TRAVELING MAN OCCUPIES PILPIT

E. S. Hooper Urges Children to Honor Father and Mother.

At the First Universalist church, Broadway and East Twenty-fourth street, Sunday morning a large congregation greeted E. S. Hooper of Denver, a veteran commercial traveler, who has been coming to Portland the past twenty-five years. A. the invitation of the pastor, Dr. J. D. Corby, Mr. Hooper gave a talk on "Something Worth While."

It was an earnest message on the text "Honor thy father, and thy mother."

Mr. Hooper said in part: "I sometimes feel that the younger people who are growing up today in the mad rush for supremacy are not inclined to honor their fathers and mothers as they ought to do."

"I am a firm believer in ruling the child that God has entrusted to our care with a firmness yet with a gentleness and kindness that will inspire the best there is within him. I believe many a good father and mother make a serious mistake, though not intentional, in not setting an example before their children that would lead them to nobler things. There is no inspiration so holy, no influence so divine, as goes out from the Christian homes to the boy and to the girl from a good Christian father and mother."

"The deepest depths of our nature are awfully disturbed as we enumerate their virtues, and try to honor their lives. It is this influence that goes out from such a home which moulds the future of the child which sooner or later will be poured out into the life of society."

"My father was a Universalist minister for nearly 40 years, preaching that which he fervently believed to be true, namely, the universal brotherhood of God, the universal brotherhood of man, a just retribution for every sin, and final harmony and restoration of all mankind."

"I am glad that my faith is broad enough to believe that when a minister of the gospel, regardless of denomination, preaches that which he fervently believes to be true, and lives the exemplary life that my dear old father did, when the time comes for him to pass to the higher life that no greater obituary can be written of such a soul than to say, '...that he was made better for his having lived.'"

Mr. Hooper illustrated his talk with many striking stories and the business men in the congregation spoke their hearty congratulations for the fine message he gave.

AGED EMPLOYEE ADVISES STRIKERS; WOMAN IS SATISFIED WITH LOT

quarrel among her little tots at play. She would correct but not condemn.

"This is my first experience with a strike," declared Mrs. Walters, "and really I fail to see what it is all about. The officials of the company have treated us very well and the girls are able to make good money. Here am I, 75 years of age, and I make on an average of \$1 a week, which I consider very good for a woman of my age. Some of the others average \$2 a week. I know that if I could I could get on my feet, I would be a young girl."

"No doubt those youngsters on the outside think they are right in endeavoring to continue this strike, but I do not see how they can expect to gain anything by doing as they do in regard to the girls in the plant. Why shouldn't we work here if we are satisfied?"

Injured in a Fall.

"They do not always tell the truth, either, I have learned. The first day of the trouble I was so agitated by their threats that when I reached home I fainted and fell in falling my face struck a bannister. That gave me a black eye and the strikers said it was where Mr. McPherson had struck me with his fist. The ideal if he had struck me like that, I think I would be at liberty. Still that is one of the stories they tell."

"I think this trouble will come out all right. The girls at work in the plant are satisfied with conditions and with what they are making. I have heard them say so many times each day since this trouble began. If they are not satisfied they could easily quit. They have found other work before and they could no doubt do so again. There is only one thing, I want and that is to be left alone."

Distinctive Poison Tablets.

From the New York Herald.

Many recent cases have shown the necessity for poison tablets having a distinctive form and perhaps also a special color. Deaths have occurred from the taking of mistaken tablets that were thought innocuous, but which proved intensely poisonous. It is a question now of protecting persons against their own carelessness, for in most of the cases the poisonous material was in their possession under a physician's prescription. Many medical journals have insisted especially on some striking form. It would be quite ineffective to have the word "Poison" stamped on the tablets, for this word would not warn at night and often would fail to attract attention in moments of abstraction. Men and women must be guarded against their own carelessness. Probably the most striking form would be the triangle. If poisons, when sold in tablets, were always in this form the warning would be instantaneous, reaching even the subconscious as a rule, and effective, so far as guarding against such errors is possible. In order to assure uniformity national regulation in this matter would be of great value.
