

PORTLAND MAKES CLEAN SWEEP OF SIX GAMES WITH SAN FRANCISCO

LOBER IS SENSATION OF CLOSING CONTEST WITH SLIPPING SEALS

Little Ty Lober gave the greatest exhibition of outfielding ever seen on the Portland lot yesterday. That statement may appear to be a bit extravagant, but it is gospel truth.

Incidentally, Portland won the game, 3 to 1, making an even sweep of the series of six games and departing for the south last night in a pretty comfortable lead.

Portland started off in the lead with two runs in the second inning. After that Thomas was invincible until he was taken out to let a pinch hitter go to bat in the eighth inning.

With two out in the second Speas singled to center and scored when Lober smashed the ball to right center for two bases. Claude Berry, turned loose by the Seals last winter, came along with a drive to left that scored over Lober with what eventually proved to be the winning run.

Doc Fry hit the score in the third. With one out he singled to left. Mundorff fanned and Charles swung to left, putting the Seals on third, whence he scored on Johnson's single to right. Lober made a spectacular catch of Hogan's fly and closed the inning.

Portland came within a hair's breadth of getting over a run in the seventh. Fred Derrick, who had relieved Lindsay in the fifth at third, batted a safe one to center despite his cracked phalange. Kores sacrificed and Speas beat out a hit to short, putting Frits on third.

It was in the eighth inning that the Seals grew dangerous and Lober pulled off his supreme catch of the afternoon. Schmidt went to bat for Thomas and Lober made a perfect haul down his hard fly. Mundorff singled across second. Then the Russian stole. Charles routed a long fly to left that looked as if it would hit the fence.

Derrick booted Johnson's grounder, putting Mundorff on third, and Johnson was given a lead off by hitting the fence and putting the Seals on first and second and put a strike over on Hogan. Then he threw a ball. Then he sneaked another strike across. Without winding the plate while Hogan stood motionless. Held called it a strike. Hogan did a waltz around the ump and so did Howard. The latter kept up his talk on the bench and was chased in the ninth.
