

W. W. C. A. GIRLS MEET AT BEACH

Annual Conference of Northwest Opens at Gearhart Today.

Portland, Montana and Idaho Y. W. C. A. girls to the number of nearly 100 left by special train yesterday afternoon for Gearhart Park, where they are to meet 50 girls from the sound cities and eastern association officers.

The executive officer of the conference is Dr. Anna L. Brown, specialist in physical education and hygiene. Other national secretaries present are Miss Edith M. Dabb of the student committee, and Mrs. Edith Terry Bremer of the city committee of the department of method.

The Portland delegation was headed yesterday by Miss Carrie Holbrook, president of the local association. Miss Lina James, general secretary of the local association, will be in attendance at the conference later.

Instead, Rev. Dr. Dyott will be one of the platform speakers and others will be Rev. Herbert H. Gowen, rector of Trinity Episcopal church, Seattle; Miss Margaret Matthews, who will be home from a furlough in Japan, and Dr. Adams.

The afternoon are free for recreation. A complete committee will be selected from among the delegates who will make arrangements for all the organized forms of athletics, such as tennis tournaments, basketball games, as well as for Association day, to which each association represented at the conference is asked to contribute its share.

The visitors make the Gearhart hotel their headquarters. A feature of the conference will be the awarding of first and second prizes for the best sets of photographs of groups and scenery at the conference.

There will be two classes in foreign missions. One of them will deal with specific foreign countries, while the other will have educational methods in general for its subject. Professor Frederick Boughton of McMinnville will lead the former and the traveling secretaries for the student volunteer movement the latter.

In the third hour technical association problems will be discussed in three separate councils—a council for volunteer workers and employed officers in city associations, under the leadership of Dr. Brown of the national board. McDabb will conduct a council for students and there will be a general conference in which free discussion will predominate.

There will be either vesper services or evening platform meetings each day of the conference, except on Association day, when a song service will be held.

JAPS MUST BECOME CITIZENS, SAYS HATTORI

(United Press Leased Wire.) Los Angeles, June 18.—Speaking in his native tongue to a large audience of local Japanese, A. Hattori, member of the minority party of the Japanese parliament, declared that Japanese and the United States never would go to war.

"There never will be war between Japan and this country," the statesman told his audience. "When I left Japan, the California anti-alien land law had just been passed. There was considerable excitement at home, but when I arrived here there seemed to be no such excitement among the Japanese in America."

"The present treaty between the two countries is a faulty one. The only solution of the present trouble is for America to allow the Japanese to become naturalized."

ROAD WORK SUFFERS FROM LACK OF FUNDS

Owing to the small amount of road money available, the county commissioners yesterday morning decided not to improve about 7000 feet of the Patton road which had been petitioned for, but ordered that the road be properly shaped and provision made for draining it.

The proposed improvement would have cost \$4640, according to the estimate of County Road Supervisor Chapman.

Woman Leaves \$15,000.—By the will of May Hartnett, who died in Portland Monday, her brother Lawrence Hartnett of San Francisco is left her entire estate. It consists of \$15,000 on deposit with the Security Savings & Trust company. John M. Gearin was appointed executor of the estate because Mr. Hartnett's residence in San Francisco would not permit his accepting the appointment of himself as provided by his sister in her will. The estate is without debt.

Minneapolis, June 18.—The first meeting of the main body of the American Medical association began yesterday when John Whittier of Nashville, Tenn., was installed as president. Whittier predicted that within 10 years the administration of various serums would conquer every human scourge. He predicted the same progress in the anti-toxins for tuberculosis and pneumonia as had been in those which conquer spinal meningitis, smallpox and typhoid.
