

## OFFERED BRIBE TO SEN. WORKS FOR POSTMASTERSHIP

C. H. Ercanbrach Is Charged With Offering \$1000 for Appointment to the Santa Barbara Position.

Los Angeles, Cal., June 14.—C. H. Ercanbrach of Santa Barbara was arrested there this afternoon by federal officers and brought here to face charges of offering United States Senator John D. Works a \$1000 bribe.

A federal indictment against Ercanbrach accuses him of trying to corrupt Works in order to obtain the appointment as postmaster of Santa Barbara. Ercanbrach was arrested shortly before 2 o'clock and is being brought to Los Angeles in custody of Deputy United States Marshal Ervin Dingle.

**Indictment Kept Secret.**  
Ercanbrach was indicted by the federal grand jury yesterday, the information being kept secret. Assistant United States District Attorney A. Regan presented the evidence to the grand jury.

A letter written to Senator Works and signed by Ercanbrach was the principal evidence. It is as follows, in part: "As our own Congressman Smith is no more, I want to talk a little business with you. I would like the postmaster's appointment at Santa Barbara. I will give you \$1000 if I get the appointment."

Immediately upon receipt of this letter Works notified the federal officers here. Ercanbrach will be arraigned in the federal court.

## DAN C. FREEMAN TO NORTH BANK ROAD

Dan C. Freeman, one of the best-known newspaper men of past regimes in Portland, was last night appointed publicity and advertising agent of the North Bank railroad and allied lines.

The appointment becomes effective tomorrow morning and was given out by Traffic Manager W. D. Skinner. R. D. Greaser, formerly advertising agent of the system, has been promoted to the position of assistant general passenger agent, and Mr. Freeman succeeds him.

The jurisdiction of the traffic headquarters in Portland, includes the territory served by the Spokane, Portland & Seattle; the Oregon Trunk railway, the Oregon Electric and the United Railway, and the publicity and advertising department will take care of the important work of exploitation in the new territory served by these lines.

Mr. Freeman is popularly known throughout the state through his experience with the publicity and advertising department which he was connected as secretary to the president. Previously he had worked under the direction of Henry B. Reed, during the organization and exploitation of the Portland exposition, visiting various sections to enlist support and interest in the Oregon enterprise. His publicity work in behalf of the state of Oregon began with the Transmississippi exposition at Omaha in 1898.

The new North Bank booster attracted considerable attention through his promotional work during the two years he was manager of the Eugene Commercial club, the community welfare operations of which are conceded to be first in the state outside of the metropolis. The appointee brings to his new and important tasks varied experience and extensive acquaintance. He was an administrative official of the A. Y. P. exposition at Seattle and acquired railroad advertising experience through connection with the Portland Railway, Light & Power company, the Union Pacific and other lines here and elsewhere.

## LOGGING OPERATORS IN MONTHLY MEETING

Logging camp operators from the Puget sound, Grays Harbor and Columbia river districts met here yesterday and discussed the log situation. Reports from the various districts were to the effect that on June 24, practically every camp in these districts will close down for three or four weeks.

It is customary for the camps to close the latter part of June to give the men who work in the woods opportunity to go into the cities to celebrate the Fourth of July, and they prefer a couple of weeks' vacation at that time.

The meeting was the regular monthly session of the Pacific Loggers' association, and H. C. Clair of this city presided. About 40 were present.

"The log situation is fair," said Mr. Clair at the close of the meeting, "but there is no disposition to crowd operations in the summer, but to keep in close touch with the active demand for logs. The month of July is the most favorable for a close down of the camps, for the men wish to go to the cities and in that month the danger from forest fires due to sparks from engines is the most serious."

The next meeting will be held at Seattle, July 19.

## URUGUAY SCANDALIZED BY SUICIDE OF HEIRESS

Montevideo, Uruguay, June 14.—Dr. Romeu, minister of foreign affairs, resigned today and it was not denied that his resignation was connected with the suicide of Senorita Irma Aravena, the beautiful heiress and racing enthusiast, who killed herself when about to be arrested for alleged defalcations of upwards of \$1,500,000. It is rumored that other Uruguay officials will resign and many prominent men are involved in the reports that have come out since the girl, supposed to be on her way to New York, shot herself. Romeu was said to be in her debt more than \$500,000. She did not lead an immoral life.

## "BRIDGE" WEBBER TO LEAVE GOTHAM UPON RECOVERY

Wound Inflicted in Revenge Is Not Fatal—Wounded Informer Removed to His Home.

New York, June 14.—The lower east side was seething tonight with the spirit of the old gang feud, "Bridge" Webber, the "squealer," who helped to send Police Lieutenant Becker and the four gunmen "up the river" for the murder of Herman Rosenthal, where they now await the electric chair, lay in his home with a stab wound in the back.

## Webber Will Recover.

Somewhere from out of the night a hand reached for Webber to avenge the "deal" given the gunmen. The attempt failed. Webber will recover from the wound inflicted when a six-inch blade was thrust into his back, and though the police and representatives of the district attorney continued tonight in their attempt to induce Webber to tell whom he suspected, they knew it was useless.

Webber will not "squeal" again. This afternoon his wife called at St. Vincent's hospital for the wounded gambler and took him to their home. She said that as soon as "Bridge's" condition permitted, they would leave New York. Where they are going, no one will be told. Webber would not risk a repetition of last night's affair. He knows that he is marked, and to remain in New York would mean a quick death.

## Assault Is Warranted.

Webber insisted throughout today that he was stabbed by a boy he had never seen before. "He looked just like a kid," was all the informer would say; but the police had only to invade the East Side, hear the stories that were told there, to know that friends of the four convicted gamblers were responsible for the attack. "Bridge" got away with a show of bravado at the opening of Sam Paul's cafe, on the East Side, last night, when rival gangsters attempted to start trouble, by demanding to know why "that 'squealer' was admitted. He stood his grounds and bluffed it out, but a few hours later the knife blade missed taking his life only by a few inches.

## ROYAL ROSARIANS SAY FAREWELL TO LAST OF ROSE FESTIVAL GUESTS

Royal Oaks of Oakland Receive Adieu in Oregon Hotel Last Night.

The Royal Rosarians bade the last of their Rose Festival guests farewell and Godspeed last night. Gathered at the Hotel Oregon at 10 o'clock, they surrounded the departing Royal Oaks of Oakland, singing "Goodbye, Oaks; we hate to see you go," and then waited for the response, "God bless you, Portland; we're coming back again."

The Royal Oaks were the last of the uniformed delegations to leave. The Knights of the Rose of Pasadena were on their way south, and the Tillamook of Ellettsville have already reached their Seattle homes. The Eugene Radicators went back yesterday. The Oakland boosters stayed until the Rose Festival program was over and they had seen for the second time the brilliant electrical parade before leaving for Puget sound, Victoria and Spokane.

## Guests Given Souvenirs.

No Royal Oak was allowed to proceed on the excursion northward without a souvenir of the visit. Boxes of candy, great bouquets of Chrysanthemum (Portland) roses were crowded into the hands of the women of the party. The special train that bore the excursion party on its extended tour northward was lavishly decorated in unique Rosarian style.

Merriment struggled with regret at the farewell in the hotel. Songs and cheers and yells were interchanged. The Oakland visitors had three cheers and a tiger for the Rosarians and for individual members whose service this week has been particularly great.

Among those for whom there were many expressions of appreciation were W. J. Hoffmann, chairman, and Dean Vincent, vice chairman of the general committee on entertainment of visitors.

## Rosarians Highly Praised.

When W. C. Bristol, crown prince of the Rosarians, entirely failed to meet any of the duties of his office in arranging for the entertainment of the visitors who came from both California and Washington in response to invitation excursions of the Rosarians, Mr. Hoffmann stepped into the breach and organized the program of the week. He was very efficiently aided by Mr. Vincent and by at least 50 of the Rosarians, who served on daily entertainment committees and special reception committees. The ladies' entertainment committee served each day.

There are many who feel that the Rosarians are to be credited with a large portion of the success of the Rose Festival. They were not responsible for the Rose Festival proper. That was in the hands of President Ralph W. Hoyt and General Manager George L. Hutchins of the Festival association. But they went out at their own expense during the year, by special train, visiting the cities of California and Washington, inviting the people of the two states to the Rose Festival and entertaining them, when they responded, in right royal style. The Royal Rosarians are expected to figure largely in the reorganization plans of the festival.

## ACCUSE DRIVER OF THE THEFT OF \$5000

## TO SEE TO "BLUE SKY" LAW ENFORCEMENT

Sidney B. Vincent, for ten years Portland manager of the Associated Press, has resigned and on June 24 will take up his new duties as chief examiner of corporations under Corporation Commissioner Ralph Watson.

During the last week Mr. Watson has made two appointments, that of Mr. Vincent and John Y. Richardson, an expert accountant and one of the candidates for city auditor at the last election. Mr. Richardson will give about two weeks of his time to work under Mr. Watson, and the remainder under Insurance Commissioner J. W. Ferguson, who has charge of the bureau of uniform accounting, created by the last legislature.

Mr. Richardson under takes his new duties tomorrow, but Mr. Vincent will be unable to take up his new position until his resignation, sent in three days ago, becomes effective. Under the law all investment companies will be compelled to send reports to the corporation commissioner setting forth the nature of their business along with other required information.

At present there are approximately 2000 companies in the state having stock to sell and others are being organized. To those already in business blanks have been sent to be filled in and returned. Following the receipt of the reports they will be turned over to Richardson for auditing and then sent on to Mr. Vincent for private investigation, who will report direct to Mr. Watson. In case a company is found not complying with the law it will be prosecuted.

## UNITED STATES WOULD REVIEW JAP TREATY

Tokio, June 14.—No date has been agreed on, it was learned tonight at the foreign office, for the renewal of another period of five years of the arbitration treaty between Japan and the United States, though it was admitted that instructions have been cable to Viscount Chinda, Japanese ambassador to Washington, that this government is willing to sign the treaty again. The present agreement expires August 24.

## JEERS HURLED AT MOURNERS WHO FOLLOW HEARSE

London Crowds Throw Pepper and Snuff at Marchers in Funeral of Miss Davison, British Suffragette.

London, June 14.—General hostility, amounting at times to rowdiness, marked the attitude of the tremendous London throng that this afternoon witnessed the funeral of Miss Emily Willing Davison, the Northumberland suffragette who last week gave her life in a mad attempt to break up the Epsom horse race, when she threw the King's horse, Anmer, and injured Jockey Jones.

At all times, save when the hearse was passing, the crowds of men and boys jeered the 3000 militants and their sympathizers marching with the body. They threw pepper and snuff among the marchers, and in other ways tried to break up the huge demonstration.

The crowning act of ruffianism came after the hearse had been entrained for Northumberland when a score of ruffians attacked a taxicab containing a number of young women who had been

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Clad in alternate squads of black, white and purple, the women met the body as it arrived from Epsom and marched through Piccadilly and Shaftesbury avenue to the church.

An incident of the funeral was the arrest of Mrs. Emmeline Pankhurst, leader of the militants, who was on ticket of leave from Holloway jail, after another hunger strike. The police had kept Mrs. Pankhurst under rigid surveillance, and as soon as she emerged from a nursing home to join the procession, she was placed under arrest and taken to Holloway jail, there to continue her three year sentence for the Lloyd-George bomb outrage until she again is so weak from starvation that the home office orders her release.

## Boy's Leg Broken.

Clyde Rouse, living with his parents on the Mount Scott line, yesterday afternoon while operating a truck at the Meier & Frank store, slipped on the sidewalk, allowing the truck to run upon him. His leg was broken. He is at the Good Samaritan hospital.
