"THE RED WIDOW" DEAL FOR MAKER

Raymond Hitchcock Seen to Very Best Advantage in Tuneful Piece.

Raymond Hitchcock has any number of opportunities to make fun in "The Red Widow" which opened at the Hotel last night, and, needless to say, Mr. Hitchcock passes up none of them. He also has a "curtain speech" to make when the volume of applause warrants it, and last night was one of the "warmed" nights.

"The Red Widow" is about 75 per cent of the Red Widow, and 10 per cent of the average. The music is tuneful, though rather monotonous in spots, with the theme of "I Love You Dear," one of the "wistful" tunes, as the motif.

Mr. Hitchcock, however, makes the fun, and does it in his agreeable, breezy way, with contortions of the face, gestures and voice modulations. He has some clever lines, too, and bits of his repartee is so fast that it goes by last night's audience. "The comedian doesn't pretend to be a singer, and he has but two numbers in the Red Widow, 'I Shall Never Look at a Pretty Girl,' with accompanying 'business,' is especially good.

Flora Zabell is a charming "Red Widow," who, though a nihilist at heart, specially compassionate to assist the cause of Russia, succeeds in traveling with Colonel Butts, Mr. Hitchcock, as his wife. The ensuing situations may be imagined.

Miss Zabell has a number of pleasing vocal numbers. Then comes "The Question," among them. She has a clear, ringing voice of power and an engaging stage presence. Catering to popular demand, "The Red Widow" company includes a pair of cabaret-style dancers, George White and Minsinger, Cleveland, who after two clever specialties.

The settings are particularly handsome, and together with the beautiful gowns and costumes of the players, emphasizes the squalor of what, unfortunately, must be called Portland's only first class theatre.

"The Red Widow" runs through Wednesday night, with a matinee Wednesday.

IN STAGELAND

"No Man's Land"

By V. W. Progress, in its mad marathon, has left no one so far behind as the middle-aged woman unexpectedly thrown upon her own resources. In our passion for particularization and our demand for specialization she is the one among all workers who brings her willingness and her needs to a No Man's Land.

There are apparently no openings left, no latch strings out for the woman who suddenly finding herself without home or income, announces herself as "willing to do anything," but who, when her capabilities are inquired into, knows how to do nothing.

Ever that last forlorn hope of keeping roomers, or turning the home plant into a boarding house, is scarcely a hope in these latter years on account of the upspringing of and preference for the modern-priced modern hotel.

"Widowers with children" are given to packing off their youngsters to school, to summer schools, to vacation schools, to traveling schools, to ready to unburden themselves of their responsibilities on traveling tutors and governesses and live snugly in bachelor quarters themselves, with men servants to manage for them.

Taking away these domestic pursuits from her, what is left for the dependent middle-aged woman? They soon find that one is expected to give an adequate return for a pay envelope and that position need not be expected on a claim of friendship, for one does not get a job because father or brother or hubby and Mr. Business Man were in college together or were club friends.

Yet the present conditions are a warning to those not yet arrived at the dangerous time and place and let them perfect themselves in some artistic, intellectual, mechanical or domestic line in other words let them store up a talent for a rainy day.

MINISTERS LAUD CONFERENCE PLAN

Coming World's Christian Citizenship Meeting Here, Theme.

The coming World's Christian Citizenship conference, to be held in Portland, June 29 to July 4, furnished themes for ministers in Portland churches all over the city yesterday. What the movement means, what is trying to be accomplished by its backers and the size that the movement has attained, were touched upon by the speakers.

Dr. James D. Corby spoke on the subject, "Christian Citizenship," at the Universalist church, Broadway and East Twenty-fourth street, yesterday morning.

"Sermons in shoes is the need of Portland," he said. "Most people live in cities. But what do the people know about the rights and duties of citizenship? Who has ever taught us that we should have fair play, honorable dealing all around? How much neighborliness is displayed when money is involved? Do you ever think when you are about to rent your property for evil uses: I won't do that because it would expose my children to evil example."

Golden Rule Urged.

"How much neighborliness is there in putting up a shack of a store next

to pleasant residences or in erecting unsightly billboards and glaring signs? How many think or care whether their fair play to others? Note the Sunday work, the teaching, the preaching and the living with which so many show their disregard for neighbors. The plea is: Have I not a right to do what I will with my own?"

"There is a higher law that is written on any statute book—that is the law of fair play and the golden rule."

"Christian citizenship demands sermons in shoes. It's one thing to be orthodox in faith, but unfortunately there are many who have the faith but never apply it."

"It's one thing to be liberal in religious views, but the practical test of liberal Christianity is, does it make you a more trustworthy citizen? You can belong to the most fashionable church, be affiliated with this or that religious group, but the mass of people test your Christian citizenship, not so much by the church you go to as they do by their dealing with you in the business world, by their contact with the spirit of your life toward the laws of the community."

Should Attend Conference.

"This is why our congregation should attend every session of the conference and hear the great speakers who are to be with us. That is why we emphasize in our Sunday school the meaning of neighborliness, the responsibility of citizenship. So that the boys and girls who have been under our training a few years shall see sermons in shoes and that from these examples they will be inspired to dedicate themselves to lawful, honorable, unselfish living for our city and state and nation."

Dr. Benjamin Young, at the First Methodist Episcopal church, urged his congregation to become associate members of the conference and to take part in the July 4 parade with their automobiles. In his sermon yesterday, Dr.

Young spoke on the subject, "Citizenship," the inspiration of which was a trip he has just returned from at his boyhood home in Wyoming. He recently delivered the graduation address at the University of Wyoming, of which he is a graduate.

Dr. Young predicted a great future for Portland as well as the Oregon empire, spiritually as well as materially, in the years to come, especially following the opening of the Panama canal.

Others who spoke of the coming conference were Dr. W. B. Hanson at the White Temple, Dr. W. G. Elliot Jr. at the First Unitarian church, T. R. McDaniels at Kewlworth Presbyterian church in the morning, Professor W. P. Ogburn of Reed college at Sellwood Baptist church in the morning, and E. Lee Paget at Forbes Presbyterian church and Sunnyside Methodist church, G. Ever Baker, president of the State Christian Endeavor Union, spoke at the Atkinson Memorial church in the morning and at Hope Presbyterian church in the evening.

At Sunnyside Methodist church a resolution was unanimously passed, endorsing a proposition to repeat the electrical parade the night of July 4.

Dr. Luther B. Dyott, at the First Congregational church, and Rev. J. W. Douglass of University Park Presbyterian church, also spoke of the matter.
