

W. B. WILCOX PAYS RUSHLIGHT TRIBUTE

Retiring Member of Water Board Says Mayor Man of His Word.

One of the finest tributes that one man could give to another as an estimate of his ability, honesty and personal character was paid to Mayor Rushlight yesterday afternoon by W. B. Wilcox, when Mr. Wilcox tendered his resignation from the water board at its last meeting, over which the mayor would preside.

"This is the last meeting of the board, and I wish to say a word," said Mr. Wilcox. "I have been on the water board for four years, under two administrations, for the last two years serving under you," addressing the mayor. "I want to thank you for your courtesy and consideration for the members of the board and your support and assistance in their work during that time, and to express my personal appreciation. I have never been discharged from any place, and I want to resign now before I am discharged, and go out with my resignation. If you will accept my resignation I shall be pleased to give up my work and let someone else take it up."

Keeps His Promises.

"I want to say further that I have found you very different from some of your detractors—in all my close

association with you on this board in transacting the business of the public and in my observation of you, I have found you uniformly honest and efficient and public spirited. You have kept your promises and you have made a record to be proud of."

In accepting the resignation Mayor Rushlight thanked Mr. Wilcox for his efficient service on the board.

"I was not personally acquainted with you when I asked you to continue on the water board under me," he said. "I found you one of the few men public spirited enough to be willing to give your time and business ability to the public for two years as a member of the board."

Frank Wynn, in resigning, also expressed appreciation of Mayor Rushlight, whose administration, he said, had been marked by extraordinary progress.

The written resignation of J. C. Ainsworth was handed Mayor Rushlight by Water Superintendent Dodge. Mr. Ainsworth is in Europe, but Mr. Dodge said he had left his resignation with him to be presented when Mayor Rushlight went out of office.

W. B. Stachey, the fourth member, resigned before leaving for Chicago a few days ago.

Under the new charter the water board, the health board and the park board are retained for six months. The resignations of the complete membership of both water and health boards, however, will make it necessary for the commissioners to appoint new boards if it is decided to retain these bodies.

Approval of the June pay roll was the only business transacted by the water board. Several contracts and other matters were left for action by the commission.

At the request of Commissioner-elect W. L. Brewster, under whose jurisdiction park matters will come, members

of the park board did not resign yesterday.

The board adopted recommendations of Park Superintendent Mische to build a public comfort station in Washington park, and to proceed immediately to equip a complete playground on the Felling school grounds. It was recommended also to the commission that the Lenta school playground be equipped.

The financial report of Superintendent Mische shows a balance of park funds on hand July 1 of \$123,221.33. After outstanding debts are paid, \$108,000 will be left.

The cost of the public comfort station at Sixth and Yamhill streets, now near completion, was shown in the report to be \$17,000.

OREGON STONE TO BE PUT TO TESTING

Senator Chamberlain Trying to Have Postoffice Specifications Changed.

(Washington Bureau of The Journal.)

Washington, July 1.—It has long been an occasion for pique in far western communities that the treasury department so draws the specifications for local public buildings that local building stone cannot be used in their construction, but in order to comply with the requirements of the architect of the treasury stone must be hauled across the continent from quarries in Vermont, New Hampshire, or even Indiana.

Now that Portland is to have a new \$1,000,000 postoffice, the people of Oregon who knew that the state possesses fine building stones assumed that the treasury department would be glad to make use of the local product. But it turns out that the specifications require that stone not produced in Portland be used. The word "stratification," as used in the specifications, makes all the difference.

"If we can have that word 'stratification' eliminated," said Senator Chamberlain to The Journal correspondent, "and the question of the quality of the stone left to the experts of the treasury department, I am sure that the Oregon stone would be found acceptable. There are many buildings in

Portland that have been constructed of local stone, and they promise to last, if not forever, at least much longer than any of us who are now living. Some excellent stone is found in Oregon, also, in Washington. I cannot see the utility of going as far as Indiana or farther for building stone for Oregon buildings."

"I have gone all over this matter with the architect of the treasury, and only today I wrote another letter to the secretary of the treasury on the subject. The department has not convinced me yet that the demand for local stone is one which should not be granted."

Secretary McAdoo has seemingly taken considerable interest in this question. He has suggested to Senator Chamberlain that at best the specifications for the stone work cannot be written for six months to come, and he asked that the senator urge those having stone in Oregon which is believed to be of the quality that would be satisfactory in a building of the class in which the new postoffice belongs to send samples to the architect of the treasury. These samples will be put through various tests, including the crushing test, and in that way it will be determined whether it will be satisfactory for use in the postoffice building.

BOURNE HAS PLAN TO FINANCE ROADS

Ex-Senator's Post Road Plan Is to Lend Money to States at 3 Per Cent.

Washington, July 1.—"Extensive road construction is not generally practicable without an extensive system of financing," said Senator James B. Bourne, chairman of the joint committee on federal aid in the construction of post roads, today. "Ordinary road revenues are barely sufficient to keep the roads in repair after they have been constructed. For that reason, permanent improvements almost always require the raising of funds by some form of indebtedness. This may be either by making the cost of the improvement a lien upon the property benefited or by the sale of bonds."

"Where bond issues are found necessary it is, of course, desirable to secure the lowest rate of interest practicable. My plan for federal aid contemplates raising funds in the first instance by sale of federal 3 per cent bonds and the loaning of this money to the states on the security of their 4 per cent bonds, the difference in interest constituting a sinking fund which, with compound interest thereon, at 3 per cent, would amount to the face of the bonds in a little less than 50 years."

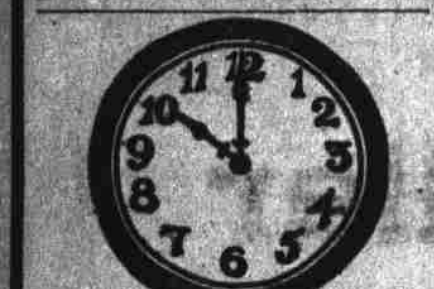
