

PURCHASING AGENT IS UNDER THE HEAD OF FINANCE OFFICE

Commission Also Announces
That Engineer's Office Will
Be Continued; Commission
Meets Again Next Tuesday.

The purchasing department under the new commission form of government, will be under the supervision of the department of finance of which C. A. Bigelow will be the head. Mayor-elect Albee at first assigned the purchasing agent to the department of public affairs, but W. L. Brewster, who will be in charge of that department, pointed out the fact that the purchasing of supplies would more properly come under the commission of finance. At a meeting of the commission this morning Mr. Albee announced the change.

It was also decided that the engineer's office of the water department shall be continued. There had been some talk of combining the office with that of the city engineer under the department of public works, but both Commissioner-elect Day of the water department and Commissioner-elect Dieck of the department of public works, have agreed that a change would be impracticable.

The commission fixed the amount of the bond that will be exacted of the purchasing agent at \$25,000. Mr. Daly made a motion that the bond be fixed at \$200,000, but the rest of the commissioners thought \$25,000 would be reasonable, they holding that the agent would never have supplies of more value than that under his charge at any one time. The bond of the city auditor was fixed at \$50,000. The bond of the city treasurer is at present \$100,000, but this may be raised, as the city treasurer hereafter will have charge of the collection of the water rates.

The commission will hold a meeting next Tuesday morning at 9 o'clock to appoint new officials and transact other business, including the adoption of an administrative code, which has been compiled by Chief Deputy City Auditor Grutze and City Attorney-elect La Roche.

FAIRBANKS ACCEPTS PORTLAND INVITATION

Ex-Vice President Charles W. Fairbanks in a telegram from Boise, Idaho, to President Edgar B. Piper, of the Portland Commercial club, today accepted the invitation to the dinner planned in his honor at the club. It will be given Tuesday evening and will be entirely nonpartisan, and as a testimonial to the high position he recently held.

Colonel James Jackson is chairman of the committee of arrangements and while the dinner will be under the auspices of the Commercial club, it will be for the general public, reservations to be made at the club. Colonel Jackson will act as toastmaster. Retiring Mayor Ruesslight and Mayor-elect Albee will be among the invited guests.

The list of speakers will be announced in a day or two, when the program will be completed.

Fugitive Is Caught.

After nearly a month's chase, Edward Carter, formerly a deputy in the registration department of County Clerk Coffey's office and a Spanish-American war veteran, was arrested yesterday at the Bohemia mines by Deputy Sheriff G. B. Pitcher of Lane county. He is charged with contributing to the delinquency of an 11-year-old girl. Carter rode a blind mare from Canby to the mines, in his effort to escape.

MAY BE WETTEST JUNE ON RECORD

With three days still to go and showers predicted for tonight or tomorrow, June this year stands a good chance of equalling if not exceeding the wettest June on record here. The rainfall to date this month is 4.07 inches.

Only once in the past 42 years, since the weather bureau records were started in 1871, has the rainfall for this month been exceeded and on only one occasion has it been equaled. The two times were for the entire month of June while this month there is still three days left in which the record for the entire period may be broken, there being only a little over an inch of precipitation necessary to equal the record of 1885, when there was a rainfall of 5.38 inches in June. In 1891 for the same month the weather bureau records show that there was a fall of 4.07 inches, which is exactly what has fallen to date this June.

In his forecast of weather conditions, District Forecaster E. A. Beals, says that there is a relatively low barometer over the western half of the United States and that conditions are favorable for showers in this district during the next 24 to 36 hours, with no marked changes in temperature.

In spite of the rains the river is continuing to fall and will do so for the next few days, according to the river forecast. The Columbia is falling all along the line as is the Willamette, the only rise indicated in the latter being at Wilsonville, where it came up only slightly in the past 24 hours.

SCHOOL OF TRADES CLASS GRADUATES

Prof. N. F. Coleman, of Reed college, who last night delivered the graduation address for the members of the Trade School who have completed their course, declared that honesty was the chief means for success in their work. He urged the students to always keep that point in mind.

RISE FESTIVAL PLANS BEGIN TO FORM RAPIDLY

New Festival Association Taking
Hold of Question With
Vim; Campaign for Money
Likely Be Started in City.

Many plans for the financing and programming of the Rose Festival will probably be offered at the second meeting of the new festival association, which was organized, tentatively, yesterday.

It seems probable that it will not be possible to impose a tax for the support of the festival in 1914, even if such a tax is found constitutional. Therefore a campaign will need to be organized, it is said, to get the money.

Melvin G. Wylstock brought a suggestion to the meeting in the Commercial club yesterday that will likely be considered at the next meeting, namely, to add a little to the dues of members of business and civic organizations, to ask the school children of Portland to give a penny a week into the fund, all of this to be in addition to the contributions of business men.

It has been intimated that Mr. Wylstock, who is manager of the People's Amusement company, may be willing to accept appointment as manager or director of the festival without salary as a public service.

At the next meeting representatives of women's organizations will be invited. It was felt that it was a mistake not to have done so for yesterday's meeting. Committees will also be asked from a number of organizations not represented in yesterday's meeting.

TARIFF CHANGES ALL ACCEPTED

All but That on Grape Brandy
Are Upheld by Democratic
Caucus Today.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Washington, June 27.—All the amendments to the finance committee, except that relating to grape brandy, were upheld today by the senate Democratic caucus.

A motion by Senator Newlands of Nevada, instructing the finance committee to reduce the duties on food products in the agricultural schedule at the rate of 10 per cent each year for 10 years until the commodities reached the free list was rejected.

The proposal of Senator Hoke Smith of Georgia for a countervailing duty on all articles now on the proposed free list, also was defeated, but the caucus sustained the finance committee's provisions for countervailing duties on wheat and flour.

The proposal of Senator Wilson was informed today that there is no prospect of the senate Democratic caucus reporting the tariff bill before July 4.

The caucus voted this afternoon, 26 to 9, to sustain the recommendation of the finance committee in retaining a countervailing duty on flour and wheat. The nine senators who voted in favor of unlimited free trade were Fletcher, Lea, Swanson, Hartline, O'Gorman, Reed, Salisbury, Sheppard and Vandaman.

ENTIRE DAY OF REAL FUN IS PROMISED

Tomorrow is the big day for the members of the Portland Commercial club and their families at Vancouver baracks, where the big picnic of which so much has been heard will be held. It will be one continuous performance from early morning till late in the evening as the picnicers desire to remain. Colonel Young has thrown open the grounds and it will be up to the members of the club to take advantage of this generous offer.

There is no doubt that the members of the club will have the men give a full dress parade and the splendid band will give a concert.

A great many of the picnicers will go in autos, but those who prefer to take the water route may embark on the steamer Undine, which leaves Taylor street wharf at 9:30 a. m. and 2 p. m. for the scene of the festivities. Again the trip may be made by rail, steam or electric, so there will be no danger of not finding suitable transportation facilities.

During the afternoon a number of athletic games and contests will be pulled off and a large assortment of valuable prizes will be distributed with appropriate ceremonies among the winners.

A. L. MILLS RETURNS FROM A TRIP EAST

A. L. Mills, president of the First National bank, who has returned from a month's visit in eastern cities, says that he has not yet had opportunity to go into the details of the proposed currency reform measure, anticipated by the new administration, but that he heard some criticisms of it while away, the chief objection to it having to do with the proposed general board of control which it provides.

There is varying opinion in the east as to present business conditions there, according to Mr. Mills. "Some well informed persons tell you that business is good and that conditions are satisfactory," he said, "and others as well informed tell you that conditions are bad."

Mr. Mills was at his desk again this morning.

SALEM BANKER GETS PLACE AS EXAMINER

Oakland, Cal., June 27.—H. N. Morris, for four years national bank examiner, today received acceptance of his resignation, filed more than a month ago, from Acting Controller of the Currency J. P. Kane.

Claude Gatch, formerly cashier of a bank at Salem, Or., and now national bank examiner for the outlying district of California and Oregon, has been appointed Morris' successor.

AEROPLANES ESCORT POINCARÉ TO FRANCE

London, June 27.—President Poincaré left London today for Paris, having completed his state visit to King George. Three British naval aeroplanes joined the warships which escorted President Poincaré across the channel. All performed admirably, skimming easily about and circling around the flotilla in wide sweeps until the French shore was reached. Then they landed for petrol and flew back to British soil.

TO BE BROUGHT BACK TO ANSWER CHARGE

After nearly a month of being in custody at Vancouver, B. C., awaiting extradition George W. Boggs, formerly treasurer of Pierce county, Wash., will be brought back here to answer charges of obtaining money by false pretenses. Deputy Constable Hunter left Portland last night for the man.

Boggs is alleged to have given Seymour H. Bell a check for \$100 on the First National bank at Boise, Idaho, when he had no funds in that institution. Boggs, while county treasurer, was found guilty of using public funds and convicted. He served a number of years in the Washington state penitentiary, before he was pardoned.

Boggs was first arrested late in April in Vancouver, following information sent out from this city. Extradition papers were gotten for him but Boggs, through his attorneys, made every effort to prevent his being returned. After a number of hearings extradition was finally granted and now he is on his way to Portland.

Thompson, chairman of the executive committee; Bishop Charles Scadding, Dr. Benjamin Young, vice president of the committee, and Dr. John H. Boyd. Special musical numbers will be given by local singers.

Final reports will be made by all sub-committees and a letter of welcome to the National Reform association, under whose auspices the conference is to be held, will be adopted by the body. No special notice will be sent to members and President Foster urges that all members of the committee and associate members be present at this final meeting for the completion of arrangements.

MAY DISCONTINUE FAST MAIL TRAIN

G. N. Officials Resent Effort
to Pay According to the
Hitchcock Plan.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Seattle, Wash., June 27.—The fast mail of the Great Northern railroad, which makes the run from St. Paul to Seattle in 47 hours and 30 minutes, will be discontinued if the government puts into effect the Hitchcock plan to pay the railroads by space instead of weight for mail carried. This announcement was made here today by L. C. Gillman, assistant to the president of the road.

With the fast mail, the Great Northern cuts the time for delivery of mails from the Pacific coast to New York from four and one-half days to three and one-half days. According to the reports received by Mr. Gillman, the cost of operating this fast mail train is greater than passenger trains.

Under the present plan of handling the mail, the road received in one year \$1,458,000, but under the Hitchcock "space plan," would have earned but \$468,574. If the fast mail is withdrawn the road will carry mail on its regular passenger trains.
