

RUSH TO SHUSHANNA SIMILAR TO DAWSON, SAY ALASKA PIONEERS

Men Getting \$25 a Day Wages
But Are Living on Raw
Meat—When Procurable.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Cordova, Alaska, July 25.—Details of the rush for the new gold diggings on the Shushanna river and nuggets from claims on Eldorado creek were brought here today by four men who have been working for wages on one of the placer holes. The men received their pay, \$25 per day, in dust and nuggets running as high as \$35. This gold says \$18 and \$19 to the ounce. The four miners, Robert Kelly, William Courdon, George Veredil and A. Brown, are fitting out with provisions and will return as soon as possible.

Courdon says ground owners are offering \$25 per day to men who will bore themselves, but that food is scarce and many are living on raw meat brought in by hunters. Reports from McCarthy show that the stampede over the pass to the scene was similar to the original rush to Dawson. George Wolfe, grub-staked by Brady Howard, a lumber scaler, was one of the first men to hit "big pay," and Howard was the first to get word of the strike. Borrowing the boots and shirt Roadmaster Forester was wearing, he started for the 100-mile mush without returning to camp. Within the next 48 hours, 150 men left for the Shushanna, but were held up by high water in a creek a few miles from town. A few swam it and nearly lost their lives. Next morning the water was down and all got across.

A letter from Paul Rans, at the diggings, brings news that the good pay claims have been found on six creeks and that on one claim on Eldorado, three men working with a short string of boxes are taking out \$250 to \$500 a day. The diggings are shallow, running from one to five feet to bedrock. The gravel is red porphyry slate and the country rolling like the Dawson country.

SING SING CONVICTS MOVED WITHOUT RIOT

Warden Sends 150 to Auburn
Prison Following Two
Incendiary Fires.

Oswego, N. Y., July 25.—Fearing an attempt at a general jail delivery at Sing Sing prison, following riotous activities there in the last few days, Warden Clancy summoned all the guards to duty at 5 o'clock this morning, when the first train was despatched to remove the rebel convicts to Auburn prison. The trouble at Sing Sing has been caused by the decree that some of the prisoners must go to Auburn, Sing Sing being overcrowded. Two recent fires in the prison here are now believed to have been set by convicts as a protest against their removal. Later 150 convicts, handcuffed and shackled, were transferred to Auburn without serious disorder.

ADMIRAL REYNOLDS WILL GREET BRITISH FIGHTER

Bremerton, Wash., July 25.—With a sicked crew, Rear Admiral Reynolds of the Pacific reserve fleet will go to Vancouver, B. C., on August 3 on the United States cruiser West Virginia to represent the navy in welcoming the new British dreadnaught New Zealand. Water sports of all kinds will be engaged in, and it is the intention of the American tars to give the battleship sailors a run for their money. The New Zealand is the most powerful man of war on the Pacific. She was built for the colony of New Zealand, which presented the battleship to the British navy.

Woodburn to Have Baseball Day.

All places of business will be closed during the hours of the game and everyone is expected to line up with one faction or the other and root their heroes to victory. Each team captain is carrying a larger list than McCredie ever dared to think of, and it is thought it may take a double set of felders to stop the slaughter that is promised for the pitchers of each side. After the game, the survivors will serve a watermelon feast to the weary spectators.

Cross Training Hard.

Both boys are clamoring for a match with Champion Ritchie as an added stake.

CANADA PROTESTS TO JAPAN ON SMUGGLERS

Note Cabled to Tokio Claims
Two More Boat Loads of
Laborers Are on Way.

Vancouver, B. C., July 25.—A cable note of protest was addressed today to the imperial Japanese government at Tokio by the Dominion government regarding the arrival of a boat load of Japanese at Bella Bella, a north coast village in evasion of the immigration laws and the Japanese-Dominion agreement. Without mincing matters, the Dominion officials stated that they have knowledge of two boat loads of former Japanese army men, which are now on their way over and the government of Canada wishes to know what action Tokio is prepared to take to keep them from landing. Pending a reply no effort is being made in an attempt to catch the Sampan Toko Maru, from which the nine men were landed. A second fisheries cruiser was sent out to search for it. If caught it will be held until \$600 is paid for each of the Japanese passengers landed or still on board.

GIRL WITNESSES IN VICE CASES DISAPPEAR

Three Actively Concerned in
Pending Prosecutions in
Los Angeles Get Away.

Los Angeles, July 25.—Close upon the disappearance of two other girls who figured in the white slave investigation recently conducted by the Los Angeles county grand jury, Evelyn Nesbith, once of Seattle, who figured in charges against men, is missing today from the home of Mrs. Patterson, where she had been placed by probation officers. Christine Neal, to whose delinquency it is alleged J. P. Hardigan, a motion picture producer, contributed, escaped last week from the state reform school at Whittier. Yesterday it became known that Cleo Helen Barker, chief witness against George H. Bixby, had disappeared from Claremont. Miss Nesbith and Miss Neal were close friends. The officers are attempting to connect their disappearance.

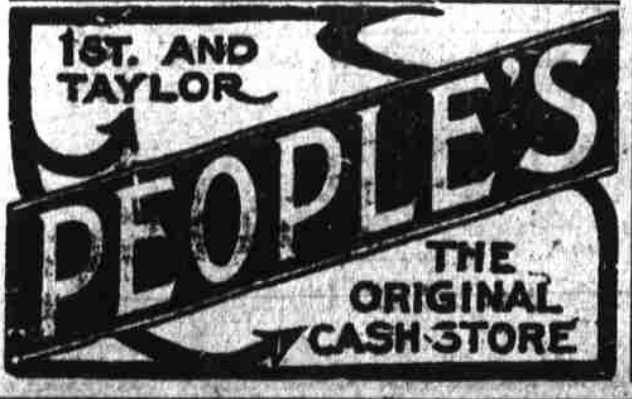
