

### KING AFRAID TO GIVE LAWN PARTY

#### George Cancels Invitations for Fete That Had Been Arranged; Suffragettes.

(United Press Leased Wire.) London, June 12.—Fear of suffragette violence today caused King George to cancel arrangements for a garden party planned for Windsor Castle June 21. The invitations were all ready to mail when, it is semi-officially admitted, they were cancelled by the king's personal order.

So rigid are the precautions taken by the authorities at Windsor Castle against the possibility of suffragette outrages that the gatekeepers are instructed to refuse admission even to the grounds of women wearing W. S. P. U. insignia of any sort. The building itself, portions of which formerly were open to the public, has been closed to both men and women for months.

The rule proscribing suffragette insignia, which has been in effect only a few days, disclosed the fact that the wife of a member of the royal household, who resides within the castle, is a member of the militant organization. Very unobtrusively she had been wearing a tiny W. S. P. U. button, and it had escaped attention until one of the guards happened to notice it as she was returning from a walk. She was promptly held up and informed that she could not enter. In response to her indignant protest the guard told her that according to royal command she would have to remain outside unless she removed the objectionable badge.

"This is preposterous," certainly she declared. Thereupon the guard sent for her husband and explained the situation, with proper expressions of regret that he could make no exception to the rule. Still the lady declined to divest herself of the token of her allegiance to the "cause," but after considerable argument she allowed her husband to remove it, whereupon she was permitted to enter.

### MOB HANGS, SHOOTS, AND BURNS NEGRO

(United Press Leased Wire.) Oklahoma City, June 13.—Hanged to a cottonwood tree, his body riddled with bullets and then saturated with kerosene and burned, was the fate of Bennie Simmons, a negro, at Anadarko today. Simmons was accused of the murder of Susie Church, aged 16, at Cogar. A mob stoned the Anadarko jail and carried Simmons to the outskirts of the town, where he was strung up.

### JACK ADAMS SENTENCED TO HANG ON JULY 18

(Special to The Journal.) Astoria, Or., June 13.—"Hang by the neck until dead." Jack Adams, convicted of the murder of Barney Chamberlain on the evening of February 17, complacently heard these words yesterday afternoon in the circuit court room and a few minutes later calmly filled his pipe and began smoking.

The date of the execution has been set for July 18, and Adams was taken to Salem today by Sheriff Burns. It is said his attorneys will now make an effort to have the sentence commuted to life imprisonment.

The crime was committed 'on the evening of February 17, 1912, at the home of the Adams family on Eleventh street about 9 o'clock, but she was not at home. Barney Chamberlain, who had been staying at the Adams home, opened the door and without further ceremony Adams emptied a revolver at him, two of the bullets taking effect, the man dying instantly.

### Boy Is Shot in Hip.

(Special to The Journal.) Forest Grove, Or., June 13.—Archie Olsen, 15-year-old son of Mrs. K. L. Olsen, a widow, living in this city, was seriously wounded last night when a revolver shot struck him in the hip. It is said the youth was fooling with the weapon when it was accidentally discharged. The attending physician says the boy will recover should not complications set in. He is a student at the grammar academy in this city, and is his mother's only child.

### WIDOWS' PENSIONS GRANTED TO NINE

Nine pensions were granted to widows by Circuit Judge Gatens yesterday, the first under the new widows' pension law. All were found to be deserving cases in which immediate relief was necessary. The pensions will total \$270 a month. One had one child, one had two children two had three, three had four, and two had six children. For one child \$19 will be allowed and for each additional child \$7.50, making the sum of \$119 a month for the woman with six children.

The pensions will not be payable until July 15, and after that will be paid on the 15th of each month. For those who are now in need, credit will be arranged until the payments can be made. Applicants who appeared before the law went into effect and were told to return later will receive pensions from June 2, when the law took effect. Others will have their pensions dated from the day of their applications. All who are receiving aid from the county board of relief at present will lose that aid as soon as they are granted pensions.

To noon today 93 applications for pensions had been made. Of these two have already been turned down because the cases do not come within the law. Ten others are being investigated by the case committee and these will probably be acted upon by Judge Gatens next Tuesday afternoon. The remaining cases are being investigated by members of the staff of the juvenile court for the first reports.

### WOULD GIVE FIREMEN DAY OFF IN EVERY 5

By unanimous vote of the fire committee of the city executive board yesterday afternoon it was decided to give Portland firemen one day off duty in every five. Heretofore the firemen have had one day off in eight. As the board will undoubtedly confirm the action of the committee, local fire fighters can now boast of being treated as well as those of any city in the United States. Under Mayor Bushlight nearly a dozen modern fire stations have been completed and several more are in process of construction. Besides the new stations, all the old ones have been remodeled and made comfortable and sanitary for the occupants. In honoring the mayor's efforts on behalf of firemen, the people of the city at the commission election adopted a charter amendment providing for a pension fund for families of firemen killed in the performance of duty.

### SEALER OF MEASURES OPENS OFFICE AT SALEM

(Salem Bureau of The Journal.) Salem, Or., June 13.—P. C. Buchtel of Portland, the recently appointed deputy state sealer of weights and measures, is here opening his office in the state house. As soon as the instruments of his office, which have been sent to Washington, D. C. for testing, returned he will be ready for business.

The law enacted at the last legislature putting into operation the law providing for the inspection of weights and measures provides that county courts shall appoint local deputy sealers of weights and measures who will cooperate with the state deputy in enforcing the law. It is also necessary for the county to provide the equipment for making the tests in the county.

State Treasurer Kay, who is the official state sealer of weights and measures, says the work of the county deputies will require only one or two months of their time.

### 46 HEAD SHIPPED, 54 HEAD UNLOADED

#### Cars of Blooded Cattle Sent to Grants Pass Illustrate "Pigs Is Pigs."

(Special to The Journal.) Grants Pass, Or., June 13.—Two carloads, embracing 46 head of blooded Holstein and Guernsey cattle, were received here yesterday by the Leonard Orchards company, the cattle having been purchased from breeders in Wisconsin, where they were selected by agents from the best herds in the eastern states. These cows are to form the nucleus for the dairy herd being established on the old Penn-Oregon ranch, now a part of the Leonard holdings. The cattle are all young, but will become milkers the present season, 10 of them having become mothers while en route from the east. Two of the new born calves met with misfortune, but eight of them arrived with their mothers in excellent condition, so that instead of the 46 head shipped two weeks ago, 54 were unloaded yesterday.

There is a great revival of the dairying industry here, this being the second shipment of blooded dairy stock to be received within the past few days, the first shipment having been of 13 head of Jerseys for Argonora, the ranch being developed by K. M. C. Reil on the Applegate. Other buyers are now out purchasing dairy stock, and nearly every farmer has added to his herd. A cooperative company has been formed for the construction of a new creamery to be called the Rogue Valley Creamery, at Grants Pass, and the contract for its construction has been let to A. J. Green. The creamery building will be 30x50 feet in size, and the equipment will be modern in every respect. The contract calls for its completion and equipment ready for operation by August 1.

### NEW PORTER DISAPPEARS FIRST DAY; \$200 MISSING
