But I don't think I have ever seen it displayed in a home kitchen. Have you?

Nor is it a common sight in any home.

Yet to "do it now" is fully as necessary in a home as it is in an office.

You hate to wash dishes. You delay about clearing the table and getting the dishes ready for washing. You take every excuse for being interrupted in the task or for putting it off.

By and by you get the dishes into the pan and pour the hot water over them, and you think how you despise the steam and the greasiness and the horridness of it all, and you wonder why, oh why, you were fated to wash dishes. At last they're on the shelves, half wiped.

Your hands look tight. You don't want to bother about getting it now, so you half dry the poor hands on a limp kitchen towel and let it go until next time. You notice there ought to be a fresh towel—but you're in a hurry to call Mrs. So-and-so on the phone, so the family continues to use the same dingy towel.

Washing beds is a nuisance. It doesn't take much time, really, to tidy up the bedrooms in the morning. But you grouch about it for a while and put it off until after lunch. Then Mrs. Spick-and-Span calls and you want to see the new draperies in your room, but you're ashamed to take her up there because the beds aren't made.

When you come home and take off your street suit you know you ought to put the clothes on hangers and put them in an airy place. But you don't just feel like it, so you sling them down anywhere, or let them lie on the floor just as you stepped out of them. Afterward, when you are more tired, you have the trouble of picking them up and putting them away, after discovering they are full of wrinkles and will need pressing because you didn't "do it now."

Buttons aren't sewed on, rents aren't mended, the lingerie dress isn't ironed, the white shoes haven't been cleaned, the pet lace collar isn't wearable, the cobweb still dangles from the electric fixture, the dinner isn't ready on time, you aren't ready to start for the theatre—all because you haven't got that little command firmly imbedded in your being—"Do it now."

Health and Beauty Helps

The Rejuvenating Nap.

Summer days are long and joyous, and there is always a desire to make every moment count for pleasure, a feverish haste to crowd one good time upon another, ignoring fatigue. But look upon the exhaustion of outdoors and the exhilaration of ocean breezes or pine woods and the lure of chattering brooks, the signs of needed rest may not be noticed, but after the summer is over the "tired feeling," the very thing one went away to escape, is apt to show up with interest and manifest itself in aching muscles and lagging steps, and then you will wish you had tempered your summer with common sense.

All of which is by way of cautioning you to manage somehow wherever you are to match a bit of rest during the day. It is the best tonic, the most certain restorer available. American women have the reputation of looking fagged. In spite of the splendid efforts of the masseuse and the hair-dresser, it does not require very close scrutiny to find tell-tale signs of fatigue. The eyes become a trifle sunken; there are faint shadows around them; and in unguarded moments the lines about the mouth deepen. And do not think that this applies to the mamma only. It is the same with her daughters, even with

young girls. They look tired and one can fairly see their freshness slipping away from them just because of lack of proper rest and relaxation. A dragged out appearance is not conducive to beauty, you know, even in a beauty, and much less in the woman who needs every aid to make herself attractive.

In the middle of the day, say just after luncheon, throw yourself on a couch or a bed, better still, crawl into a comfortable hammock and let yourself be lulled to sleep by the gentle breeze. Let go of everything—of every nerve and muscle, and every thought.

Rest is just as essential as cosmetics. In fact, don't you see if you apply cosmetics to a face that is lined and sunken from lack of rest, you are simply rubbing in these lines. Give them a chance to do something for themselves first, then the cosmetics will, perhaps, prove valuable aids.

In the little slants you should take before dressing for the evening routine, don a comfortable robe and lounge. Stretch out first with your arms clasped above your head for a few moments, then relax, and drowse away a half hour or so. Of course, if you feel inclined, sleep, but never permit yourself, whether in bed for use night or just snatching a nap, to go to sleep with the arms above the head. It has

done, and if persisted in, sometimes far-reaching results. Always remove the hairpins from the head before taking a nap, and make it a practice to keep the mouth closed, breathing through the nostrils.

Breathing through the mouth, especially in sleep, causes the muscles of the lower part of the face to become unduly relaxed and the face to take on a most unpleasantly vacuous expression while, at the same time, it leaves the throat liable to various diseases. Start off to sleep with a little half-smile on your lips, allow a pleasant thought to float through your consciousness, and take a few deep breaths, and the first thing you know afterward you will have awakened from a refreshing slumber.

Weather Bureau for Flyers.

(United Press Special Wire)
Berlin, July 7.—Aerial navigation and travel by Zeppelin's aeroplanes and balloons has reached that point in Germany where the government is about to establish a special meteorological or weather bureau, especially for aerial navigation. In this way the government expects not only to prevent accidents by warning the flyers, but also to gather better scientific data upon conditions in the atmosphere which affect aerial navigation.

FOR BREAKFAST

Rice Porridge.—Place one-half pound of rice into three quarts of boiling water and let it stand until the rice has softened into a jelly. Add to this a quarter pound of oatmeal, mixed with water, and stir it in well. Add also about an ounce of finely chopped onion, one-half ounce of bacon fat or butter, salt and pepper to taste, and boil all together in a double boiler, stirring every little while until done. If desired the quantity of oatmeal may be larger. This porridge will be found to be an agreeable change from the usual corn, and children who have tired of the plain oatmeal or rice usually take to it with zest.

Real French Muffins.—Put an ounce of butter in a saucepan with half a pint of milk and warm slowly. Beat four eggs until they are frothy and add them to the milk. To this mixture add a medium sized cake of yeast which has been dissolved in warm water and then stir in very gradually a quart of flour. Butter well the muffin pans, pour each about half full and set in a warm place to rise. When well risen, bake lightly in a moderate oven. An appetizing method to serve is to cut them apart while they are very hot, place a generous piece of butter in each and put on the table at once. Never cut them up to do so makes them heavy.

Lemon Biscuits.—Into three and a half pounds of flour rub one pound of butter, mix in one and a half cups of sugar, and when the whole is absolutely smooth add eight drops of lemon essence, a teaspoon of salt, water, and sufficient milk to form a thick dough. After beating the dough smooth, divide it into pieces about the size of a walnut, flatten and cut out with a biscuit cutter, and bake till lightly colored in a moderate oven. Serve cold, when they are delicious, and keep in a tin canister.
