TERRITORIALS MARCH IN GRAND REVIEW

(United Press Special Wire.) London, July 5.—In Hyde Park today King George reviewed the London territorialists (militia) and hundreds of thousands of Londoners turned out to cheer the citizen soldiers. The parade, which mustered over 20,000 strong, included ten divisions, with seven brigades of field artillery, 23 battalions of infantry, three regiments of cavalry, and engineer, transport and medical corps.

Major General E. C. Bethune, director general of the territorial force, was in command, assisted by Major General Sir Alfred Boddington. The king, who wore undress field marshal's uniform, was accompanied by the Duke of Connaught, Prince Arthur, War Minister E. B. Seely, Lord Chesham, Viscount Haldane, First Lord of the Admiralty Winston Churchill, and a distinguished staff of officers. Queen Mary and Princess Mary watched the review from a royal carriage.

After the royal salute had been given the king and his staff rode along the lines, and a march past the saluting base followed.

HEAT WAVE BROKEN BY COOLING BREEZES

(United Press Special Wire.) Chicago, July 5.—The backbone of the heat wave throughout the middle west was broken today by northwest breezes. Hot weather still prevailed, however, in the eastern and southern parts of the country. Desultory showers occurred in the middle west today.

American in Mexican Jail.

The messages received here stated that Bryan has ordered an inquiry by Ambassador Wilson at Mexico City.

INSECT FOUND HERE MAY BE CENTIPEDE

While digging angle worms this morning at Hawthorne park, F. W. Wilkins, of 303 East Eleventh street found what he declares is a genuine Arizona centipede. One of the most poisonous insects known. He captured it and brought it to The Journal office this afternoon.

"This is a genuine Arizona centipede," said Mr. Wilkins, "for I have seen many of them, but very few larger. This one measures nearly four inches in length and I have one at home in a bottle of alcohol that measures probably half an inch more in length."

"The centipede does not bite, but if it grips any bare part of the body with its sharp feet and surrounds the skin the poison will flow into the wound and completely poison the person's system. There is no known antidote for the poison and it means certain death in three weeks or a month. For that reason the poison is more deadly than that of the rattlesnake or the tarantula."

Mr. Wilkins found the centipede under the bark of a decaying log.
