

HOW RABIES MAY BE DETECTED AND ITS TREATMENT

State Health Board Issues
Bulletin on Hydrophobia
and Proper Measures to Be
Taken.

Marshall Woman Bitten.
Joseph Norton, proprietor of the Olympia hotel, Sixth and Irving streets, received word today from Marshallfield that his daughter, Mrs. Charles Norton, had been bitten by a pet dog one week ago. Although the wound has been cauterized three times it is still causing some trouble. In view of the recent cases of hydrophobia in this city Norton has requested his daughter to come here immediately for the Pasteur treatment.

In response to inquiries received by The Journal as to the course to be pursued in securing treatment for the bite of a dog the inquirer is referred to the state board of health, whose office is in the Selling building, this city.

The board makes no charge for consultation or the administering of the virus which is furnished free of charge by the officers in charge of the national Hygienic laboratory at Washington on request. The only expense entailed by the patient is the necessarily enforced stay of three weeks in this city while being treated.

In instances where the time elapsed since the patient was bitten has been considerable, the virus can be obtained by writing to the California state hygienic laboratory at Berkeley.

In this case there will be a charge covering the cost of the manufacture of the virus to the state of California. Treatments previously furnished from this source have cost approximately \$20 each.

In view of a situation that may become serious unless active measures are taken the national and state health authorities are anxious to cooperate and provide the virus absolutely free.

Emergency Treatment.
In a recent bulletin issued by the Oregon state board of health the following advice is given in case of a dog bite:

"The wound should be immediately cauterized with nitric acid and dressed antiseptically. If the wound is deep, involving the periosteum or the eye, it should be washed with a bichloride of mercury solution.

"As the organism causing the disease is probably a protozoan, theoretically a saturated solution of quinoline would be an ideal dressing. However, this is purely problematical. The patient is advised not to depend on peroxide or turpentine.

The board also recommends that the animal should never be killed, but should be confined in some enclosure and kept in confinement for a definite length of time. If the animal does not show any symptoms of rabies after being confined for a week or ten days the matter may be dismissed. If the dog is rabid it will certainly die.

Save Dog's Brain.
"In killing an animal it is suggested that it be killed in such a manner as not to destroy the brain, which should be preserved. After the animal is dead its head should be separated from the body and sent to the state board of health for examination.

"Upon receiving a report that in the brain has been found positive evidence of rabies the person bitten should immediately report to the state board of health for treatment.

"The symptoms of rabies first manifest themselves in a change in the dog's disposition. Usually it becomes more sulky and exhibits a restless spirit, wandering away from home. It also shows a tendency to snap and bite anything that moves. Other symptoms are a change of voice, refusing food and usually drink, but attempting to eat indigestible things like stones, leather, dirt, etc. During the early stages of the disease a rabid dog can drink water and the word hydrophobia is really a misnomer.

Symptoms of Rabies.
"A rabid dog does not froth at the mouth and does not always have fits. "Betting a pan of water in front of him and expecting, as is the popular belief, that he will throw a fit for diagnostic purposes is an error. These are symptoms of furious rabies.

"In dumb rabies the lower jaw is paralyzed early and drops down. "The animal acts as though it had a foreign body in its throat and persons are frequently inoculated in an attempt to remove an imaginary bone from the dog's throat. The animal will also show a tendency to tremor with a possible blindness of the right eye and a gradually increasing paralysis, usually beginning in the left hind leg and becoming total and ending in death.

"The symptoms in all other animals are somewhat similar. "The period that a dog with rabies will live varies from 48 hours to nine days."
