

LOBBY COMMITTEE HEARS CHARGE OF IMMENSE FORGERY

David Lamar, Who Impersonated Palmer, Accuses U. P. Officials of \$82,000,000 Juggling of Books in 1901.

Washington, July 2.—David Lamar, a New York stock broker, testified today before the senate lobby investigating committee, admitting that he had impersonated congressmen and others of national fame in telephoning officials of the Harriman lines on behalf of Edward Lauterbach, an attorney. Lamar insisted that he was asked to do this by friends of Lauterbach, and that he only wanted to secure the lawyer "perfectly legal employment."

Lamar said he telephoned Robert S. Lovett, chairman of the board of directors of the Union Pacific, and Paul Cravath, a New York banker, representing to each of them that he was a representative of Congressman Riordan, of New York.

"Judge Lovett's statement," said Lamar, "that Edward Lauterbach tried to blackmail him is untrue. Lauterbach is a little man with a big heart. He is a man who cannot keep a dollar in his pocket because he cannot bear to see suffering."

"Mr. Chairman, I will tell you of the greatest bit of lobbying the world has ever known. In 1901 someone—I don't know whom—forged the books of the Union Pacific to the amount of \$82,000,000; that sum was the fulcrum by which the most gigantic combine in the country was formed."

Lamar then detailed a complicated system whereby it is alleged the Union Pacific juggled its assets and then borrowed its full value on fictitious property. Referring to the Riordan-Lovett conversation, Lamar said he used Riordan's name because "it just came to me."

Lamar admitted he used Congressman Palmer's name in telephoning to Lovett. He said he happened to use it because Palmer was then in the public eye and prominent in administration affairs. Lamar also admitted that in an effort to learn Lovett's opinion of himself and Lauterbach, he telephoned to Lovett.

Lamar said he was talking to Palmer. Lamar said, "Lauterbach told me over the telephone what a blackmailer Lamar was. He expressed an opinion of Lauterbach also. I realized that Lauterbach had fallen into error, and I knew that, acting as Palmer, I could force him to do anything I desired. I told him to call Lauterbach and let him explain everything. Lauterbach then made his famous visit to Lovett."

Lamar declared that the opposition of the late J. Pierpont Morgan to Lauterbach led him to telephone Lovett in the name of Palmer to find out who inspired the opposition to Lauterbach.

"I found it was Lovett himself," said Lamar. "I knew, too, that Lovett had a stenographer on the line recording our talk, and was sure that I could read nearly everything into it that I could. I think I offered him the entire government. I may have left the president out."

Tells of Impersonations.
Lamar made the whole committee grin when he detailed how he had impersonated Palmer. In the story told by Lamar, how he upbraided Lovett for not going to church, and how he told Lovett of the great things Lauterbach could do at Washington for the Morgans.

Senator Overman wanted to know if Lamar had ever impersonated any other congressmen. Lamar smiled broadly and replied: "Oh, Lord! I may have."

In a prepared statement to the senate lobby committee today Paul Cravath, counsel for the Union Pacific, declared Lamar's story of an \$82,000,000 forgery was only part of a bear attack on Union Pacific, and that railroad officials had been advised of it for several days.

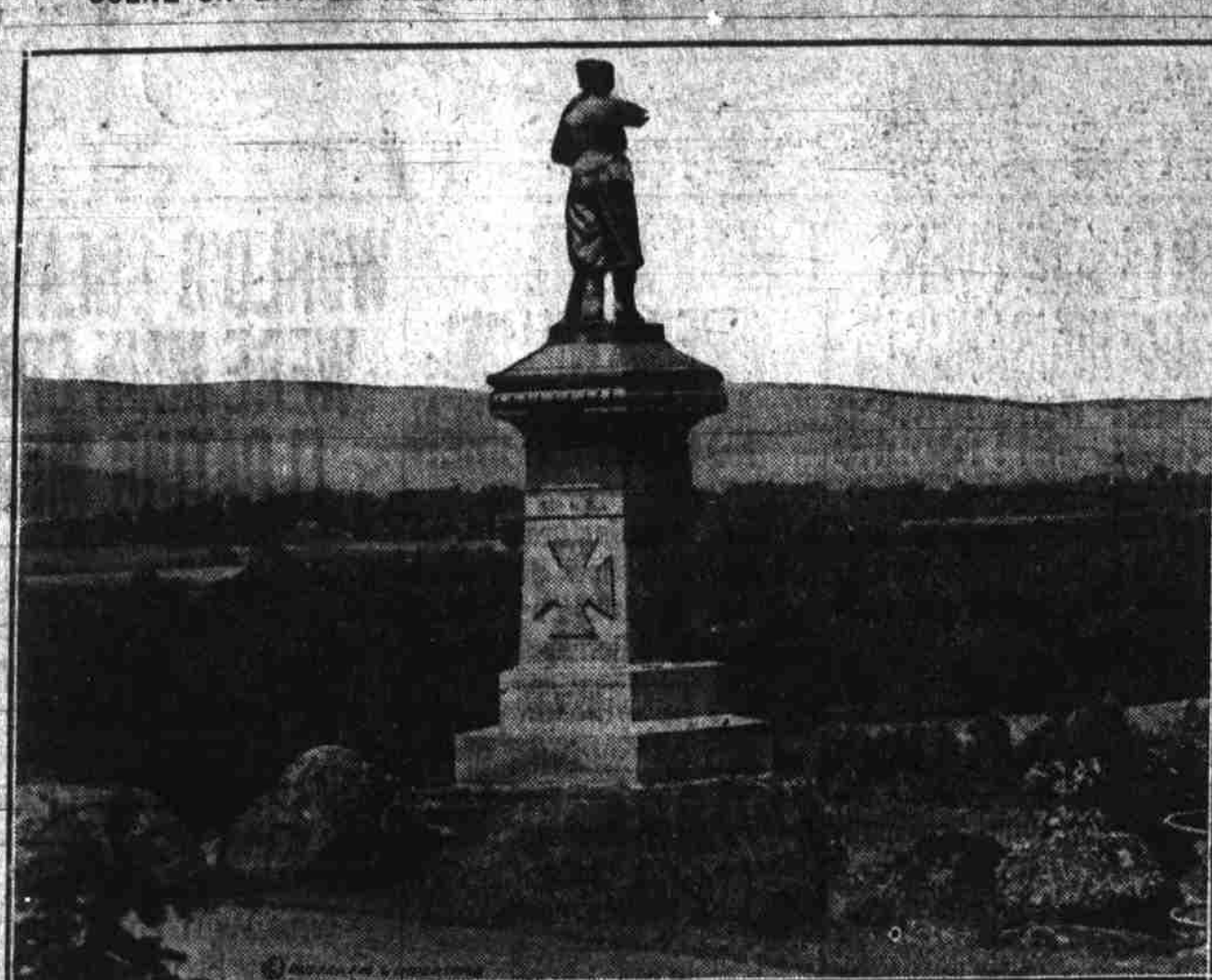

DIRECTOR DEFENDS THE SCHOOL BOARD

Chairman Sabin Refutes the Charge That It Is "Close Corporation."

"Education" was the topic at the Rotary club yesterday. The directors and executives of nearly the entire school administration attended. R. J. Sabin, chairman of the board of school directors, O. M. Plummer, Judge M. G. Munty, Dr. E. A. Sommer, members of the board; L. R. Alderman, superintendent of schools; Frank Rigler, former superintendent; Assistant Superintendents D. A. Groat and Charles Rice, and School Clerk R. H. Thomas were the speakers at the luncheon which was held in the Commercial club.

Mr. Sabin said that while outlay was made for buildings and equipment which made considerable showing both in the landscape and the expense items, the reason for all effort and all expenditure is the children themselves and the hope that they may grow to be men and women fit to meet responsibility of whom the city and its citizens will be proud.

Mr. Sabin defended the school board against charges that have been made to the effect that it is a "close corporation." He said that the board is run for the benefit of an "inside ring," and that the public is not admitted to the deliberations of the board. He said that the accounts of the board are open, its meetings public—except for a few meetings when the character of some one was under discussion, and that he would challenge anyone to establish a charge of irregularity of any kind.

Yesterday was "inauguration day" for Superintendent Alderman. It was his first day in office. He told about his hopes and ideals for the Portland schools, the parents who send them and the teachers who teach them. He said that the best method of instruction would be helpful without the intelligent cooperation of parents. Then he called upon the men who knew the teachers of their children to hold up their hands. There were 150 Rosarians present, three held up their hands. But one man in the room had a family of as many as six children. He was L. P. Povey, and he said that he was a member of the Portland Board of Education.

Dr. Sommer, newly elected member of the school board, confined his address to one exhortation, "Boost for your school system just as enthusiastically as you boost for any other feature of your town that you want the world to know about."

CAESAR'S IS CLOSED; CAESAR'S NOT WORRIED

San Francisco, July 2.—After issuing an order closing the doors of Caesar's grill, famous on the Barbary coast, known to elite San Francisco society and a former rendezvous for bunco men, San Francisco's police commissioner today early today drew the teeth from the order by the adoption of a resolution permitting Sebastian Ravan, Caesar's partner, to apply for a liquor license to conduct a cafe on the same premises. Commissioner Kuhl voted the only dissenting vote.

"Just tell my patrons not to worry," was Caesar's only comment.

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THINKS DIVORCE SAME AS DEATH

Hence Dairyman Shoots Former Wife and Then Attempts to Kill Self.

Declaring that divorce was the same as death to him, Chris Schneider, a dairyman of Multnomah station, last night attacked with a revolver Louise Schneider, who divorced him a week ago, fired two shots into her body and then turned the weapon on himself. He is now believed to be dying at the Good Samaritan hospital, while his former wife, who is also there, is reported to be recovering.

As a result of the shooting, an investigation by the sheriff and the police is to be made, to determine who sold the man the revolver with which the shooting was done. It was a .38 caliber revolver, and is said to have been purchased in Portland, although Schneider claims he has had it for some time.

Mrs. Schneider said that when Schneider was drunk he was very brutal. It was on the grounds of cruelty that she divorced him, after living with him 22 years. Schneider is 59 years old, and his former wife 40 years. There are six children, ranging from 4 to 21 years. The couple came to Oregon 11 years ago from Iowa.

CLACKAMAS STILL FULL OF OLD LINE PARTY MEN

TRIES TO HAVE CHIEF OVERRULED

Patrolman Tennant Visits the Mayor in Effort to Secure Reinstatement; Fails

When Charles Tennant, a former patrolman whose reinstatement was one of the last acts of the retiring executive board Monday, called on Chief of Police Clark yesterday to report, the chief refused to recognize him as a patrolman and would not assign him to duty. It was one reason for a call on Mayor Albion this morning by the chief. While he was discussing the case with the mayor, Tennant was an interested waiter in the ante-room.

The result will be that Tennant's appointment probably will be contested on the ground that he is not a fit man for patrolman. He was dismissed from the department several months ago after he had been in the police court on charges made by his wife. He was sentenced to the rockpile, and put in part of his sentence there.

"I am investigating Tennant's case very carefully," said Mayor Albion this morning. "I don't want men of the type he is reported to be in the police department. I cannot understand how he came to be reinstated."

The procedure in Tennant's case is expected to be that charges of general inefficiency will be filed against him. In the meantime, he will not be recognized by the chief of police and will not be assigned to duty.

The chief yesterday also refused to permit Arthur R. Fair, Eugene Schiller, Arnie H. Ulfers, Robert R. Bailey and Robert Snedden, who were appointed patrolmen from the eligible list by the executive board at the same meeting Monday at which Tennant was reinstated, and former Patrolman Henry H. Hansen, to report.

After his conference with the chief this morning, Mr. Albion said that no further objection would be made to these appointments, and that they would be placed on duty.

The chief's action was taken merely because he did not believe that he did not wish to commit himself until he did know, said the mayor. "They have been regularly appointed because they did not have any record on duty at once."

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INVITE VISITORS TO HYGIENIC EXHIBIT

Excellent Work Being Done by Society Favoring Sex Purity.

Officers of the Social Hygiene Society of Portland are immensely pleased with the splendid progress the society is making in removing from the minds of parents the fiction that matters of sex hygiene should not be discussed with their children.

"We are making headway," declared W. F. Woodward, chairman of the executive committee of the Social Hygiene Society, "in our efforts to have parents understand that the child's knowledge pertaining to sex purity should come from the parent. Such education through the public schools by hired teachers is purely secondary. It is true, of course, that when the parent neglects or, from a sense of false modesty, fails to impart the proper instruction in sex matters, it should come from the teacher. The child's moral sense must be supplemented with proper instruction from proper sources."

The Portland society is using every legitimate means to bring home to the parents of Oregon the fact that the child must be taught the frightful physical evils resulting from lack of social hygiene. An appropriation of \$10,000 was made by the last legislature to enable the society to carry on its work in this city and state during the next two years.

The work of this society has attained such celebrity and has been so efficient that inquiries are coming to local headquarters not only from other states, but from foreign countries asking to be furnished with the details of its organization and methods of reaching parents in the matter of sex purity and social hygiene.

In one of the Broadway store rooms of The Journal building the Social Hygiene Society maintains an exhibit in charge of competent workers, where may be seen a full display of literature employed in carrying on its work. 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COUNTRY'S GROWTH TO BE VERY GREAT

Ex-Vice President Fairbanks Predicts Triple Present Population in 25 Years.

Politics were left untouched at the testimonial dinner given in honor of ex-Vice President Charles W. Fairbanks at the Portland Commercial club last night, under the club's auspices. C. H. Moore, a long time friend of Mr. Fairbanks, was the toastmaster.

That the United States will have a population of 250,000,000 within the next generation was the declaration of the ex-vice president in touching on the future of the country, and he declared that the Republican form of government is still on trial. He held that more important than political law is the incultation of moral law, the future progress of nations depending more upon the activity of non-political organizations such as the Second World's Christian conference now in session in this city.

The speech was punctuated with a number of witty remarks and it was more of a personal talk to old time friends than an effort at oratory.
