

OREGON PLAN OF EDUCATION HELD TO BE FINE MODEL

National Educational Association Approves Plan of Credits and Indorses the School Garden Work.

Those who represented Oregon at the National Educational association convention in Salt Lake City have returned to their homes. L. R. Alderman, superintendent of Portland schools, reached the city this morning. O. M. Plummer, school director, came yesterday. Miss Grace B. DeGraff, president of the Portland Grade Teachers' association, Miss Alice V. Joyce of the Woodlawn school, Miss Goddard and Miss Wood of the Liberty association, and others have returned.

"I am mighty proud of Oregon and of Portland," said Superintendent Alderman's comment this morning.

Oregon's favorable recognition among the educators of the nation at this convention, The Oregon plan of practical education was upheld as a model for the entire country. The system of school credits for home work was given tribute. This plan, originated by Superintendent Alderman, The Portland school garden movement was commended its place of national leadership. The subject was presented by Miss Joyce. It was stated that Multnomah county had even rank with one other county in the possession of the best county library system in the United States. Miss Harriet Wood told about the libraries of Portland and Multnomah county. Miss Wood's paper was concerning English work.

Alderman Favored.

Five states supported Superintendent Alderman for the presidency of the National Educational association. Others asked him to become an active candidate. He is now president of the National Educational association. O. M. Plummer, school director, returned to Portland predicting Superintendent Alderman's election next year. C. L. Williston, noted eastern educator, in Portland today, said this morning.

"Superintendent Alderman is regarded as a man of first rank in the educational world. He would have had support for the presidency this year."

"I know where the lightning will strike this year or next, but Alderman is certainly progressing rapidly toward the presidency of the national organization."

Superintendent Alderman said this morning that he had not been an active candidate. He said it means a great deal of work to be head of such an organization. He did not say, however, that he would refuse the presidency if it came next year or the year following. He talked enthusiastically about the value of this year's convention.

Education's Wonderful Strides. "It showed that practical education has taken wonderful strides," said he. "The theme was education, that we get hold of the life of the child and fit him for the life about him. That former majority of those who educated by theory exclusively was this year so small a minority that you couldn't find them. To me, the theme of the year was education."

Superintendent Alderman especially complimented the work of Miss Joyce, Miss Wood and Miss Goddard. He said that School Director O. M. Plummer got into a grade teachers' meeting where school boards were getting a general and generous roast, that he stood up and said he was a school board member and thereupon made such a happy little speech that the grade teachers wanted to elect him an honorary member of their organization.

Miss DeGraff served as acting president of the National Grade Teachers' association.

WOMAN'S REPUBLIC COLONY IN OREGON

That he may establish in Oregon a colony similar to the one he has in California at the present time, is the statement of E. G. Lewis, founder of the Woman's National Republic, who is visiting this city. Mr. Lewis arrived here yesterday at the Gladstone Chautauqua and tomorrow to the Ad Club.

"Our colony in California is a great success," declares Mr. Lewis, "and it may be that we will establish one in Oregon later. I believe that the opportunities here are very fine."

"We have 23,000 acres in our colony near Paso Robles and are developing it for the use of city men who wish to retire to the country without experiencing the pioneering necessary. By co-operation we are able to do this. It is not a land selling deal, and we have prospective residents interested before we purchase an acre of ground. Our colony in California will be opened to citizens in 1915."

SEEKING INVENTORY OF CITY PROPERTIES

City Commissioner C. A. Bigelow will this afternoon direct J. R. Wood, city purchasing agent, to secure from the heads of the various city departments an inventory of property of each department.

"I believe," said Commissioner Bigelow this morning, "there are a number of pieces of property scattered over the city not being used by the departments which control them. By securing an inventory of this property I think the city will be able to distribute the land for use in departments where there is need."

"My attention was called to this when I noticed a strip of land near East Twenty-first and Fremont streets, about 200 feet long. The piece is vacant and I understand the department which controls it has no present use for it. This would be an ideal spot for a playground."

Purchasing Agent Wood will be out of his office until late this afternoon, when the matter will be taken up with him. He is on a tour of inspection of all the city shops and buildings to learn for himself the necessities of each.

PLACES ORDERED TO BE CLEANED

City Health Officer Finds Insanitary Conditions in Certain Quarters.

Sanitary conditions in the district north of Burnside street between Front and Sixth streets are fearful, according to City Health Inspector Marcellus, who this morning made a personal inspection of a number of restaurants, saloons and buildings in that district. After inspecting the places and noting the filth Dr. Marcellus ordered them to be cleaned by five days or they would be closed by his department and the owners would be liable to arrest.

"At some places that I visited," said Dr. Marcellus, "sanitary conditions are awful. In a restaurant on Burnside street run by a Japanese, I found that one room at the rear of the dining room was used for a pantry, kitchen, bathroom and bedroom. Three people sleep on cots in this room."

"A number of buildings in that district still have the overflow water from the river in their basements. The owners have been instructed to clean up these basements immediately."

Dr. Marcellus says that he got the sanitary inspectors just in time, for there is a great deal of work for his office to accomplish before sanitary conditions in the city are the best.

ENDEAVORERS COMING HOME VIA PORTLAND

Los Angeles, July 15.—Delegates to the International Christian Endeavor convention are leaving Los Angeles today. The convention was closed last evening by a general meeting.

The total registration of out-of-town delegates was 10,001. A majority of these are returning on their homes via Oregon and the northwest.

At its final meeting the convention adopted resolutions opposing the liquor traffic and condemning child labor.

BALKAN WAR CAUSES FIGHT IN PORTLAND

"Let the Greeks and Bulgars fight their own battles. You lads keep out of it. The trouble is all over there, and not in Portland."

This is the advice Judge Stevenson of the municipal court gave two young fellows before him this morning. In which Isaac Jakes, a Turkish Jew, was accused by Samuel Manius, a Greek, of making threats against his life. Manius had a shoe polishing stand at Eleventh and Washington streets, and Jakes operates a restaurant nearby. The judge said he was a fair man and that he would not create trouble and continued the case for one month.

COUNCIL TO HANDLE GREAT GRIST OF BILLS

There are 578 measures to be brought up before the city council at the meeting tomorrow, making the longest calendar of business ever undertaken by a city legislative body of Portland. While the majority are of routine nature, several will probably require considerable attention.

The official calendar of council business is printed 24 hours before the council meeting. Only enough copies of these calendars have heretofore been printed to supply the needs of the members of the body and others at the city hall, but arrangements have been made to hereafter print 200 copies. These will be for distribution to the public.

TWENTY-TWO INSANE HAVE BEEN EXAMINED

Twenty-two persons have been examined for insanity in Multnomah county in the first 15 days of July and two were found sane. Yesterday four patients were taken to the asylum by attendants. Three of these were the youths who are being sent to the asylum for treatment for the drug habit. They are John Holt, William Rose and Harry Mullis. They objected to being strapped, but this was thought necessary, as they might break from the officers when they began to realize that they were being taken from all possibility of getting drugs. Judge Stevenson of the municipal court is responsible for giving them a chance to be cured of their habits.

GROWTH OF CITY CONTINUES GREAT

Electric Company Must Spend \$1000 a Day to Keep Up With Pace.

So rapidly does Portland grow that to keep pace with expansion it costs the Portland Railway, Light & Power company \$1000 a day for wiring and small installations, said President Franklin T. Griffith of the company, in an address before the Rotary club at luncheon in the Commercial club this afternoon.

"We are endeavoring to meet our obligations to the people and to render service of a high order," said President Griffith. His subject was the "Community of Interest Between Corporation and the People." He told the club men some other interesting things about his company.

He said, for instance, that only one other city than Portland in Oregon has a population greater than the employees of the company and those dependent on them. The number is 15,000. Salem has a population of 18,000. He proceeded to show how much the company contributes daily to the public fund, saying that it costs \$1500 a day in taxes and licenses, or about 7 per cent of the company's gross daily income, which is in the neighborhood of \$20,000. He was careful to illustrate the difference between gross and net earnings.

"The public wants good service," said President Griffith. "The corporation wants to make earnings on its investment. The mutual interest of the public and the corporation is the basis of the same time. The company should give a full measure of service for a reasonable fee. But the company should be regarded more in the light of a service giver than a revenue producer. It shouldn't be the target of excessive taxation. If taxation is excessive it means either a limitation in service or the putting of the excess cost on the public in the form of charges for service."

TO SHOW PLUMBERS ARE NOT "ROBBERS"

"Insist upon first class plumbing in your home and avoid many doctors' bills," is the propaganda that the plumbers of the Northwest association will spread by means of legislation if plans under consideration at the eighth annual convention now in session at the Labor temple are put through.

"Prevention rather than cure" is the slogan of the convention, it being the contention that not a little of the sickness which mankind suffers is due directly to faulty sewerage, drains and plumbing in general. This matter and matters of other legislation relating to the interests of the plumbers will be taken up through northwest delegates to the annual national convention of plumbers to be held in Boston on August 18.

The local convention also is considering plans intended to put plumbers before the public in a new light, and one that will dispel the apparent current impression that all plumbers are "robbers."

Oregon, Washington, Montana, Idaho and western Canada are represented at the convention, with about 25 delegates present. David H. Smith of Seattle is presiding, with J. H. Letch of Hoquiam, Wash., as secretary.

Election of officers will probably be held tomorrow and sessions may be held through the week.

WILL PLANT SALMON IN IDAHO STREAMS

To try the experiment of "planting" chinook salmon farther up stream than has ever been attempted heretofore, Master Fish Warden E. E. Clinton and E. F. Jewell will leave tonight for Swan Falls, Idaho, taking with them a quantity of the spawn.

While the chinook has often been seen that far in the Snake river the plan of encouraging the propagation is new. Mr. Jewell will have charge of the establishment while the fry are developing and will report his observations.

PORTLAND MAN NOT BADLY HURT IN WRECK

Friends of F. Unger, a former Portland man who was injured in the wreck of two Pacific Electric trains near Los Angeles Sunday night have heard from him and say that he is not dangerously hurt. He was somewhat bruised and cut but after treatment at the Clara Barton hospital, was able to leave unattended.

SUFFRAGIST PHONES FAMILY SHE'S MARRIED

Bolssewein is a son of Charles Bolssewein, a rich coffee planter of the island of Java. He is also connected with the Marconi company. The marriage was performed in the South Kensington registry office. A civil ceremony also was performed in Amsterdam.

WOMEN TESTIFY AGAINST STRIKER AT PACKING PLANT

Six Men Compose Jury in the Case; Mrs. Mary Schwab, Defendant, Denies Using Abusive, Profane Language.

A jury of six men is hearing the four charges against Mary E. Schwab in the municipal court, where she is charged with being disorderly and using abusive and profane language as a striker at the Oregon Packing company plant. The hearing began yesterday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock, continued until 6 o'clock, and was continued until this afternoon at 2 o'clock.

The jury is composed of Frank T. Berry, Henry Wilkinson, F. E. Beach, James Hlop, E. B. Holmes and R. P. Dean. It was intended to hold a session last night, but Juror Berry failed to return at 7 o'clock, as he misunderstood the court's instructions. Attorney John Jeffrey represents Mrs. Schwab.

Mrs. Martha E. Daniels, 669 East Washington street, a worker in the plant, testified she was eating lunch near a window July 5, when Mrs. Schwab called her vile names. The witness said she was married, her husband being ill. She had no complaint against conditions in the plant or the wages.

Mrs. Maggie Parvin, 383 East Yamhill street, testified she heard Mrs. Schwab call the names and make remarks about Mrs. Daniels. The witness said she had four children to support. Mrs. Anna Olendorf, 380 East Yamhill street, testified she took her mother's lunch to the plant, and was near Mrs. Daniels when the remarks were made. Mrs. Schwab denied using vile language or calling Mrs. Daniels names. She declared she had better training and had never used such language toward anyone. She further testified she was born in Russia and had lived nine years in Philadelphia, came to Portland with her husband, who was unable to get work, and they joined the strikers, her husband getting \$15 a week as an organizer for the Industrial Workers of the World.

Other charges against strikers and others arrested in connection with the strike are to be heard this afternoon and Wednesday.

Owing to a lack of berries due to the fact that there was no picking Sunday, the force of the Oregon Packing company was greatly reduced today. It was said at the plant that a full force would be at work again tomorrow and that there was no strike in the general situation.

A small crowd of strike sympathizers were gathered on the vacant lot opposite the plant as usual but there was no interference with the packing company.
