

HENWOOD LOSES IN SECOND TRIAL

Denver Slayer of Two Men Is
Convicted of First Degree
Murder.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Denver, Colo., June 19.—Convicted of first degree murder for the killing here of George Copeland in the Brown Palace hotel bar room, Frank Henwood today was taken from "bankers' row" in the jail, where he had special favors, and was lodged in the death cell, where he is under constant guard to prevent his cheating the gallows.

The verdict of first degree murder, which was brought in late yesterday afternoon, was a great shock to Henwood and his attorneys, who had not expected anything worse than imprisonment for him. Attorney Bottom, for the defense, today is preparing an application for a retrial, which will be heard within ten days. The defense alleges that Henwood, having been convicted of a lesser offense than first degree murder at his first trial, cannot now be hanged. It was learned today that the jury took 15 ballots. They agreed on the first two ballots for a verdict of murder in the first degree and for the rest of the time they were out they considered the penalty.

Henwood shot Copeland by accident when he opened fire in the Brown Palace hotel on Sylvester Von Phul, an aeronaut, with whom he had a controversy arising out of an "affair" with the wife of John F. Springer, a rich Denver man. Mrs. Springer, since divorced, has disappeared. Henwood also killed Von Phul during the affray in which Copeland was shot.

HEART DISEASE ATTACKS LEADER

Forcible Feeding Brings Mrs.
Pankhurst Near Death;
Hunger Strike.

London, June 19.—Mrs. Emmeline Pankhurst, the militant suffragette leader, who was released Monday for the third time from Holloway jail, is in a precarious condition today, according to her followers, as a result of her last two days' hunger strike. Her personal physician says that another term of imprisonment would be practically certain to doom Mrs. Pankhurst. She now suffers from valvular heart trouble as a result of forcible feeding. Her frame is shrunken and wasted, and it is said the only thing now keeping her alive is her determined will. A complete collapse is gravely feared.

Miss Annie Kenney and the five other suffragettes sentenced to Holloway jail Tuesday, who immediately began a "hunger strike," still refused to eat today, declaring they would compel the authorities to release them.

Fire, attributed to suffragettes, destroyed last night the parish church at Howley Regis, near Dudley, with a loss of \$20,000.

TRIPLE ALLIANCE CARNEGIE'S PLAN

London Hears He Went to Berlin to Propose Ten Years' Peace Pact.

Toronto, June 19.—A new triple alliance for peace of import to the whole world, impends, if a dispatch published by the Toronto Star is founded on fact. Dated from London, the story says: "It is stated here on the best authority that the conference in Berlin on Monday between Andrew Carnegie and the Kaiser was internationally of far greater significance than has generally been supposed. It is reported that Carnegie had official credentials from both England and America, authorizing him to commence negotiations for a triple peace alliance between these three nations (Great Britain, the United States and Germany) which would establish and insure peace to the civilized world."

"It is believed that King George, when he attended the German royal jubilee, opened the way for Carnegie."

"It is reported the proposal is in the form of a 10 year agreement which will materially lessen the proposed increase in armaments and will guarantee peace and good will."

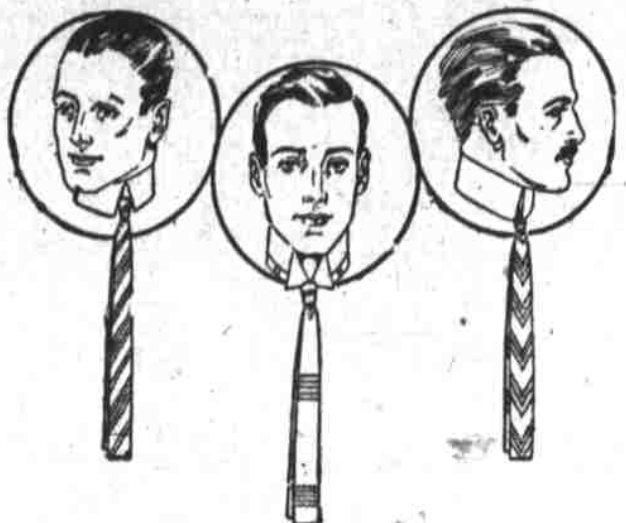
