ACCUSES WILCOX OF BEING UNFAIR

Contractor Wakefield Has a Brush Over Reservoir; Offers Compromise.

A brush between Robert Wakefield and Theodore K. Wilcox, engineer in charge of the city water board yesterday afternoon, Wakefield, who is the contractor that constructed the Mt. Tabor reservoir, accused Mr. Wilcox of being unfair and arbitrary in his attitude as a member of the water board toward a claim made by Wakefield for extras on the reservoir contracts. Wakefield asked the city to pay \$400,000 in extras. The water board refused to pay the claim and Wakefield brought suit in the circuit court. The jury awarded Wakefield \$148,000. At yesterday's meeting the contractor offered to compromise for \$140,000 rather than to continue litigation promised by the proposed appeal of the city to a higher court.

"The most the city could possibly owe you," said Mr. Wilcox to the contractor, "would be \$148,444, and this sum would not be due you, nor would I be willing to allow it unless the fact can be shown that engineers for the city erred in their calculations and caused the construction of the reservoir to be delayed. The city has a claim against you for penalties on account of the delay, and rather than yield a point I will vote to the last to let the courts settle it. It has been charged that the water board has been inefficient. Well, they can't say that I voted away any of the taxpayers' money in this instance."

Mr. Wilcox grew emphatic as he finished this speech and Wakefield, despairing of being able to compromise on his own terms, left the room. The board will probably hold a special meeting before the end of the week and if the claim can be adjusted in conformity to the ideas of Mr. Wakefield, a settlement may be reached. Otherwise the entire controversy will be passed up to the new commission. Engineer Clarke reported to the board yesterday that more than 3000 tons of water mains and special castings will be needed to complete projected water system extensions during the next six months. He recommended that bids for this material be invited. No action was taken, the board expressing the desire that the matter be referred to the new administration.

Bids for the lowering of the submerged water mains in the Willamette river were also laid on the table, as were a number of other matters that came up for the last time before the present water board.

SPEEDER JUMPS P-E-E; TWO BADLY INJURED

Both Mr. Smithwick and Mrs. Hammond were rendered unconscious for a few moments and neither is able to be out on account of severe bruises and contusions.

Sunday he and Abe Kelly, a brother of John F. Kelly, of Eugene, and George H. Kelly, of Portland, well known lumberman, became engaged in a quarrel and Chapman ran out of the house in which they were staying, soon returning with a rifle and shooting at Kelly through the door. The bullet barely grazed Kelly, inflicting a very slight wound on his abdomen. Chapman was bound over in the sum of \$2500 to appear before the grand jury, now in session.

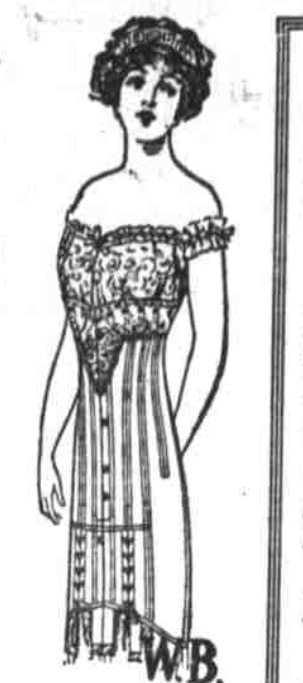

MULTNOMAH FARM WINS HIGH PRAISE

County Place Near Troutdale Well Managed, Says an O. A. C. Man.

"The Multnomah county farm, near Troutdale, can be made to produce a gross income of at least \$5000 a year," according to Dr. James Withycombe of the Oregon Agricultural college, who made a survey of the farm yesterday. "I was more than delighted with the place and its condition is exceptional, considering the short length of time it has been under the county's control."
"At least 40 cows should be kept there and the breed should be improved. There is no reason why, with proper development, the farm should not supply the county institutions under the present conditions."
"Superintendent Jackson of the farm has done wonders in the short time he has had at his disposal, and I consider him an excellent man for the position. Multnomah county is to be congratulated on the splendid location it has for its farm, and can make it an excellent object lesson for the farmers of the county."

Dr. Withycombe made the survey at the request of the county commissioners, and will report to them in the near future regarding measures to be taken for the upbuilding of the farm. The idea of making the survey belonged to Chairman Holman of the commissioners. Mr. Holman said after the visit yesterday that he thought the advice of such an expert as Dr. Withycombe would greatly enhance the usefulness and value of the farm, and that he felt the Agricultural college was an institution which should be made of practical benefit in this manner.

At present the various institutions of the county use approximately \$4000 worth of farm products annually. During 1912 the records of the county show that the greater part of these products were purchased in the markets, some even for the farm. Mr. Holman, when he discovered this condition, at once began an investigation, and requested Dr. Withycombe to come. Dr. Withycombe is enthusiastic over the prospects, and said the Agricultural college would lend whatever aid it could to the work.

The party yesterday was composed of Dr. Withycombe, Chairman Holman, Commissioners Lightner and Hart and Superintendent Jackson, who took the members to the farm in his automobile. They were entertained at dinner on the farm by Mrs. Jackson.

SEVEN POUND NUGGET PICKED UP IN PLACER FIND IN GRANT COUNTY

(Special to The Journal.) Prairie City, Or., June 24.—The discovery of a new and, it is said, exceedingly rich placer mine section in the vicinity of Austin, this county, will renew interest in a section of Oregon that, 50 years ago, was the scene of the greatest placer mining activity in the state. One nugget taken this week from the newly discovered placer weighed seven pounds, representing a value of more than \$1500. Several other nuggets of lesser weight have been taken out.
