

Trout in Clackamas.



This is the case despite China's strong prohibition of the retail trade, and is direct con-travention of article 18 of The Hague convention signed by the powers. The question will, of course, have to be taken up by the governments concerned, it may be taken for granted the govern-ment will not ignore a protest signed by Americans living in Shanghai and supported with facts and figures which are incontestible. The Hague conven-tion was assembled at the invitation of the United States, and it goes without saying that it was not the intention of the United States that it should prove ineffective, a more face.
