

COMMISSION GIVES DATES FOR REGULAR SESSIONS

"Kitchen Cabinet" at Which Informal Discussion Will Be Held, to Meet Friday Morning of Each Week.

The new commission council will meet once every week at 10 o'clock Wednesday morning to discuss proposed ordinances and executive character, and once each week at 10 o'clock on Friday morning it will hold a meeting for informal discussion of measures and matters affecting the different departments, at which no business will be transacted—a sort of "kitchen cabinet," as it were.

This decision was reached at a short meeting this morning at which every member was present but Commissioner Beawater, who is out of the city. The "kitchen cabinet" idea was proposed by Commissioner Daily.

Mr. Beawater said that there should be one meeting a week of an informal nature, to discuss matters of importance. By ordinance passed at its first meeting Tuesday just after going into office, the commission provided that one meeting a week should be a legislative meeting and the other an administrative session. This ordinance will be amended in conformity with the new idea by eliminating the word "legislative" and substituting "informal."

Mr. Roche holding that this would technically imply that some definite action should be taken at such meetings. "I think these Friday meetings should be made a sort of kitchen cabinet for discussion of the merits of proposed measures, matters pertaining to reorganization of departments, department matters on which the different commissioners desire to talk it over with the other members of the commission, and the like," said Mr. Daily. "We should not definitely pass anything at these meetings, but refer all matters to the regular legislative meeting for action there."

Heuser Franchise Considered.
Whether the Portland Railway, Light & Power company in laying its Broadway street tracks should continue to put down iron enough ties for a third rail along the narrow gauge track, if the Heuser franchise is granted later, was briefly discussed.

Third Rail Issue Up.
Since the defeat of the Heuser franchise at the last election, the street car company has been laying short ties only, and Commissioner Dieck said some property owners wanted the city to require the company to cut off the ends of the long ties already laid, on the ground that pavement laid over them would be injured by the vibration of passing cars.

City Attorney La Roche said he thought the city should not take any definite action at the present, at least, inasmuch as the third rail was a matter of private contract between Heuser and the Portland Railway, Light & Power company, and interference by the city might make it liable for Heuser's \$25,000 bond to stand his share of the cost of laying the track.

This view prevailed and no action was taken by the commission.

MORAL SQUAD WORK IS DISCONTINUED
Chief of Police Clark this morning ordered members of the "moral squad" to discontinue their work for duty in uniform this evening. "I want all policemen to do their duty," said the chief. "The work of the moral squad has been good, but I feel the same work can be done by each man in uniform. For the present, we will try it."

Patrolmen Wise, Long, Martin, and Moe have been doing the work. At times there appeared indications of friction between the two squads. Sergeant Harris and Patrolmen Long and Wise have sent several white slavers to the federal prison, and caused the deportation of a man and woman on account of their undesirable behavior.

BANK CLERKS ROBBED OF \$2500, TRENT, B. C.
Nanaimo, B. C., July 5.—Two bank clerks of Cumberland bank were held up at Trent bridge and robbed of a sum said to be in the neighborhood of \$2500 late yesterday.

They were returning to Cumberland from a branch of the bank which operates on Friday at Union Bay. The robbers appeared in front of the bank and at the point of a gun forced the clerks to get out and travel in opposite directions. The bandits are said to be foreigners.

Two Swedes, believed to be the bandits, are surrounded near Union Bay and the police are expected to make them captives today. They are well armed.

CONTINUANCE ASKED VON KLEIN CASE
Attorney J. C. Fitzgerald, representing E. C. Von Klein who is under indictment for larceny of \$3500 in jewelry from 525th Avenue, asked for a continuance of the trial of Von Klein until next fall on the ground that he had not been notified that the trial was set for July 16. Deputy District Attorney Maguire refused that he could show that letters had been sent both Fitzgerald and Von Klein notifying them of the date. Circuit Judge Morrow told both attorneys to present affidavits next Monday afternoon supporting their contentions and the motion will be argued then. Fitzgerald said that should the trial proceed he would not have time in which to produce witnesses.

JUDGE DAVIS IS ILL; MAY BE OPERATION
Judge George N. Davis is quite ill at his home in the Rosecroft apartments. He was confined to his bed yesterday, but this morning spent a few minutes at the court house. Dr. A. B. Rucker, the attending physician, will decide this afternoon whether an operation will be necessary. Judge Davis is believed to be suffering from gall stones.

VISITORS WILL OCCUPY PULPITS

Prominent Canadian to Speak in Stadium at Tonight's Meeting.

Sessions of the Second World's Christian Citizenship conference will be held at Multnomah club stadium this afternoon and evening. Tomorrow the large number of persons expected to be present at the conference will be filled by visiting delegates.

In the afternoon and evening the concluding sessions of the conference will be held at the stadium. There will be no services in most of the local churches tomorrow night on account of the conference meeting at the stadium. In order to accommodate the large number of persons expected to be present at the meetings at the stadium tonight and tomorrow arrangements have been made for the placing of two or three thousand extra chairs.

At the meeting at the stadium tonight the principal address will be made by J. A. MacDonald of Toronto, Canada. Mr. MacDonald, who is an editor, has more than a local reputation as a platform speaker. His subject tonight will be "The Ethical and Economic Basis of War."

It was expected that the Rev. William Hiram Foulkes, formerly of this city, would address the conference tonight, but owing to illness in his family he is unable to attend.

One of the program may be taken by Ayes Hattori, member of the lower house of the Japanese parliament, who arrived in this city today. This will be a very interesting address, determined, however.

COLORED CONSUMPTIVE INCITES CITY OF JUDGE
The only thing before the court in this case is the question of what to do with these people," said Municipal Judge Stevenson this morning, in a case of two colored girls, a colored man and a foreigner arrested last night in a stage at the northeast corner of Flanagan and Eighth streets. The house has the reputation of having been used for disorderly purposes for eight years. The four people were charged with vagrancy.

One of the girls, Pearl Smith, was before Judge Taxwell two weeks ago, in which case she was discharged on the ground that tuberculosis has fastened its fingers upon her. Dr. Frederic Dieck examined the girl and found her in advanced stages of this disease. Judge Stevenson said she should be sent to the county hospital, where treatment can be given for this trouble. He indicated that he would ask the county commissioners to take care of her. The second girl, Mamie Smith, has also been sick, but is able to conduct the house where she was caught. The judge said that abatement proceedings should be taken against the owners or lessees of the property to close the place.

John Wilson, drunk, was asked if he wanted to turn over a new leaf. The judge said he would not sentence him if he went to work. John promised. District Attorney Maguire, who was given another chance upon promise to go to Eugene and work. Henry Sepia promised the judge to not molest his wife at 1955 Minnesota avenue. The commissioner then said that he had come home drunk, abused her and was intolerable. They have been married less than a year. Mrs. Sepia told the judge she furnished the money with which to buy a wedding ring, marriage license, and that her husband had not bought her any clothing or paid for household bills. The woman wanted to be left alone, she said, which request the judge exacted of Sepia.

All men who showed disposition to go to work and keep out of trouble were given a chance. Judge Stevenson warning each, however, that they would have to make good to the court in their promise.

WHITE SLAYER MAY BE GIVEN PAROLE
Washington, July 5.—David Westman who has been recommended to the president for parole will be released from McNeil's island prison shortly. Lenience was shown, because Westman, convicted on a white slavery charge, suffered injury to his health while he was employed by the Wind River lumber company at Cascade Locks, Or., from whom he secured \$5000. Afterward it is said he was made a fool of by a woman, although otherwise was a model boy.

Westman was found guilty on a white slavery charge in the United States district court here on November 30, 1910, was sent to McNeil's island to serve a sentence of five years. He was convicted for bringing his wife to Portland and placing her in an immoral house. "The case," the judge, according to Deputy United States Marshal McSwain, was a particularly aggravated one.

"The boy has served 30 months already," said McSwain, "and during this time has been a model prisoner. He has changed considerably since he has been in prison and none of his old traits now remain. He has matured and I hope the parole is granted."

MEDICAL EXAMINERS FIND FAULT WITH LAW
The law recently passed by the Oregon legislature relative to examination for securing a license to practice medicine in the state of Oregon was made the object of attack by the members of the State Board of Medical Examiners at a meeting held yesterday. An effort will be made to have the measure repealed at the next legislature. It is claimed that the examination standard is unreasonable.

It was decided, however, that a warfare should be waged against the doctors in the state who are practicing without license. This is to be done through the office of the district attorney.

It was announced yesterday that the results of the examination recently held by the board would be made known August 15.

The board elected the following officers: Dr. Herbert B. Nichols, Portland, president; Dr. L. H. Hamilton, Portland, secretary; Dr. H. L. Henderson, Astoria, treasurer. The other members are: Dr. E. F. Moore, Harry F. McKay and Charles T. Chamberlain, all of Portland.

180,000 TROOPS IN 50 MILE LONG BATTLE
Sofia, July 5.—After two days of desperate fighting in which both Bulgarians and Serbians fought heavily, the war office here is advised that the Bulgarian generals hope to capture Koprivitsa today.

A great battle is reported in progress north of Salonika in which 100,000 Bulgarians and 80,000 Greeks are engaged along a battle front of 50 miles. The war office asserts that the early apparent Greek successes were due to Bulgarian strategy, apparent retreats being devised to lure the Greeks into their fortified positions.

ARMSTRONG QUITS THE CIVIL SERVICE

County School Superintendent Hands Mayor His Resignation From Board.

A. P. Armstrong terminated a service of four years as a member of the Portland civil service commission this morning when he called on Mayor Albee and tendered his resignation.

Mr. Armstrong, who is also county school superintendent, told the mayor that his work as superintendent required so much of his time that he could no longer conveniently remain on the commission. His resignation was accepted. Mayor Albee said later that as yet he had no one in mind to appoint in Mr. Armstrong's place, and probably would not make an appointment until some time next week.

The resignation of Mr. Armstrong leaves the civil service commission with only one member in the city. He is George W. Caldwell, who was appointed by Mr. Albee last Wednesday to succeed P. L. Willis, whose term had expired.

John F. Logan, the third member, is in Europe. It is regarded as not unlikely that he, too, will resign on his return.

The term of Mr. Armstrong had about two years more to run. He was appointed by Mayor Simon. His formal letter of resignation follows:

"Honorable H. R. Albee, Mayor—My Dear Sir:—My work as school superintendent of Multnomah county is extensive and important, and I feel that all my time should be devoted to it. I therefore respectfully tender my resignation as a member of the civil service board of Portland, to take effect on its acceptance which I trust will be done at your earliest convenience.

Wishing you and your administration a full measure of success, I am, very truly yours, A. P. ARMSTRONG."

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KING BING KNOWN IT'S HAL D. PATTON

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16 DEAD, 784 INJURED DURING SANE FOURTH ALL OVER COUNTRY
Western Section of United States Reports Very Small List of Accidents.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Chicago, July 5.—Sixteen dead and 784 injured is the total of the "sane fourth" accidents compiled here today from reports from all over the country. Most of the victims lived in the smaller cities. When the lockjaw victims are accounted for and reports are in from remote sections it is believed the total will exceed 25 dead and 1000 injured, with a fire loss of \$150,000.

The "sane fourth" movement is spreading rapidly in the west and only a small proportion of the accidents are reported from Chicago to the Pacific coast.

THIRTY-THREE HURT IN GOTHAM.
New York, July 5.—Thirty-three persons met injury in New York as a direct result of the "sane fourth" celebrations. Seven deaths by drowning also were reported.

O'BRIEN SAYS CROPS DOING WELL IN WASHINGTON
Crop conditions in Washington are excellent, according to J. P. O'Brien, vice president and general manager of the O-W-R & N. company, who has just returned from an inspection tour of the company's Washington division.

"There has been a abundance of rain and what is needed now is sunshine to mature the grain," said Mr. O'Brien, "and from what things look now it seems it is coming. With clear dry weather for the Pacific northwest would harvest a very large and fine grain crop."

SENTENCED TO ROCKPILE.
Charles McAlpin decided to serve his 30 days on the rockpile, so gave himself up this morning to Deputy District Attorney Deich. McAlpin was sentenced to 30 days three weeks ago for the larceny of \$30 from a lodger at the Bay View rooming house on Fourth and Yamhill. McAlpin's sister put up \$250 bonds to appeal the case. McAlpin left the city. Mark Speth, proprietor of the Bay City market, sought to draw down the \$250, claiming he had advanced the money to McAlpin. He returned Monday and claimed he had not intended to jump bail. Instead of appealing the case, he concluded to serve the time.

OFFENDERS OF THE FOURTH ARRAIGNED.
Vancouver, Wash., July 5.—This morning in police court, Roy Wilson, a lad, was arraigned for whipping a team at driving it to exhaustion. He pleaded not guilty and his case was set for 4 o'clock Monday afternoon. James Mullen, arrested for being drunk and disorderly, pleaded not guilty and was released on \$10 bail to appear this afternoon. Ray Westfall, who placed choride of potash and a mixture of mercury on the street car tracks, was given \$25 and costs on his plea of guilty. Hugh Jackson was let out on \$25 bail to appear this afternoon on the charge of being drunk and disorderly. Doyle Day, who struck Deputy Sheriff Barbeau in the mouth yesterday evening, will be arraigned in the superior court. Charles Adams, who also was brought before the higher court.

CLACKAMAS SOUTHERN IS MAKING PLANS TO GAIN ENTRANCE HERE
Another electric interurban railway is making plans to enter Portland. Representing the Clackamas Southern Railway, a road owned and controlled by Oregon City and Clackamas county people, Attorney M. G. Munly has asked Will H. Daly, commissioner of public utilities, to grant him a hearing at which he can discuss an application for a franchise for this road to come into the city.

Commissioner Daly set the hearing for 9 o'clock Monday morning, at which time Mr. Munly and the men he represents will be heard.

The conference will be a very informal affair," said Mr. Munly this morning. "We desire an opportunity to show the new commission that the proposed road is a very meritorious proposition, preliminary to formally applying for a franchise."

DIRECT OUTLET WANTED.
The people of Clackamas county want a direct outlet into Portland and are prepared to begin building operations once a franchise is secured. There should be no publicity at this time, for it is a little early just yet to discuss our plans, but I can say that the people behind the road, most of them Clackamas county men, mean business. This road will tap a part of Clackamas county that has no railroad service. We want a doorway into Portland.

The road will come into the city on the east side somewhere east of the present rail lines. We desire to get into the city itself as we can have our share of the passenger and freight business, and shall probably ask for a franchise over the Hawthorne bridge, as the franchise held there by the Portland Railway, Light & Power Co. is on a common user basis.

FARMERS ARE INTERESTED.
One of those heavily interested in the Clackamas Southern is Grant Dimick of Oregon City, formerly mayor of that city. Much of the stock is held by farmers of the county living along the route on which the road is now pushing southeast from Oregon City up Beaver creek to the Molalla section.

About six miles of this road has already been graded and rails laid, although the project is a recent one. This projected line into southeastern Clackamas county is between 20 and 30 miles long.

The extension to Portland which an entry into this city would entail would be from the Oregon City end of the road.

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Electric Interurban Road Seeks Franchise From Commissioners; Hearing Monday.

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MILLIONAIRE BRIDE ON HONEYMOON

Denver Juvenile Court Judge Telegraphs He Welcomes the Effort.

Denver, Colo., July 5.—The recall of Judge Ben B. Lindsey of the juvenile court is advocated here today in circulars mailed to voters by Dr. Mary Bates, secretary of the Woman's Protective league. The juvenile court, Dr. Bates charges, is protecting delinquents of young girls.

The circular purports to give the records of 84 cases wherein men and boys were accused of attacking girls. It is charged that only 16 of the 84 men and boys, appearing before Judge Lindsey, were punished for assault. Of these, it was said, only four were sent to the penitentiary.

Judge Lindsey, who is lecturing in the east, wired Denver today that he welcomed efforts for his recall. He branded the charges contained in the circular as lies.

Policeman Sues City.
The city was sued for \$218 by former Patrolman J. J. White of the morning shift, who was suspended on May 1912 for being asleep on duty and was reinstated July 3, following, because proper notice had not been given of his suspension. It is for the salary during this time that the suit has been brought. White was again suspended last January for the same offense.
