

THREE POWERS TO BE PERMITTED IN MEXICO IS REPORT

In Return for England's Warning Japan to Keep Quiet, She, France and Germany May Land Troops.

Washington, D. C., July 19.—Adding to the statement that in return for Great Britain's intervention with Japan, President Wilson agreed to permit Great Britain, Germany and France to go into Mexico and protect their citizens and collect claims and indemnities, the government officials—a powerful member of the senate and a close friend of the president—who gave the information, said today that the understanding provides that the United States shall eventually recognize the Huerta government. According to this information, the plan of procedure agreed upon is that the three nations named shall enter Mexico and undertake to protect their citizens by force of arms if necessary, and that after they have made a showing which is to amount only to a matter of form, they will officially advise this government that they cannot succeed unless the United States recognizes Huerta.

The plan then includes, he said, that America will represent that it has been earnestly asked by the three great powers to recognize the government of Mexico, in order to aid them in the worthy purpose of protecting the lives and property of all foreigners, and that it is impelled by the dictates of humanity to yield to their request. Recognition of Huerta will follow.

The informant goes on to say that this being accomplished, the United States will proceed to carry out the further provisions of its understanding with the three great powers and assist American bankers to participate in the rehabilitation of the Mexican republic.

The great financial powers of four nations will divide the bonds and the vast profits they represent, according to the information. These will be the United States, Great Britain, Germany and France.

Senator Fall today offered a resolution defining the constitutional right of Americans in Mexico, using the exact language of the Baltimore convention and drew from Leader Kern an objection to its consideration. The resolution was intended to be expressive of the opinion of the senate, declared "that the constitutional rights of American citizens should protect them beyond the borders of this country and go with them throughout the world."

No action was taken on the resolution.

A careful poll of the members of the foreign relations committee of the senate shows that they are overwhelmingly in favor of the maintenance of the Monroe Doctrine. On that proposition they stand as follows:

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50,000 JAPANESE GAIN CONCESSIONS OF LAND IN MEXICO BY HUERTA

Diaz Leaves for Japan Tonight—English and Italian Ministers to Mexico Recalled.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Mexico City, July 19.—Many persons are believed to have been killed and scores injured as the result of the dynamiting of a federal troop train at Lampa near the border with the United States, according to dispatches received here today.

It was learned authoritatively here today that England recalled Minister Stronge as a result of complaints of his actions during the bombardment of Mexico City by General Diaz's rebels. He will be succeeded by Minister Carden. It also was learned today that Italy has recalled her minister but no reason is assigned for the transfer.

General Diaz is scheduled to leave for Japan tonight and an extraordinary demonstration will be held in his honor.

It was reported again today that special concessions have been given 50,000 prospective Japanese settlers at Morelos and in adjacent states. It is said the special concessions were made at the request of the Mikado.

Secret Code Not Stolen.

Washington, July 19.—A digest of consular and diplomatic reports from Mexico is being prepared today at the state department for President Wilson and Secretary Bryan when they confer next week with Ambassador Henry L. Wilson, who is on his way here to make a personal report of operations in the disturbed southern republic.

It is now expected that Ambassador Wilson will reach Washington some time next week instead of July 25, the original date set for his arrival.

Secretary Bryan, it is reported today that the Mexican government has acquired a copy of the state department's secret code. He said there was absolutely no foundation for such a report.

Revolutionists Praise Wilson.

London, July 19.—Unfettered praise of President Wilson's refusal to recognize the government of Provisional President Huerta of Mexico is voiced here today in the initial issue of "The Mexican Revolution," published by Mexican constitutionalists. Huerta is characterized as "a traitor and bloody assassin," and European countries are bitterly denounced for recognizing his government.

over a number of states, it can not concede that any one state has the right to interfere with its financial arrangements for money to be used in a number of states, especially when the loan is not secured by a mortgage.

The company says that if this power is conceded to one state it must be conceded to all, and that this would result in a conflict of authority, which would prevent an interstate railroad from working out a financial plan that would satisfy all the state commissions.

It is further recited that the Southern Pacific company desires to purchase still more equipment, amounting to \$6,000,000 and to arrange for its purchase by another issue of certificates guaranteed by it. This purchase the company says is necessary for the proper handling of its local and interstate business in the states of Oregon, California, Nevada, Utah, Arizona and New Mexico.

Now a California Matter.

The point is made that the guaranty of these certificates by the company will not constitute a lien upon any property situated in the state of California; that these certificates will be executed and guaranteed outside of the state of California, and the equipment distributed over the lines of the Southern Pacific company in the various states through which it runs, and as operating efficiently demands.

It is said that therefore the California commission can have no jurisdiction over the terms or character of the equipment trust certificates to be guaranteed by the Southern Pacific company.

SAND IN WATER THEY DRINK CAUSES DEATH OF CROOK CO. COWS

Bend, Or., July 19.—Sand as an enemy of the dairyman has just been discovered by a Powell Butte rancher. A fine dairy cow of his died suddenly and to determine the cause of her death he made an examination and found that there was nearly a quart of fine sand between the second and third stomachs. The cow had been drinking from shallow irrigation ditches, and the light pumice sand had been so abundant in the water as to accumulate and cause death. Fine dairy stock previously lost by other farmers is now believed to have died also from the same cause.

New Mine Machinery for O. A. C.

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Or., July 19.—The most recent and approved mining apparatus, designed after the patterns now in use in the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, will be installed in the Oregon Agricultural college school of mines. Plans for this type of mining machinery were brought from Boston by George E. Goodspeed Jr., instructor in mining at the O. A. C. The new machinery will be installed in sections, part being built during the summer so that mining students of the first semester may have the advantages derived from the use of up-to-date machines.

Girl's 8th Grade Average Is 93.

Mills of this city, has the honor of having received the highest general average in Washington county in the eighth grade examinations, making a general average of 93.1. Miss Mills has attended the Forest Grove public schools for seven years, coming here from Nebraska. She will enter the high school in September.

GRANT ESTATE OF \$100,000 IS LEFT TO WIDOW SOLELY

Princess Cantacuzene and U. S. Grant III Were Cared for by Their Grandmother, Explains General's Will.

New York, July 19.—The will of General Frederick Dent Grant, son of the late President Ulysses S. Grant, which has just been appraised, makes Ida Honor Grant, widow, sole beneficiary and executrix.

The value of the estate is estimated at \$100,000.

The report of General Percival Engel, state appraiser, finds that although the general was stationed at Governor's island at the time of his death, April 11, 1912, he was not a resident of this state and therefore the estate is exempt from taxation. In making Mrs. Grant sole legatee, the will reads:

"I make it to my wife alone because of my assurance that my children have already been provided for in the last will and testament of my deceased mother, and they will be more gratified to have their mother receive the entire estate than to have it diminished by present gifts to them; and also because of my confidence, which they share, that their mother will, in managing her estate, have more regard to their interests than her own; will always, if necessity thereof should arise, aid them, or either of them, to the extent of her ability during life and will divide her estate justly between them at death."

A large amount of the estate is invested in railroad bonds.

The children who benefited by their grandmother's will are Princess Cantacuzene, now of St. Petersburg, and Ulysses S. Grant III.

That the general had purchased many worthless securities was disclosed. Included in the latter are 100 shares in the American Artillery Range Powder and Ball Company, which were stated to have a value of \$1000, but this company was declared void by the state of New Jersey for the non-payment of taxes, and has "no home, no business and no assets."

MRS. SKINNER TAKES SEATTLE GOLF TITLE

Seattle, Wash., July 19.—Ten finals resulted in the defeat of two of California's best players, Mrs. W. D. Skinner, of Portland, and Miss Alice Warner, of Del Monte, on the eighteenth green in the third annual Potlatch tournament on the same links today. The honors were exactly reversed over the same event in 1912, when Miss Warner won from Mrs. Skinner. Roger Lapham, of Los Angeles, met defeat in the men's championship at the hands of H. A. Fleming, of Seattle. Percy W. Selby, of San Francisco, won in the second flight from C. F. Burnett, of Seattle.

Condon Lets Paving Contract.
Condon, Or., July 19.—The paving of five blocks of Condon's Main street will be started Monday, according to the contract which the city signed last night with the Rossi company. Under the contract the work is to be finished by November 1, but the company is certain that it will be finished long before that time. The entire cost of the improvement will be \$18,171.46 or \$212 for each corner lot and \$259 for each inside lot. The city pays for the paving of the street intersections.

NICARAGUA WOULD COME UNDER WING OF UNITED STATES

Ready to Ratify Treaty Giving Us Exclusive Right to Build Canal, Naval Station and to Corn Islands.

Washington, D. C., July 19.—Secretary Bryan today told the senate committee on foreign affairs that the Nicaraguan government was ready to ratify a treaty with the United States already negotiated that practically establishes a protectorate over that country and gave the United States control of its affairs. The United States is to guarantee the public debt of Nicaragua.

Mr. Bryan was advocating the ratification of a treaty pending for some time under which Nicaragua grants to the United States the exclusive right to construct an interoceanic canal through its territory, permits the use of Fonseca Bay on the Pacific for a naval station and gives to the United States Great and Little Corn Islands in the Caribbean sea. In return the United States pays a lump sum of \$3,000,000. This treaty was negotiated

by the last administration and was opposed by Democrats of the commission.

Secretary Bryan submitted the rough draft of the revised treaty he advocates. It includes the Platt amendment under which this government vacated Cuba and gave to the United States the right forever to intervene to maintain the independence of that island and control its policies.

JAILBREAKER FOILED; ROPE MUTE EVIDENCE

Workmen who are tearing out the jail fixtures on the top floor of the court house in the east wing, which was used as a temporary jail until the new one was completed, yesterday discovered hidden in a wall in corridor No. 1, a rope, braided from strips of bed linen over 80 feet in length. It had evidently been made in preparation for a jail break.

The officials at the court house state that they have no idea who made the rope. Jailor Crafton declares that the sheeting used in making the rope was passed in from the outside as the amount used could not have been taken from the bedding without detection. The prisoner who made the rope evidently found that he could not use it. To escape he would have had to cut his way through two rows of steel and then lower himself to the ground. The rope is nearly 80 feet too short and a drop of that distance would likely have injured him.
