fourth good red color.
Red checked or blushed varieties must
have correct physical qualities with
tintage of color. The following sizes are
admitted to this grade: Aiken Red, 200;
Fall Wine, 200; Grimes Golden, 200;
Gravenstein, 200; Hubbard, 165;
Jeffries, 150; Jenton, 200; Jonathan, 200;
King David, 200; King of Tompkins
County, 165; King, 200; Mammoth Black
Twig, 150; Missouri Pippin, 200;
Maiden Blush, 165; Northern Spy, 150;
Oregon Red, 175; Orley, 175; Rome
Beauty, 165; Red Cheek Pippin, 165;
Spitzbergen (Esopus), 200; Steele Red,
165; Stayton, 165; Snow, 225; Vander-
pool, 165; Winesap, 200; Wagener, 200;
Winter Banana, 150; White Winter Per-
main, 200; Wealthy, 200; Yellow New-
town, 225; York Imperial, 165.

The following apples to be packed in
one grade combining the extra fancy and
the fancy grades as provided by the
grading rules, size not smaller than 1 1/2
count, windfalls absolutely excluded.
This pack to be marked and labeled as
fancy. Apples of Commercial, Barwin,
Ben Hur, Bismark, Canada Red, Chi-
cago, Champion, Delaware Red, Golden
Russet, Hoover, Ingram, Kalin Spitzber-
g, Kentish, Kinnard, Mann, Mother,
McMahon, N. W. Greening, Pawaukee,
Pryor Red, Rambo, R. I. Red, R. Rus-
set, Russian Red, Sauer, Shakerford,
Senator, Stark, Swart, Wallbridge West-
field, Willow Twig and Yellow Bell-
flower. Exceptions: Summer varieties
such as Astrachan, Beauty Sweet, Beil-
inghimer, Duchess, Early Harvest, Red
June, Strawberry, 20 ounce Pippin, Yellow
Transparent and kindred varieties
not otherwise checked in these rules,
together with early fall varieties, shall
be packed in accordance with grading
rules covering the fancy grade and to de-
fects but regardless of color rules, size
not smaller than 1 1/2 for the larger var-
ieties and 2 1/2 count for the smaller
growing varieties. Windfalls to be ab-
solutely excluded.

"C" grade is provided to be used when
the market requires it. It shall consist
of apples not smaller than 1 1/2 count.
This grade shall be made up

of all merchantable apples not included
in the extra fancy or fancy grades. Ap-
ples must be free from all insect pests,
worms, worm holes and infectious dis-
ease, serious physical injury, skin punc-
ture, bruised or broken skin will not
be permitted and not exceeding two
stings thoroughly healed. There are no
requirements as to color except that the
fruit must be matured and packed in ac-
cordance with trade requirements.

The executive board advises the use
of the regular northwestern standard ap-
ple box in all sections, inside measure-
ments 10 1/2 x 11 1/2 x 18 inches with solid
ends. The system of designating fruit
by tiers will be abolished and numerical
count substituted.

The following apple counts for the ap-
ple pack have been endorsed: 36, 45,
48, 56, 64, 72, 80, 88, 96, 104, 112, 113,
125, 128, 150, 163, 175, 188, 200, 213, 225.
One grade of crab apples will be made
which must be free from pests, etc. Lady
apples will be packed in half boxes and
must be free from pests, etc.

Equally stringent rules have been
adopted and will be applied to the grad-
ing and packing of pears, peaches, can-
talonpeas, plums and all other varieties
of fruit that will be handled by the
Distributors' association.

President H. F. Davidson stated that
the aim of the association would be to
bring the consumer the very best fruit
for the least possible money consistent
with the labor and effort of production.

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184 NEW LAWS GO INTO EFFECT IN WASHINGTON

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Seattle, Wash., June 12.—The moth-
ers' pension law, the lady husband act,
to make "loafing" spouses work for the
county to support their wives; the Iowa
redlight law, the prohibition of false
advertising, the abolition of trading
stamps and coupons with sales, the abo-
lition of capital punishment, the initia-
tive, referendum and recall (except for
judges)—these and other laws to the
number of 184 go into effect today.

About 150 of the new laws are appro-
priation measures. Under the moth-
ers' pension law, indigent mothers are
to get \$15 per month where there is but
one child, and \$20 more for each addi-
tional child. Under the "lady husband"
act, loafing husbands will be made to
work for the county and their wages,
not to exceed \$15.00 per day, will go to
their families.

Under the new law Governor Lister
will appoint a state industrial welfare
commission, which is to regulate the
conditions of labor and fix minimum
wages for women.

Muir Woods Tavern
