LAND IN OREGON OPENED TO ENTRY

Washington, July 12.—On recommendation of Secretary of the Interior Lane, President Wilson has signed the enlarged homestead bill. Oregon has two sections, one in Willows county, the other in Klamath county. The first section consists of 340 acres, and is opened to entry on the basis of the report from the geological survey, while the second section consists of 1319 acres and is selected as non-irrigable on the basis of a report of the engineer of the reclamation service and data obtained from topographic maps in the survey. None of the lands in question are withdrawn in oil, phosphate or power site reserves.
