

LEADERS GRATIFIED AT THE RESULTS OF HUGE CONFERENCE

What Has Now Been Accomplished Has Paved Way for Specific Work in Many Directions.

The delegates to the Second World's Christian Citizenship Conference, which closed its sessions last night, folded their tents today and quietly stole away. Some returned direct to their respective homes, others left for pleasure trips to various points of interest. All in departing, left behind them appreciation of the beauty of Portland and its hospitality. All carried with them a great stock of enthusiasm and religious fervor for the next biennial conference.

Summing up the results of the conference, Dr. James S. Martin of Pittsburgh, Pa., general superintendent of the National Reform association, under whose auspices and direction the conference was held, said: "The conference has exceeded our expectations. It was much greater, from the point of interest and attendance, than the first conference held at Philadelphia two years ago. There were representatives from 15 foreign countries and from every state and populous city in the union. All the moral and Christian reform associations had a representation. There was a harmonious cooperation in every respect."

Outlining the future, Dr. Martin continued: "Encouraged by the great interest developed, we will now go after specific results. Our field workers will be increased, and we will endeavor to crystallize into legislation the objects we are working for. These include the placing of the Bible in the public schools, the adoption of a constitution to our national constitution prohibiting the sale and manufacture of intoxicating liquors, and the practice of polygamy. Other objects sought will be a suppression of the white slave traffic, a better family life, Christian laws governing marriage and divorce, a better observance of the Lord's day, better laws for its protection, a revival of national religion and the preservation of all Christian customs, usages, laws and institutions."

Meeting Place Not Chosen.
The matter of selecting a meeting place for the next conference, which will be held in 1915, was left to the executive committee of the conference, which will make a thorough canvass of the inducements offered by some 30-odd applicants included among the leading cities of the United States. There is some sentiment in favor of San Francisco, but it is suggested that the holding of so many counter attractions during the Panama exposition will detract in a measure from the United States. London, England, has been mentioned as a probable choice.

The conference was brought to a close last night in one of the greatest religious gatherings ever held in Portland. It was what might be termed a popular night in the way of addresses. There were no set speeches, but the religious emotions of 15,000 people assembled on the Multnomah club stadium was fired by the impassioned words of three of the orators who had won popular favor during the sessions of the conference. It was a most inspiring moment when the vast audience arose and sang "God Be With You Till We Meet Again."

Old Reformers Speak.
Another dramatic moment was the introduction of three men who 50 years ago had been present at the birth of the National Reform association at Xenia, Ohio, and Sparta, Ill. These three men were Dr. H. H. George of Beaver Falls, Pa., aged 81; W. A. Campbell of New Wilmington, Pa., aged 85, and R. N. Redpath of Olathe, Kan., aged 71.

Speaking in behalf of his companions Dr. George reviewed briefly the organization of the movement for Christian citizenship. Ng Poon Chew in fervent appeal inveighed against the nations of Europe teaching the new Chinese republic the doctrine that might makes right. He expressed the hope that the United States alone among all Christian nations had ever been the teacher and foster mother of the Chinese republic would ever continue to be so. Dr. R. J. Patterson of Belfast, Ireland, the originator of the "catchy-note" temperance crusade, appealed for personal activity in the redemption of men and women. "Not only sing 'throw out the life line,'" he exhorted, "but throw the life line out." A new voice in the conference was that of the Rev. E. F. Bailey of Birmingham, Alabama, who described conditions in the southern states in connection with the "White Man's Burden."

Makes Eloquent Appeal.
The final address of the conference was the eloquent appeal of J. A. MacDonald, editor of the Toronto Globe to stand shoulder to shoulder and to render a consecrated social service. He took for his slogan the old war cry of the Gael "Sons of the Gael, shoulder together," and made an application of it to modern conditions. On America, which embraced the United States and Canada, rested the obligation, said he, of leading the world in Christian citizenship.

The conference adopted resolutions thanking the people of Portland, the committee of one hundred and the press for their cooperation. At the afternoon session of the conference at the stadium, yesterday the speakers were Dr. S. McDaw of Pittsburgh, and Hugh B. Campbell, president of the University of Oregon. Dr. McGraw spoke on practical patriotism. The subject of Dr. McCaw's address was "Church Cooperation and Public Charities." He pleaded for a better cooperation and organization in charitable work. President Campbell, discussing democracy and Christianity as the foundation of American education, said: "Christianity and democracy are so essentially one in spirit that they can not be dissociated in practice. Any form of education which ignores them in spirit is un-American. Common school and university alike must leave the unmistakable imprint of democracy and Christianity on every student that goes out from their doors."

WASCO COUNTY IS SLIPPING BACK INTO LIVESTOCK RAISING

was done the ripe fruit by untimely rains. It is generally believed that this year's shipments to outside points will total greater than during any recent year.

The Dalles has a business men's league that is making it its sole purpose to tell the truth about the country. No highly colored tales of excessive production in any line will be permitted to emerge from the head of Wasco county. The business men are rather jealous of their section's reputation for producing and packing good fruit, and they stand ready to invoke the law on anyone who has the audacity to pack good fruit from the top of the package and poor stuff on the bottom.

"We have a great fruitgrowing section in Wasco county," said Judd Fish, secretary of the business men's organization. "Nature is producing the best there is to be had, and we are prepared to allow anyone to send out wrongly packed fruit if we can help it."

Outlook for Fruit This Year.
Wasco county has a very big apricot crop in sight at this time, and there is every indication that the fruit will be of favorable size and quality.

Prospects for a very good production of peaches are exceedingly good. Shipments were made to market fully 10 days ago, and the season is now getting well under way.

There is always a good prune crop in this section. The year crop will undoubtedly be a good average one, and the outlook for quality at this time is the best in years.

Apples will show a good average production, from present outlook, with greater care in packing in shipment, some reputation for quality is expected from this commodity during the season.

Wheat Average Falls Off.
Like all sections of the Pacific northwest this season, Wasco county suffers from a decreased acreage of wheat and oats. Crop prospects throughout the county at this time are rather good, the one drawback of moment being the weed nuisance. South of The Dalles, in the Mount Hood country, they planted more wheat than usual this season. Some of the fall wheat in this section will produce from 25 to 30 bushels per acre, although it is not likely that the average will run beyond 22 bushels there.

The outlook for oats in the same section is quite favorable, although it is not likely that the total output will be as good as a year ago, owing to the unfavorable weather at the start.

Up Dufur way they have a reputation for corn production that is the envy of some of the best corn producing sections in the middle west. A. M. Roberts has 40 acres in corn this season, and while the prospect is not so favorable as a year ago, owing to cool weather during the spring months, a good average production is expected.

T. A. Sammis, with 45 acres in growing corn, has the prospect of one of the best outputs for years. H. C. Nielson has only about 4 1/2 acres in corn this season, but his fields show the country that Wasco county is destined to be a leader in corn production after a while. Most of his corn is at present 4 1/2 feet high and appears healthy.

Corn King Burtner Buys.
The real corn king of the county is M. M. Burtner, who is annually called upon to sell the railroad supplies of seed which has been fully "acclimated." Mr. Burtner is an eastern man, and while he has been a resident of Wasco county for only about five years, has fully demonstrated to the entire northwest that corn culture here is sure.

In the Three Mile country Frank Oprist has 40 acres of barley that is destined to take a prize. Even at this time the grain is so thick that a hat can be thrown upon it. There is not a weed in sight, an indication that Mr. Oprist has done some real work of extermination. His prospects at the present time are for a yield of fully 65 bushels per acre.

J. C. Oprist has 75 acres of fall wheat that is among the best in this section. His prospects are good for about 30 bushel acreage.

In the Kingsley section, about 25 miles south of The Dalles, there are quite a few fields, according to John Hicks of Hawthorne, which will range from 40 to 50 bushels per acre. Others more conservative say 30 bushel wheat is common there.

Roosevelt and 2 Sons TO ROUGH IT IN ARIZONA

The colonel does not plan to do much hunting on the trip, but will spend his time "roughing it" with his sons through the wilds of Arizona and the Grand Canyon. Soon after his return from this trip Colonel Roosevelt will start for the Argentine, where he will deliver a series of lectures.

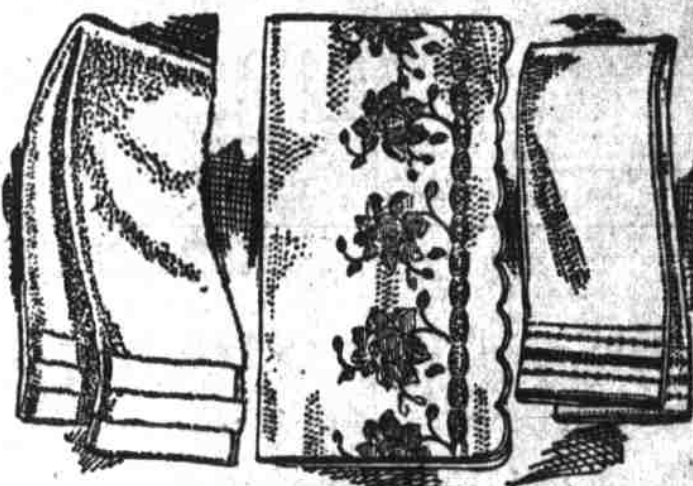
