BEAUTIFUL BEACH AT BANDON GETS CROWD THIS YEAR

Salmon Trolling, Deep Sea Fishing and Clamming Are Occupations; More Ambitious Amusements Open.

Bandon, Or., July 12.—Delightful weather is bringing more campers and summer visitors to this place than ever before. The camping grounds along the bluff overlooking the ocean are very near all occupied and the hotels are all full. Beach parties and other vacation stunts are in full swing. The clamming is better than for several years past and there is an abundance of crabs. Salmon trolling and deep sea fishing lure many parties out in the small boats every day. Of special interest to the visitors are the drills of the life saving crew; every available spot near the station being taken by spectators during the drills. Open air dances are also very popular and not even old age seems to dampen the ardor with which the merry couples trip the fantastic sea.

The walk along the beach has been rebuilt and the places where walking was difficult eliminated. Two entirely separate beaches, one protected from the south breezes and one from those coming from the north, make it possible to enjoy the bathing and pleasure of the beach at all times. To do other than enjoy Bandon's beach is as near the impossible as we get in these days of modern civilization. There is the great width of sand in which to lie and rest if you feel so disposed. If you love beauty there are the great clusters of rocks standing out of the water just beyond the white line of breakers, presenting untold possibilities for the day dreamer; the secret of the mask like face of the Sphinx Rock and a pretty story connected with the Indian legend of Cave Rock.

For the more ambitious adventurer there are numerous trips to the surrounding country or, on days when the ocean is smooth, to the rocks lying off the coast. On these rocks are to be found the nests and eggs of the sea birds, thousands upon thousands of eggs of all sizes and of many varieties, fishing from the rocks is a treat for the oldest fisherman.

Agates, shells, sea moss and other forms of sea life are abundant all along the beach. On the north side of the mouth of the Coquille river an agate beach stretches away for seven miles towards Cape Arago.

On the bluff, 100 feet above the ocean, nature has provided the most delightful spots imaginable for campers. Groves of trees for shelter and a view over the sea for miles with the beach right at one's feet bring to a reality any dreams he might have had of an ideal camp.

ALASKA TIMBER MADE INTO PAPER

Manufacturers Find Big Advantages of Power and Material in North.

Washington, July 12.—Bids have been received by the forest service for 300,000,000 feet of timber which has been advertised for sale on the Tongass National Forest, Alaska, and an additional 300,000,000 feet from the same forest has been applied for. A large part of this timber is Sitka spruce, which will be made into paper pulp, not only for the Pacific coast and Orient, but for the general pulp market.

The latest estimates available show that there is a stand of approximately 70,000,000,000 feet on the Tongass National Forest and approximately 25,000,000,000 feet on the Chugach National Forest, in Alaska. Recent investigations have shown this amount to be very much larger than was supposed. The Alaskan forests, in fact, contain approximately one-sixth of the total stand of timber on the national forests.

Annual Cut Increased.
The annual cut on the Tongass forest has increased gradually from zero at its creation in 1902 until it amounted to approximately 43,000,000 feet in the year 1912. This entire amount has been cut for local uses; largely for boxes to contain canned salmon. The latest large sale is remarkable in that it indicates a beginning of the utilization of Alaskan timber in the general markets.

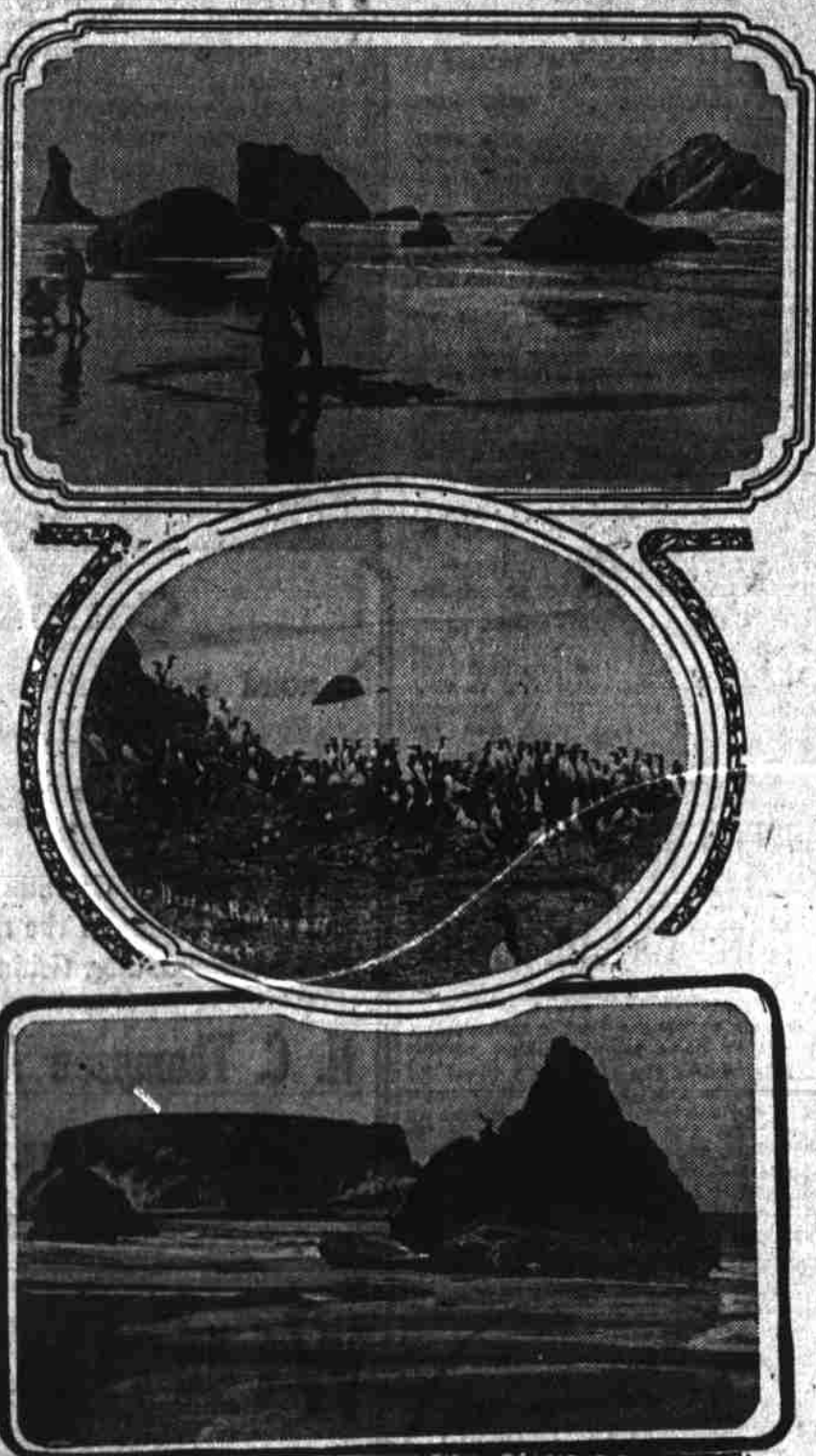
On the area on the Sitka river, for which bids have been received, the species to be cut include Sitka spruce, hemlock, red cedar, cottonwood and yellow cedar, and the minimum stumpage rates range from \$2.50 to \$1 per 1000 feet, according to species, the yellow cedar bringing the highest price. Another pulp company has made application for the other area, at the head of Thorne Arm, which company has had men examining timber lands in Alaska during a long period, in large areas, and has come to the conclusion that the Tongass timber offers the best opportunity it has seen.

Three Big Advantages.
The three great advantages which the paper manufacturers see in the finding in Alaska are abundant supplies of timber, cheap hydro-electric power and tidewater transportation—all of these in one and the same locality. Both areas adjoin deep water, and it is probable that the plants will be so located that ocean freighters can be loaded right at the mills.

A cutting period of 20 years will be allowed, with two years additional for construction work. The prices may be adjusted at five-year intervals to take care of possible advances in lumber values.

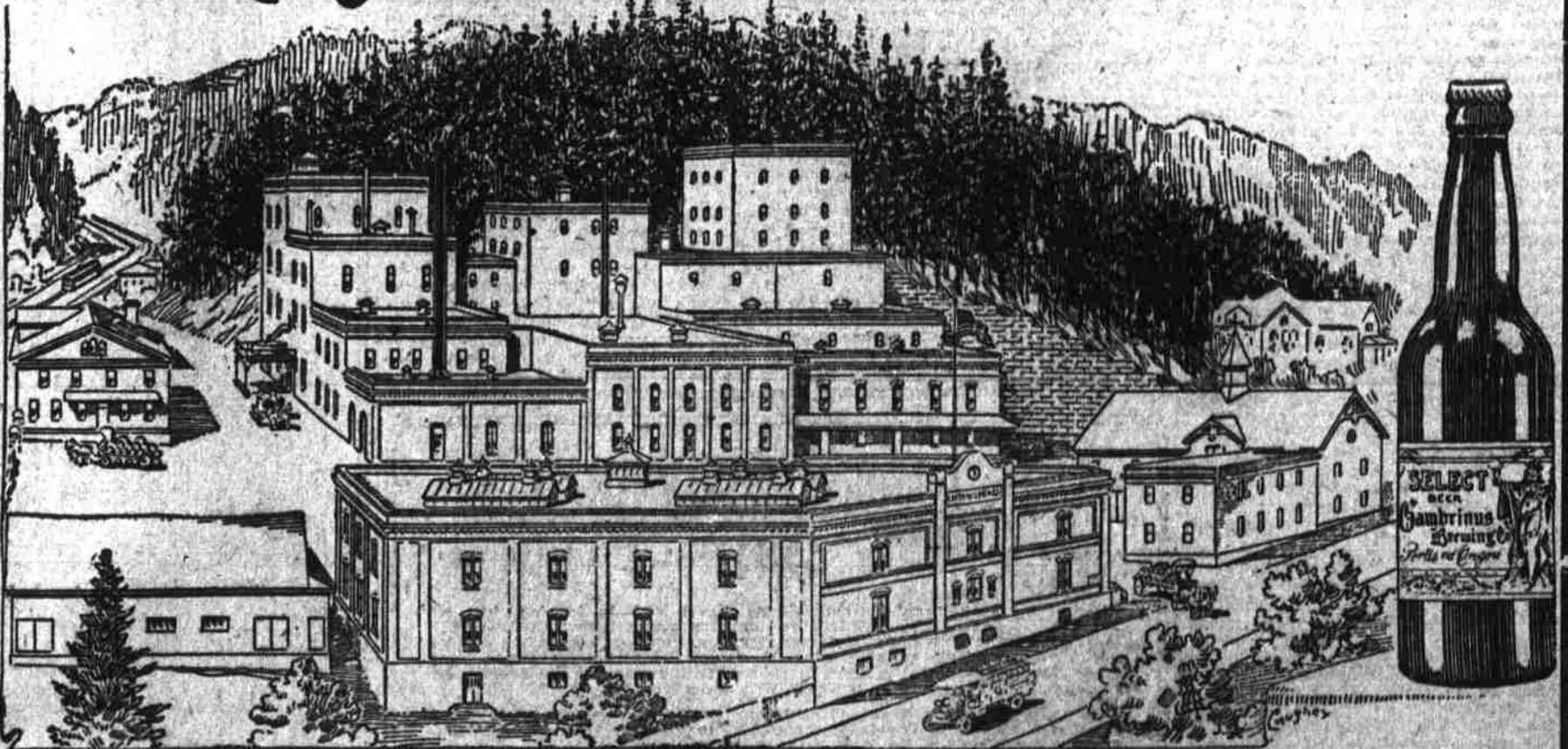
