

THOUSANDS WILL BE SAVED BY NEW MUNICIPAL CODE

City Is Too Large to Allow Its
Affairs to Run So Loosely,
Declares Mayor-Elect H. R.
Albee.

With a view of reducing the operation of the city departments to an absolute minimum, Mayor-elect Albee has authorized the New York Bureau of Municipal Research to compile a new administrative code. The bureau will have the work completed and ready for immediate application when the city commission takes over the reins of government July 1. The city will pay the bureau for the work.

Regarding the new code, Mayor-elect Albee said today:

"I consider the present manner of conducting the various departments of the administration as conducive to waste, and I anticipate that the new system, which will be installed after the commission takes charge, will save thousands of dollars annually and at the same time much to reduce the operation of the departments to an understandable, economical and efficient basis.

Too Big to Run Wild.

"The new code will affect every department in the city, as it is our intention to have the business of the city conducted in such a manner that a reason can be given for every act.

"I am informed that in one department alone we probably will be able to save not less than \$100,000. I feel that the employment of the bureau to arrange the system is money well spent, because it will provide us with the latest and most efficient systems of business. The city is too big to be run under the old go as you please way.

"Under the new code all purchases of departments will be made in an expert manner. Exact cost records of each department will be kept and disbursements will be made by an absolute system.

"The new code has for its object, among other things, stoppage of leakage that has heavily drained the city treasury. The lowest market prices will be taken advantage of and extravagance will not be allowed."

One Man Withdraws.

There is one wrinkle less across the forehead of Mr. Albee. Much to his relief the flood of applications for jobs has let up a little during the last 24 hours and instead of the hundreds of his stenographer will be able soon to see daylight above the stacks of job seekers' missives that have inundated his office since election.

But better still, one applicant for an office has withdrawn his bid. The mayor said he liked the spirit displayed by this particular man in withdrawing from the scramble, only that he regretted the fact that the applicant in question was a good man for the position sought.

"Just got down the fact that the noncompetents are still in the ring," said Mr. Albee. "The only man who has withdrawn his name was one worthy of consideration."

MINIATURE LOGGING CAMP IS FEATURE

A miniature logging camp with a full sized mess house in active operation was the feature of the monthly meeting and dinner of the Portland-Willamette valley lumbermen held last night in the Commercial club. All of the food served was served as it is in a full fledged lumber camp.

Of the logging camp, of course, the mess house was the big attraction. That in a logging camp is where the men gather for their meals and that is where the members gathered last night. Everything, even to the hand washbasin, seats, from hewn lumber, dishes and the "grab," was reproduced in this mess house.

Following the dinner short interesting talks were given by the various members. The idea of the reproduction of the logging camp was that of Wilson Clark, of the Clark-Wilson Lumber company, who presided at the meeting.

BRAKEMAN BURNED BY ELECTRIC WIRE

While trying to untangle a trolley wire that hooked over a box car at Twelfth and Salmon streets last night, Jacob Zook, 58 Simpson street, a brakeman for the S. P. & S. company, was severely burned and taken to the St. Vincent hospital. Zook was switching the car to another track, when it jumped from the rails and ran under the trolley wire. The electrical current soon set fire to the car. Zook climbed on the car to remove the wire.

The ambulance service company was called to take the man to the hospital. When the ambulance arrived, he was still unconscious. George Russell, the ambulance driver, removed the trolley wire from the box car. Zook is 28 years old and married.

FLEES HOSPITAL IN HIS NIGHT CLOTHES

William Gibson, alias William Amour, ran away from the St. Vincent hospital yesterday in his night clothes, stealing a suit with which he later clothed himself. He was taken to the hospital Thursday night, having shot himself in the hand. Detectives Coleman and Snow found the man in a room last evening at Second and Morrison streets and again locked him up in the city jail.

Gibson is accused of burglarizing a house at 561 Hood street, taking four suits of clothing and a watch. He served one year on the rockpile for burglary and a term at Seattle for larceny.

REPRESENTATIVE OF SHOE FIRM IS DEAD

William J. Hatfield, for 10 years the Oregon representative of the Brown Shoe company of St. Louis, died at his home, 526 East Seventeenth street North, this morning, following a lingering illness. Mr. Hatfield has resided in Portland for 10 years. He is a member of the Masonic lodge, and a Knight Templar. He was 65 years of age and was made for the funeral, and will not be until word is received from his brother, in Paducah, Ky. He is survived by a widow, but there are no children.

HOLDUP MAN STOPS MOTORISTS

Four Women in Party Halted
by Highwayman; Police
Make Search.

Roswell Dosh and an auto party of five women were held up last evening on the top of the hill near Hillsdale on the Slavin road by a lone highwayman. The women in the auto were Margaret and Camille Dosh, Mrs. Ernest P. Dosh and the two daughters of Dr. O. S. Plummer.

The party left the home of Colonel H. C. Dosh at Hillsdale about 8 o'clock, starting for Portland. As it reached the top of the hill, a man stopped the car, stating he was a deputy sheriff and was looking for the man who caused the arrest of his brother Wednesday. A revolver of nickel-plate style was pointed at Roswell Dosh, who was told to stand up and be searched. The holdup man said he was searching for a revolver on Dosh, but fingered each pocket, failing to get any money.

The women were not searched, but were told not to make an outcry. After searching the driver, the highwayman commanded him to drive on, and to not stop or look backward. As the party was being held up, a rancher passed in an open wagon, but the women had been commanded by the holdup man to not stop him. As the highwayman was searching Dosh, the women threw their watches in the grass beside the automobile. They returned an hour later and recovered them.

After the Dosh machine had been sent on by the highwayman, he stopped another machine, to the driver of which he asked to be taken to Portland. He told this driver he was a deputy sheriff and wanted to get to Portland as soon as possible. The driver was on his way to the Oregon Electric train. He let the man out at a station on the outskirts of Portland.

The holdup was reported to Captain Riley, who, with a squad of patrolmen, made a search. Efforts are being made today to locate the driver of the auto that brought the highwayman to Portland.

The holdup man appeared to be about 20 years old. He is about five feet, four inches tall, smooth shaven, of swarthy complexion. He has dark eyebrows and eyelashes and speaks good English.

NO PARADE IF IT RAINS HARD

Manager Hutchin Will Not En-
danger Health of Girls on
the Floats.

Tonight's electrical parade, a repetition of that of Tuesday night, and the final event of Portland's seventh Rose Festival, will take place unless there is so much rain that the health of the girls riding on the floats would be endangered.

"If the weather is threatening, or only occasionally showery, the parade will be held," said George L. Hutchin, manager of the Rose Festival, today. "But if it rains hard, I have decided to call it off, rather than put these girls in danger of contracting colds or pneumonia."

"In any event, tonight will positively be the last chance to see the electrical parade, which is the best ever exhibited anywhere, and fully 25 per cent superior to that of last year. After tonight, the floats will be dismantled."

It is not raining at 7:30 o'clock the parade in all likelihood will take place. Rex Oregonus, revealed by his unmasking at the grand ball Thursday night as Dorr E. Keasey, will make his last appearance as king in tonight's parade.

The gift was made through James R. Patterson, of 444 Carter lane, this city, a Royal Rosarian and member of the Knights. Mr. and Mrs. Patterson pass their summers here and their interests in Pasadena. The donation is what is left of supplies the Knights brought with them from Pasadena, and it was through Mr. Patterson's suggestion that it is to be given to these institutions.

Mr. and Mrs. Patterson will go to Seattle Tuesday night by special invitation of the Knights to be their guests on a trip to Alaska. The party will leave Seattle for the north on Wednesday.

SCANDINAVIAN CHURCH TRUSTEES INCORPORATE

Divorce Suits Granted.

Maudie E. Jones was granted a divorce this morning by Circuit Judge Kavanaugh from R. C. Jones. She testified that her husband, when drunk, would beat her, pull her hair and drag her around by it, and that he had given her but \$20 for support in two years. She also testified that her husband struck his father when the latter interfered to save her from his cruelty. Another divorce granted by Judge Kavanaugh was to Rose E. Robinson from Peter H. Robinson, whom she charged with deserting her six years ago when he went to Alaska. Judge Davis granted a divorce to Charles C. Piper from Bessie J. Piper on grounds of cruelty.

VON KLEIN INDICTED ON TWO CHARGES

Two indictments were returned by the grand jury yesterday against Edmond E. C. Von Klein, one charged with larceny and the other with forgery. In the first he is charged with having taken jewelry valued at \$3275 from Ethel Newcomb on October 13, 1911, and in the second with having married Miss Newcomb while he was the husband of Louise Tiskrup, whom he married in 1902.

At the time of the alleged crimes Von Klein went under the name of George B. Lewis and following the alleged marriage with Miss Newcomb he deserted her at the Portland hotel, taking with him, she charges, her jewelry. His bonds in each case were placed at \$5000 cash or \$10,000 securities, making it necessary for him to raise \$10,000 cash or \$20,000 securities to gain his freedom.

On recommendation of Deputy District Attorney Maguire the bond of \$2000 under which Mrs. Rena B. Morrow has been held was retained at the trial of Von Klein. Mrs. Morrow has announced her intention to return to Chicago and yesterday she had a conference with Von Klein in the district attorney's office. Her farewell to him was not as cordial as her welcome some days ago.

Mrs. Morrow furnished his bond of \$14,000 in Chicago while he was awaiting extradition proceedings, and attempted to secure bail for him here. She met Von Klein during her trial for the murder of her husband, of which she was acquitted later. It is believed that Mrs. Morrow is seeking to secure surety bonds of Von Klein, as inquiries were made regarding the case by representatives of a surety company yesterday.

Mrs. Morrow, Miss Newcomb, J. H. Marble, a barber who identified Von Klein as Lewis, and other witnesses who identified the prisoner were called before the grand jury.

COURT CHAMPIONS "PUBLIC POLICY"

Non-Suits Granted in Litiga-
tion Over Election of Com-
mission.

A contract between an agent and a paving company in which a commission is to be paid the agent for starting a movement among property owners which will result in business is against public policy and conducive to corrupt practices, according to Circuit Judge Hamilton of Medford, who is assisting in the local courts. This decision was handed down this morning when he granted a nonsuit in the suit of George M. Hyland against the Oregon Hassam Paving company.

Hyland, according to the testimony, had contracts by which he was to start a paving movement among property owners on Milwaukee and Macadam streets. He claimed he was authorized to quote a price of \$175 a yard for the paving, but that when the bid of the company was submitted it specified \$155 a yard, and the contracts were lost on account of the high bid.

Alleging that commissions of \$3255.59 and \$5662.55 were due him because he did the work required of him, notwithstanding the loss of the contracts by the company, he started suit for the amounts named.

Judge Hamilton said that nothing had been brought out in the evidence to show anything corrupt, and that he did not desire to impute in any way that corruptness existed in the instance of the suit on trial. He said that he believed such an agreement might have been made to corrupt practices, and that he deemed it opposed to public policy on that account.

WELCH'S COUNTY JOB GOES TO MURNANE

Madison Welch, better known as Matt Welch, inspector of bridges and ferries for Multnomah county, will be replaced next Monday noon by M. J. Murnane, a member of the last legislature. Murnane's title will be that of superintendent of bridges and ferries, while his salary will be \$125 a month, the same as that of Welch. The dismissal of Welch and appointment of Murnane was ordered by the county commissioners this morning. Commissioners Holman and Hart voting for the change, while Commissioner Lightner dissented.

"I think the change is not for the best at this time," said Mr. Lightner. "The Burnside bridge is to undergo a complete overhauling beginning some time next week, and I think the change is unwise until this work is completed at least."

Welch has been in the county employ for nearly three years. He was appointed general superintendent of construction and repair November 1, 1910, and in 1912 was made inspector of bridges and ferries.

BERKELEY FORESTER STRANGELY DISAPPEARS

(United Press Leased Wire.)

Oakland, Cal., June 14.—Mystery surrounds the disappearance of N. W. Armsbee, a forester in the forestry department of the government. He dropped from sight Monday night, while returning to his home in Berkeley.

Armsbee disappeared after checking his hand baggage at the Oakland Hotel. He had been away about six weeks, time cruising in the northern parts of the state and in Nevada.

Armsbee's home formerly was in Marquette, Mich. He had been in California only a short time.

PORTLAND TO FURNISH LUMBER FOR CANAL

Portland lumber manufacturers and dealers are invited to furnish 1,250,000 feet of Douglas fir lumber and a large quantity of piling for the Panama canal. Specifications were received this morning by the Portland Chamber of Commerce, stating that bids will be opened by the Isthmian Canal Commission July 7 at 10:30 a. m. The lumber may be delivered at Colon on the Atlantic side, or at Port of Ancon on the Pacific side, at the discretion of the commission. The quantity will be sufficient to fill a cargo.

CALLS FOR LIST OF HEAVIEST DELINQUENTS

The county commissioners have directed Sheriff Word to furnish a list of the 15 heaviest taxpayers who are delinquent for the years 1907, 1908 and 1909 in the payment of taxes. He is also asked to give the reasons advanced by these delinquents for not paying the taxes. District Attorney Evans has also been asked to furnish the commissioners with a list of all cases pending in any courts in which the collection of delinquent taxes is being sought.

Verdict for \$7000.

A verdict for \$7000 damages was returned in favor of H. J. Hashman, a carpenter, and against J. S. Winters & Co., in Circuit Judge Gatens' court this morning. Hashman was employed on the construction of the new Falling foot fall while working on one of the walls. His hearing was partially destroyed, an arm was broken and other injuries were received. The firm is composed of J. S. Winters and David Weiss.

Former Prison Druggist Insane.

Salem, Or., June 14.—William Quarter, who was dismissed from the position of druggist at the state penitentiary several weeks ago when detected in illegal practices, was today adjudged insane by County Judge Bushy and committed to the state asylum. The complaint of insanity was made by his wife. He had been bound over to the grand jury.

Did Not Steal Electricity.

A. B. Shanbeck, proprietor of a pool room at Archer-Blacks, was acquitted today of the charge of stealing electricity by means of a "jumper" wire around his meter. The trial was before Circuit Judge Kavanaugh and had feeling in the neighborhood was brought out in the evidence.

SCHOOL ELECTION VOTERS MUST BE CITY TAXPAYERS

Ruling Made Clear as Result
of Agitation Made by Port-
land Woman's Club; Poli-
ticians Disappointed.

Only bona fide taxpayers will be allowed to vote at the school election next Monday.

Following agitation on the part of feminine voters, headed by members of the Portland Woman's club, R. H. Thomas, clerk of the school board, this morning sent out a special delivery letter containing additional instructions to clerks and judges, to each of the 42 school election voting precincts.

The purpose of these additional instructions is that no man or woman shall be allowed to vote at Monday's election until he or she has given satisfactory answer as to their eligibility to vote. Eligibility in this case includes:

In the past it has been notoriously evident that no such qualifying question has been asked of voters at school elections, and that candidates have herded their friends to the polls and have had them vote regardless of the law's provisions.

The matter was threshed out yesterday afternoon at a lively meeting of the Portland Woman's club. As a result of the interest shown when last methods of the past had been rejected, Mrs. W. P. Strandborg and Mrs. John M. Scott were appointed a committee to make sure of the law on the question, and then asked the school board to act accordingly.

The committee members visited the office of the city attorney and the law was shown them. They then went to Mr. Thomas, explained their purpose to him, and Mr. Thomas accepted the special delivery letter method as the quickest and surest way of getting results.

It is understood that the club women planned picketing the polls and asking qualifying questions themselves, had

their object not been otherwise accom- plished.

It is expected that the new order of things will throw consternation into the ranks of candidates, who, it is said, had laid plans to proceed to vote their friends Monday, whether or not such friends are actual taxpayers and so entitled to the franchise.
