Insurance Company Pays Taxes.—On recommendation of Assessor Reed, the county commissioners yesterday accepted \$715.55 tendered by the Columbia Life Insurance company in payment of 1912 taxes. The company was assessed for \$200,000 capital stock, but District Attorney Evans held that it was illegal to assess capital stock and that only assets of the company could be assessed. A sworn statement of the assets of the company valued them at \$40,653.95 and an 80 per cent valuation was taken as the basis of the tax at 22 mills. The list of assets was: Cash, \$23,035.18; bills receivable, \$16,614.76; furniture and office fixtures, \$1,000.

Ex-Chief Holman Meeting Easy.—Rapidly recovering from a stroke of apoplexy he suffered yesterday Robert Holman, former chief of the Portland fire department, is resting comfortably today at the home of his brother, Ted Holman, on his ranch east of the city. Mr. Holman is 74 years old and has served the city in a number of capacities. He was chief of the old volunteer fire department and was also chief of the paid department under Mayor Penoyer. Afterward, under Mayor Rowe, he was captain of police. No alarm is felt over his present condition.

Goes Into Bankruptcy.—Dennis J. Cummins, of Springfield, Lane county, has filed a voluntary petition in bankruptcy in the federal court. He is a farmer and saloonkeeper, saying he has been in partnership with W. T. Parsons in the liquor business at Oakland. The Northern Pacific Brewing company of Astoria has levied execution upon the stock he declares. Cummins lists his liabilities at \$4,596 with his clothing as his only assets.

First Universalist Church Meeting.—The regular monthly meeting of the First Universalist church, East Twenty-fourth and Broadway streets, will be held tomorrow afternoon at Columbia hall. An excellent program has been arranged by Mrs. A. Kiehn and S. Williams, the committee of arrangements. All members of the church are urged to attend the meeting. In case of bad weather the meeting will be held in the social hall of the church.

Commissioners Hold Rehearsal.—The latest plan to be adopted by the city commissioners is to hold rehearsals of legislative meetings so that the work of the regular council sessions can be put through without loss of time. The first rehearsal was held yesterday afternoon in the office of City Auditor Barbur. Most of the measures, petitions and other matters on today's calendar of business were discussed.

Motorboat Owners Charged.—Assistant United States Attorney Sumrall this morning filed information in the federal court charging ten motorboat owners with failing to provide proper fire extinguishers for their craft. None of the owners has been arrested. The law does not prescribe any particular form of extinguisher, but insists that some safeguard must be provided.

Big Cherries Exhibited.—There is on exhibition today at the Portland Commercial club a 10-pound box of Lambert cherries that were raised in Eagle Valley, eastern Oregon, near Baker, by Matt Welter. The cherries, which are large in size, were grown at an altitude of 3440 feet. They demonstrate the adaptability of eastern Oregon to fruit raising.

Buss for \$10,000 Damages.—The city of St. Johns and the Peninsula Sand & Gravel company are made defendants in a \$10,000 personal injury suit brought

in the circuit court yesterday by E. J. Daleat. Daleat lived in a snow on Columbia avenue near the end of the trestle leading from McCrum street to St. Johns. March 28, in the darkness of the evening, he walked from the end of the trestle and fell about 30 feet to the deck of a dredge, breaking his collar bone and shoulder, according to the complaint. He alleges that the municipality and company were negligent in not furnishing a railing or lights.

Patrolmen Are Reinstated.—Patrolmen Charles A. Inskeep and R. L. Phillips were reinstated last night at a meeting of the civil service board held in the city hall. Testimony in the case of Mrs. Isabella Simmons, ex-police matron, discharged when found guilty of taking some stolen goods from the police station, was taken. Her case was taken under advisement. Patrolman Inskeep, resigned from the department several months ago, after taking examination for captaincy. He left for southern Oregon, but both he and Phillips are now back in the police department.

Complaints to Commissioner.—Telephone police serve as a picket fence in front of the home of Perry J. Green, of 540 East Twenty-sixth street, according to a letter sent City Commissioner Daily today. Mr. Green states that already there are two sets of poles in front of his home, and the Home Telephone people is putting in another set. Mr. Green wants them to put these in the parking lot across the street, on some other street. Mr. Daily will investigate the complaint.

Dies as Result of a Fall.—A laborer giving the name of August W. Klink died yesterday afternoon at the St. Vincent hospital of a broken neck. The man fell down the stairway at the Terminus rooming house on Third and Everett streets. The body lodged between the stairway and an adjoining building. Mr. Yuasa, night man at the hotel, saw the man, but thought he was intoxicated, therefore did not assist him to his feet. Yuasa is held a witness.

IN EARLIER DAYS

By Fred Lockley.

"Day before yesterday I married my 450th couple," said Rev. P. S. Knight, pioneer Congregational minister of Salem.

"I have been in the harness 56 years. The second marriage I performed was that of my sister, Lucy Knight, to J. J. Wintler, on September 15, 1861."

Sitting in his study room at his home in Salem we looked over the book with the record of marriages he has performed during the past 56 years.

"Here is an unusual record," said Mr. Knight. "On the day before Christmas, in 1868, I married Memory N. Chapman and Jennie Thatcher. Twenty years later, on April 11, 1888, I married their daughter, Lora, and 21 years later, in 1899, I married her daughter, so I have married Mr. and Mrs. Chapman, their daughter and their daughter's daughter. I have married 47 children whose parents I also married."

"I have officiated at over 1400 funerals and I have baptized hundreds of the children of those whom I have married. I recently drove 16 miles to marry a couple and the groom handed me a silver dollar as my fee. At another time many years ago I married a miner who handed me \$50. Some years ago I traveled 520 miles to perform a marriage ceremony."

"Here is the record of Squire Farrar whom I married to Miss Ellen H. Hatch on May 11, 1867. I have performed the marriage ceremony for him three times. 'The people I have married have scattered to the four corners of the world. A good many of them are in Portland. On December 7, 1867, I married W. C. Noon and Addie Good. He became a wealthy merchant of Portland."

On October 3, 1872, I married T. W. Davidson, the father of Homer Davidson, to Nancy E. Wisner."

"On June 16, 1874, I married Perry Raymond and Edna Dickinson. Few people are better known in Salem than they are. The wife was the daughter of Rev. O. Dickinson, the pastor of the Congregational church."

"On Christmas day, in 1874, I married Owen D. Hutton and Sarah E. Barker, the parents of the wife of Governor West, and on September 23, 1897, I married their daughter, Mabel Hutton, to Oswald West, our present governor. Another daughter recently married Benjamin W. O'Connell, secretary of state."

"On May 14, 1884, I married Cyrus B. Woodworth and Kate A. Applegate. Mr. Woodworth for many years has had a position with Ladd & Tilton's Bank in Portland."

"On December 7, 1887, I performed the marriage ceremony for O. E. Krauss and Lizzie Dalrymple. Mr. Krauss is now at the head of a wholesale shoe company in Portland. In May, 1891, I married Benjamin Irwin and Laura Minto. She is a granddaughter of John Minto, an Oregon pioneer, still living in Salem, and one of Oregon's most useful citizens. On October 26, 1895, I married E. P. McCord."

'WINDOW' LETTERS ARE UNDER THE BAN

Postoffice Department Will Regulate Transparent Envelopes.

"Window" envelopes have been placed under ban by the postoffice department at Washington and, after January 1, 1914, such forms of mail wrappings may be used only under specified conditions. Orders to that effect have just been received by Postmaster Myers.

The "window" envelopes, which are made with transparent space at the address, written on the letter enclosed, will show through, have been a bother to postoffice employees ever since they were introduced, it is said. The new order requires that the transparent portion must not exceed 5½ inches in length nor 1½ in width, and it must be more than 1½ inches from the top. Unless the address is plainly visible, or if the return address of the sender is not printed on the outside, the letter will be sent to the dead letter office. This will be the haven of every "window" letter which does not exactly conform to the conditions imposed by the department.

GIRL RESCUED WHILE SINKING THIRD TIME

Hazel Bernard, 16 years old, daughter of J. A. Bernard, 1824 Duval street, narrowly escaped drowning in Columbia slough Monday afternoon. The girl was seized with cramps while in swimming. She was rescued by William Grant of Portsmouth as she was sinking for the last time.

The accident was witnessed by 8-year-old playmate of the little girl. Grant was moving hay in the vicinity of the slough when he heard the screams of Miss Bernard and her companion. Rushing to the water he leaped in, risking his own life in getting the half unconscious girl to shore.

Dr. Oscar Deval of Portsmouth was summoned. The girl was taken to her home. She was reported today as recovering from her experience, having suffered no serious injury, although after being taken out of the water she bled from the nose and mouth.
