

LOCAL Y. M. C. A. KEEPS UP PAGE

For Third Year Captures Prizes
in Educational Competition
With All Associations.

For the third consecutive year the Portland Young Men's Christian association has captured highest educational honors in competition with the associations of the United States and Canada. News of the victory of the Portland association is contained in a letter that M. W. Stone, general secretary of the Portland association, has just received from George B. Hodge, educational secretary of the international committee.

Four prizes were offered by the Y. M. C. A. for excellence in educational work. For the two years, and again this year, Portland has secured from one to three of them. This is a showing that has never been duplicated, and one that has attracted attention among all associations, particularly in the east, where only of recent years has there been a disposition to recognize the remarkable progress made in Y. M. C. A. work in the west.

The prize in which the Portland association will rejoice especially is the McBurney cup. This is the third winning of the cup, and because of that fact it now becomes the permanent possession of the Portland Y. M. C. A. It has heretofore been won for single years by different associations, but until the present no association had been able to secure the award three times, which was necessary to acquire it as a permanent trophy.

This cup was put up by Robert McBurney, formerly general secretary of the Y. M. C. A. in New York city. It is of solid silver, and is valued at \$100. The cup has been awarded each year to the association making the best showing in boys' day and night schools, as indicated by the examination papers that are forwarded to the international committee in New York.

The other two prizes won by Portland are a teacher's steel desk and a manual training table. The table comes to Portland because the local association made the best showing in language subjects, and the desk is awarded because of excellence in scientific work. When these prizes are received Portland will have three desks and three tables, each one signifying leadership for one year in an important department of educational work.

"We are indeed pleased at the news," said Mr. Stone today. "We have paid a great deal of attention to holding our educational work to a high standard. To receive three of the four international educational prizes for three years in succession is more than any association could reasonably expect, and we are, of course, highly gratified."

FIREMEN CHANGE DATE OF CONCERT

Entertainment by Band to Be
Held August 14 Instead
of August 15.

The concert to be given by the combined fireman's and police band to raise funds to take the fire department band to New York to attend the international convention of fire chiefs, is to be held August 14, at the Armory, instead of August 15, as was first announced. The change of dates was made necessary on account of a counter attraction that will appear here August 15.

One of the features of the concert will be the appearance of Virginia Hutchinson, contralto soloist of considerable note, who will give several selections, chief among them being old time popular songs. Other songs are being arranged for.

The convention at New York will start September 1, and will continue for six days, at which all the heads of the fire departments from all parts of the world will congregate to discuss the modern fire fighting methods. The Portland fire department band, the only organization of its kind in the United States, will play an important part in the convention, and will be one of the biggest advertising features for Portland that has ever been in the east.

In addition to the appearance in New York it is planned to have the band play in many of the larger eastern cities. Arrangements for these are now under way.

Local business men are supporting the plan for the trip heartily, and the commercial organizations of the city have given it endorsements on the grounds that it will be a big advertising feature.

One day, a Portland to New York day, is to be set aside in the near future, at which time tickets will be put on sale. The combined police and firemen's band will appear on the streets during the noon hour and give several selections, after which the firemen will start out and make a canvass of the business houses.

The trip is to be made without the least expense to the taxpayers, for the band members have all arranged for their vacations for the three weeks they will be in many of the larger eastern cities where this arrangement was not possible, substitutes have been provided out of the eligible list who will be paid by the band.

The trip east is to be made under the direction of Jay W. Stevens, battalion chief and director of the band.
