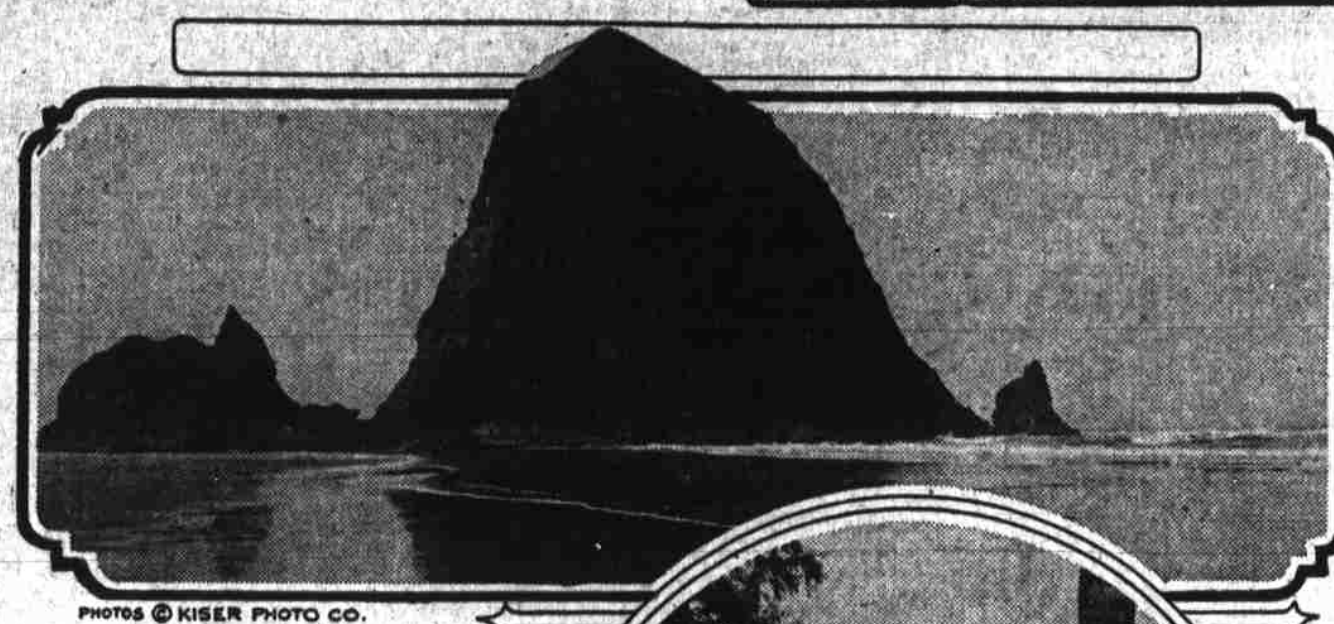


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SEASIDE

SEASIDE, Or., July 19.—Out of the far distant Atlantic, in the early hours of the morning, the sun, in the glory of a new day, rises slowly to the extent of its survey. There is something majestic about this scene. On the western slope, on the shores of our blue Pacific, one beholds a sight far grander in its aspect. At the close of these beautiful days the young people—sensitive only to that which is joyous and pleasing in this world—as well as the older people, some in the midst of life's battles, others waiting for the sound of the reveille, gather in groups on the ocean front at Seaside to breathe the breath of the main and at the same time to gaze in admiration over the waters at the sun as it gradually sinks beneath the horizon into the arms of the deep.
