**Gets Damages from Rock Company.**—Patrick Phalin was yesterday given \$1000 damages against the Riverside Rock company by a jury in Circuit Judge Davis' court. Phalin was cook at a camp near Corbett. A blast exploded while he was in range of the debris and his arm and shoulder were struck and broken by rocks. He alleged that the blast was set off while he was preparing supper and that he did not have time to get to safety. The company alleged that he ran far enough to get out of range of the debris but that he took the wrong direction. The accident occurred last October. He asked \$10,000 damages.

**Funeral Held of Ira S. Hill.**—The funeral of Ira S. Hill, who died July 15, after a brief illness, took place yesterday at the family home, 127 East Seventh street North. Interment was made in Riverside cemetery. Mr. Hill was born in Polk county, but came when a child to Portland. He was a member of the Presbyterian church. As a member of the Portland Yacht club his name stood for loyal comradeship and clean sport. The deceased is survived by his wife and 5-year-old son, his mother, Mrs. Mary G. Hill, and a sister, Mrs. M. D. Brand.

**Eight Widows' Pensions Granted.**—Eight widows' pensions were granted yesterday by Judge Gatens and ten more warrants were paid to pensioners, making a total of 51 pensions granted and paid, and a total of \$1160 paid out for the first month during which the pension law has been effective. Thirteen were not allowed for various reasons, making 55 applications turned down to date. Applications now number 211.

**Mothers' Plea Saves Son.**—A mother's plea saved Olin J. Woods from serving a penitentiary sentence yesterday. She substantiated the statement of her son that he was drunk at the time he passed

bad checks and declared with tears in her voice that he had never been in trouble before. Circuit Judge Gatens sentenced the boy, who is 20 years old, to two years in the penitentiary and paroled him to Juvenile Officer McIntosh. He pleaded guilty to the charge against him.

The auto was driven by J. Fortelius of the Oregon hotel. A high embankment at the street corner prevented the driver and cycle rider from seeing each other. The patrolman was slightly bruised. His machine was damaged considerably.

**Bartender Fined \$100.**—E. A. Palmer, bartender for the Walters club, was found guilty in the municipal court of serving liquor on Sunday. The club was raided last Sunday by the police and 27 men were taken in custody. A charge of gambling was also placed against Palmer and the 27 men, but the court dismissed that case on the ground that gambling had not been proven. A fine of \$100 was given Palmer. The case will be appealed to the circuit court.

The accident occurred before Circuit Judge Davis. Sourada was a choker for the company and received a fractured skull when hit by an alder tree which had been struck by a log being moved. The company alleges negligence on his part.

lice orders. He was fined \$10 this morning by Judge Stevenson, who told him he should have assisted the police instead of causing them trouble.

Sergeant Barnes arrested. Fines for abusive language at the Oregon Packing company plant. He was fined \$20. J. Spencer and Buden were found guilty of vagrancy by reason of loitering around

the plant. Both men admitted they had no business there, neither as picket nor as worker. Both had been warned to keep away.

Hearing on most of the cases will be taken up after today. Persons charged with inciting a riot waived preliminary hearing, and will go direct to the grand jury. Small ball was asked in the minor cases, while heavier ball is required from those charged with rioting.

In each case this morning Judge Stevenson cautioned each person about future conduct, directing that all orders of the police must be obeyed. Any violation of this order means action by the court.

## IMMIGRATION LAW QUOTED, IN VIEW OF STRIKE ISSUE HERE

Several persons of foreign birth being involved in the strike trouble, Immigration Inspector Barbour this morning gave Assistant City Attorney Stadler a copy of the immigration law, at the same time making an inquiry of persons who may come within this act. The laws in section 38 of the immigration laws of 1910, and reads as follows:

"Persons who are disbelievers in or who are opposed to all organized government, or who is a member of or affiliated with any organization entertaining and teaching such disbelief or teaches the duty, necessity or propriety of unlawful association or killing of any officer or officers, either of specific individuals or officers generally, of the government of the United States or of any other organized government, because of his her or their official position, shall be permitted to enter the United States or any territory or place subject to the jurisdiction thereof. That any person who knowingly aids or assists any such person to enter the United States or territory or place subject to the jurisdiction thereof in pursuance to such regulations made by the secretary of commerce and labor shall be fined not more than \$5000, or imprisoned for not more than five years, or both."

## IN EARLIER DAYS

"Stonewall Jackson is a relation of mine," said Thomas B. Jackson of Salem. "I was born in Leesburg, Va., on March 2, 1831. Though I am 82 years old, I have never spent a day in bed from sickness since I was 14 years old, when I had the smallpox. I came to Oregon in 1850, settling in Portland. I got a job in the store of Noythrup & Simmons. Next spring I went to Yreka. I ran a feed corral and pasture. We pastured the stock on the Shasta plains. We got a dollar per night per yoke for pasturing oxen, so you see there was good money in it. From Yreka I went to the Applegate country. During the Rogue River Indian war I hired out to Jerome B. Walling, who was operating a ferry on Rogue river, as a guard to keep the Indians from running off his stock. Later he put me in charge of his store at the ferry. I made a stockade and put up a blockhouse. The charge for a team to cross the ferry was \$5. The ferry and store were a perfect gold mine, but there was constant danger from the Indians. Mr. Walling left for Amity and told me to sell out if I could. I sold to a man named Perkins for several thousand dollars in gold. I took the money to Amity to turn it over to Mr. Walling.

"He got me to stay and help him build a house at Amity. I married his daughter that fall. Being married, I secured a donation land claim and considered Amity my home for the next 20 years. During this time one Haines, nephew of a man who invented a heading machine, came to Amity with the iron parts for two headers. A. S. Watts secured them and gave me one set of irons for making the wooden parts and putting up the other machine. I built the two machines. This was in 1854. My helper who dressed the lumber was P. S. Knight, then a carpenter and now a preacher who has lived in Salem for 50 years.

"The headers worked fine. Prior to this they cut the grain with cradles. In 1856 I took my header to the Rogue River valley where I sold it to W. K. Ish. Elijah Lansfield of Amity hired me to build a large number of headers. He got \$400 apiece for them. "In 1861 I went to the Grand Ronde agency to fix up the sawmill and gristmill. I was there three years, as they made me agency clerk.

"In 1864 I came to Salem and helped build the big flour mill. It was put up by Grover, Miller & Waldo. "In 1870 I put in the machinery to break flax at the penitentiary and also put in a water wheel and installed the waterworks. I was given a position at the penitentiary and worked there seven years. I resigned there to take the position of assistant secretary of state under S. F. Chadwick. I was appointed carpenter at the asylum, where I remained for 14 years. I left there to become carpenter at the Chemawa Indian school. I resigned from there. I thought I was entitled to take it easy after being on the job for 60 years or more."

## FIFTH OF LA BERGE FAMILY IS ARRESTED

In the arrest last evening of Eva Bridgeham for larceny, the fifth member of the La Berge family is taken into custody for petty crime. Two brothers are now serving terms in the state prison for burglary. A sister is serving

one year in the county jail for shoplifting, while the father has been halled before the municipal court time and again for drunkenness.

Eva Bridgeham was formerly Eva La Berge. She is 19 years old. E. L. Bridgeham, 24 years old, her husband, was also arrested. They are accused of taking \$350 worth of jewelry from the apartments of Mrs. Barr in the South-hampton, Tenth and Hall streets. Bridgeham looked at apartments while his wife took the jewelry. Detectives Vaughn and Price made the arrests. They found two trunks loaded with plunder in the room occupied by Bridgeham and wife at East Sixth and Harrison streets.

## ROBINSON SECURES LIBERTY UPON BAIL

W. W. Robinson succeeded today in furnishing the necessary \$10,000 bond exacted by United States Commissioner A. M. Cannon in the case wherein he is charged with conspiring with E. K. Oppenheimer to conceal the assets of the bankrupt Robinson & Co. clothing store.

Those who agreed to stand sponsor for Robinson's appearance when required are: Ben Selling, Philip Grossmeyer, Robert Lutke, Jack King, Theo Kruse and Adam Mueller, who furnish \$1000 each, and F. L. Kelly and Emmet Drake, who furnish \$2000 each.

It had not been decided, pending the final negotiations for bond, whether Robinson would waive preliminary hearing, but Commissioner Cannon said he expected that such a hearing would be held.

Robinson was released over night on \$7000 temporary bond.

## HIGHWAYS IN RAINIER FOREST INSPECTED

Inspection of highways through the Rainier forest reserve will be begun tomorrow by Assistant District Forester Charles H. Flory and Warren Allen of the office of public works. The road is now under construction jointly by Pierce county, Washington, and the United States forest service.

When this work is completed the party will proceed to the McKenzie district, east of Eugene, where Governor Oswald West and the state road engineer will join it and go over the site of a proposed highway. The state and forestry officials will make recommendations on the expenditure of the 10 per cent portion of the national forest rev-

enues to which the state is by law entitled for road building.

## BOOTH SLOW TO ACCEPT PLACE ON '15 FAIR BODY

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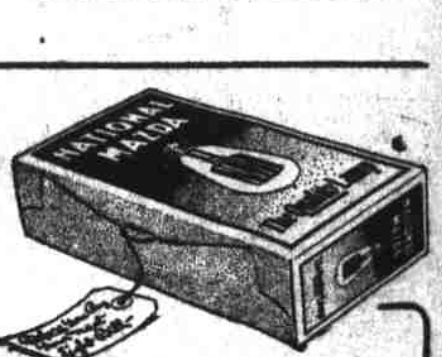
