

BISHOP GIVES ADVICE REGARDING CARE OF CHURCH'S FINANCES

Newly-Elected Wardens, Vestrymen and Treasurers Advised by Bishop Scadding.

In an open letter, just issued, Bishop Charles Scadding, of the Oregon diocese, has taken the opportunity to disuss the matter of church finance with the newly elected wardens, vestrymen, an dtreasurers, in which he has warned them of the evils of slipshod methods in church affairs, and counsels them in the manner in which affairs should be cared for.

The bishop's letter, in part, follows: "With all my heart I wish to thank the wardens and vestrymen of our par ishes and the official committees in missions for the faithful and effective service you are rendering as a whole to the church in this diocese. Great responsibilities rest upon you. Yours is chiefly a ministry of administration,

a care of property, a building up of the temporalities of the parish or mission to which you belong. The Lord's business should be carried on with as great care and thoroughness as your own business. I lovingly counsel you to re gard your election or appointment to office from this high point of view and to fulfill your duty with scrupulous conscientiousness.

Taxes Left Unpaid.

"It has happened in some places that bonded sewer assessments, and instalment payments for street improvements have been allowed to lapse so that it became necessary to pay them in full and lots have been sold for taxes and have had to be redeemed all because wardens and vestrymen have failed to be careful about the business end of their parish. It is not uncommon for the loose offerings, so called, to receive no check or audit whatever. Sometimes they are carried to the treasurer by this or that or the other person who may happen to be on hand. Worse still, they are occasionally left for some time in the alms basin in the vestry or choir room with no one to look after them. All this is loose jointed and discreditable. It is not a question of the loss of sacred funds, but it is a question of protecting the church, the vestry, the reasurer from attack where no defense could be forthcoming. Slipshod and haphazard methods in church affairs are a reproach to the church and nerve

racking to every upright man. Bishop Potter once brought this matter before his diocesan convention, and later on before the general convention, and proposed the following canon:

"The amount of other offerings received in connection with any service in any church or chapel shall be ascertained by the wardens, or two vestrymen, or two other persons appointed by the rector and wardens for that pur-
