

ANGLERS WILL CAST FLIES AND BAIT IN TOURNAMENT THIS WEEK

June Program Will Be Repeated With Each Day's Program Starting at 5:30 P. M.

Wednesday and Thursday evening of this week the Midtown Anglers club will hold its second fly and bait casting tournament at the Oaks park.

The first contest, held several weeks ago, was voted a big success, and the coming tournament is looked forward to with great interest by all local anglers.

Delicacy and accuracy fly casting, at buoy 35, 40, 45 feet from platform, record 99.9-15 per cent, by A. O. Godfrey.

Accuracy fly casting, at buoy, 60, 55, 50 feet from platform; record 98.9-15 per cent, by J. C. Myers.

Long distance fly casting with 8 ounce rods; record, 83 feet, by C. M. Godfrey.

Long distance fly casting, with heavy fly rods; record, 88 feet, by C. M. Godfrey.

One-half ounce bait casting for accuracy, at buoy, 63, 75, 90 feet from platform; record, 96.7-15 per cent, by N. E. Tyrrell.

One-half ounce bait casting for distance, best single cast, 140 feet, by Ray Winter; best average of five casts, 170 feet, by Dr. W. M. Campbell.

The first three events on the above list will be run off on Wednesday evening, and the balance of the program on Thursday. A casting platform of the regulation height has been built, which will give the casters the advantage of an extra foot of elevation, and this should help in establishing new records at the coming meet.

The events are open to all anglers, whether club members or not. All persons interested in angling are invited to attend, as there are ample accommodations for spectators.

Chess.

Frank J. Marshall gave two simultaneous chess matches last week. In the first performance, held on June 21, 31 players faced the American champion, who lost one game, drew five, one those with Miss Silvis, who has yet to see her tenth birthday, and won the rest. Two days later 39 players met the master, who won 27, lost 3 and drew 5. Portland's record of 26 participants will still stand as the coast record, unless Los Angeles surpasses it.

A summer tournament is at the present time in full swing in New York city. Captain Marshall, expert, who has held his own in cross-country play, against Leaker, Pillsbury, Showalter and other stars, was a welcome visitor at the rooms of the Eastern Chess club, last week and demonstrated in rather forceful style that he was a player of master rank.

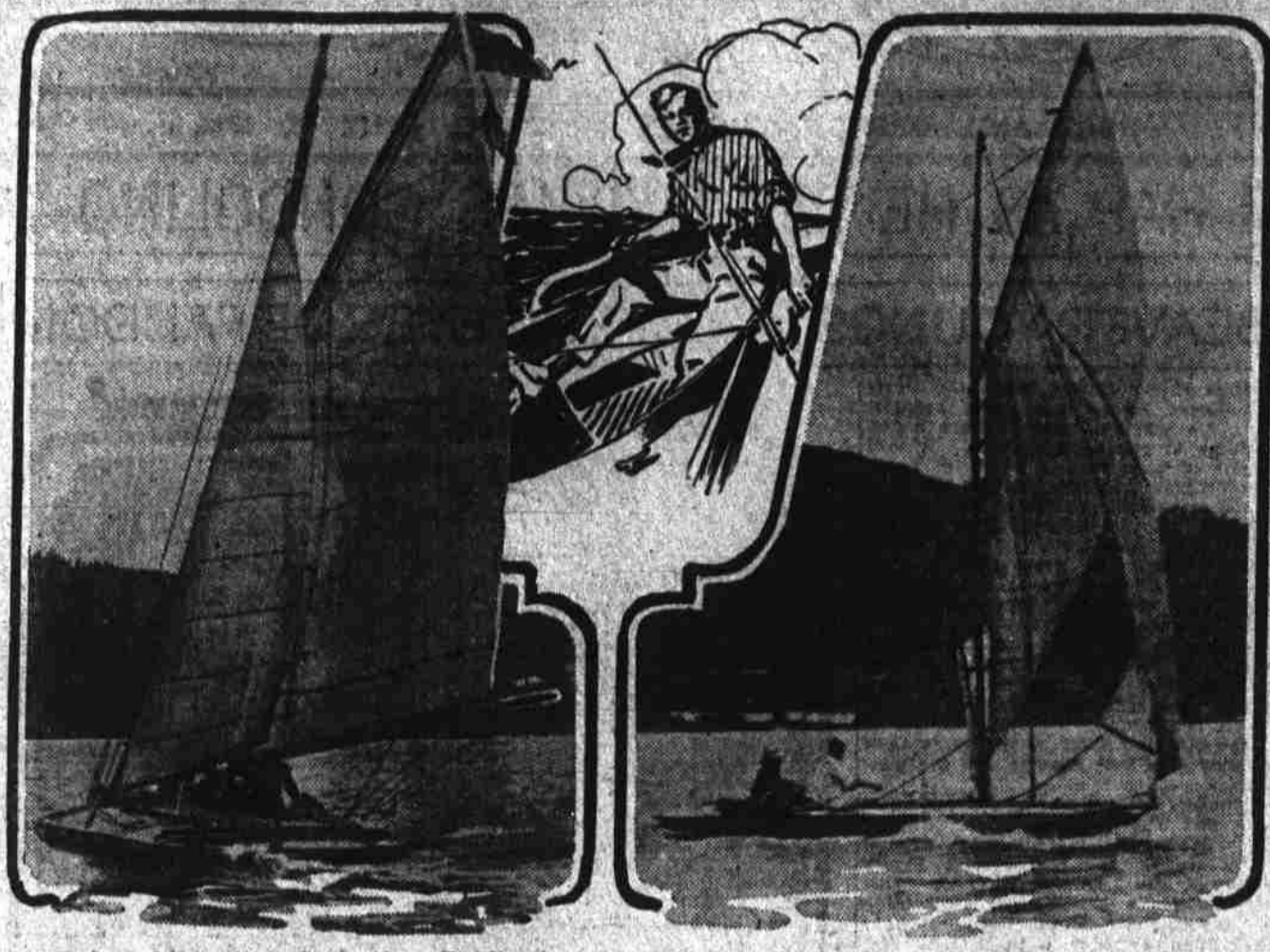
