Anti-License Transfer Ordinance to Be Considered by Commission.

"I felt certain that Ledyard knew it was Lamar who was talking and not Palmer. My ear had become so attuned that I could hear him putting branch telephone lines on."

"I went to Ledyard and told him to Ledyard, because I knew Ledyard would think he had Lauterbach in a lie."

MRS. POINDEXTER'S SISTERS ATTACKED

Negro Accused of Crime in Fashionable Residence District of Capital.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Washington, July 8.—Several negroes were arrested today on suspicion of having committed a daring assault upon Mrs. May Jorgensen, sister-in-law of United States Senator Miles Poindexter of Washington.

Considerable mystery surrounds the attack. Mrs. Jorgensen was walking east Senator Poindexter's home, in a fashionable section of the city, when she was seized roughly by a negro who came up suddenly from behind.

Senator Poindexter is greatly incensed at the frequency of attacks upon white women by negroes, and it is probable that he will introduce in the senate a bill making more stringent the law against assault.

He said that he thought that the charges did not involve him although he admitted that several factions both inside the department and outside were trying to "get him."

MANDAMUS SUIT WILL BE ARGUED

Case Against County Clerk in Fees Issue Up Tomorrow.

The proceedings arose because Mr. Coffey refused to file papers in suits begun before he took office without repayment of fees. He held this necessary because of the failure of Frank S. Fields to turn over \$18,000 of county funds when he left office.

"In view of the fact that certain members of your old police force have failed in the past to perform the sworn duties of their office, thereby laying themselves open to prosecution under the laws of this state, and the further fact that your council has refused to confirm your new police appointments, undoubtedly for the purpose of further aiding the cohorts of booze and prostitution, please be advised that this office stands ready not only to name your appointees as special agents, but to render you promptly any and every assistance which you may request in your fight in behalf of the home and fire and against organized vice and its sympathizers."

Old Police Refuse to Go. The Dalles, Or., July 8.—Three of the appointments made here by the new mayor, Dr. J. E. Anderson, have been confirmed by the council. They are: C. L. White, city engineer; Dr. William Shakerford, city health officer; George Brown, fire warden.
