

CHICAGO SUFFRAGISTS RALLY TO MRS. YOUNG; GO FOR SCHOOL BOARD

Demand Veteran Superintendent's Resignation Not Be Accepted; Call Meeting.

(United Press Leased Wire.)

Chicago, Ill., July 25.—Jane Addams of Hull House and other suffrage leaders here plan a big mass meeting for Sunday to protest against the resignation from the city school board of Mrs. Ella Flagg Young, superintendent of schools, which was announced yesterday as a result, it is believed, of the city school board voting Mrs. Young's choice of textbooks. The mass meeting will demand that the board refuse to accept Mrs. Young's resignation, and, failing that, they may attempt to force the whole board to resign.

"Mrs. Young's resignation is a calamity," said Miss Addams today. "If opposition to her policies forced it, that opposition ought to be swept away. Chicago cannot afford to lose a woman of her force and executive power."

Other suffrage leaders are also most indignant and threaten to organize the women of the city to oust Mrs. Young's opponents.

Mrs. Young, who is 58 years old, tendered her resignation to become effective August 15. Although she gave no reason for resigning, it was learned that attempts by the school board recently to interfere in the selection of textbooks may have induced her to act.

Mrs. Young recently was mentioned as a possible candidate for mayor of Chicago.

CLOUDS AND BREEZES END WEEK'S HOT WAVE

FIFTY-YEAR COMPANIES FORMED BY JAPANESE

Sacramento, Cal., July 25.—Hoping to defeat the intent of the Webb anti-alien land law by forming incorporations and later transferring stock, Japanese land companies are being incorporated at the rate of 20 per day.

The Japanese are forming 50-year companies, believing that their lands will be secure at least as long as they live. The California law, however, allows corporations to reincorporate at the time they expire.

Drug Clerk Kills Bandit.

Cushing, Okla., July 25.—Opening fire from behind a prescription case, a young drug clerk early today shot and instantly killed one of two bandits who attempted to hold up the Edmund Diamond drug store here. The other robber fled but was overpowered and taken to jail. Neither the dead bandit nor his companion has been identified.

Vineyardist Starts for Washington.

Chief Clark, believing that Sherwood's efforts have not been sufficiently appreciated, decided on the change.

LARGE BULL DOG RUNS AMUCK AT GLADSTONE

After Attacking Delivery Boy, Animal Goes on Rampage; Captured Later.

Oregon City, Or., July 25.—A huge English bulldog belonging to E. P. Chandler of Gladstone, went violently amuck yesterday afternoon, broke a heavy chain it was tethered with, bit Hugh Olds in the leg and started on a rampage. A number of men, including County Veterinarian Eddy and assistants, the police force of Gladstone, Deputy Sheriff Mather and others of Gladstone started in pursuit of the beast and hunted until a late hour but could find no trace of the dog.

During the night the animal recovered from the attack and returned to its home, where it was found this morning by Mr. Chandler. The dog has been confined to see if it has hydrophobia.

Hugh Olds works for the Burns Grocery company of Gladstone and was taking orders at the Chandler home when attacked. The bulldog is said to be the most powerful canine in Clackamas county. When attacked the young man tried to jump aside, but the beast grabbed his leg in passing and bit through his clothes. The skin was not broken.

Residents in the vicinity of Gladstone, Parkplace and Clackamas were notified that the brute was at large and there was a scarcity of people moving about outside their houses in that part of the county last evening.

BILL FORBIDS WOMEN TO WORK OVER 8 HOURS

Washington, July 25.—The house labor committee began hearings today on the bill to limit the employment of women in mills and factories to 8 hours a day and 48 hours a week.

The bill forbids railroads accepting interstate shipment of goods made in violation of the provisions of the bill, and provides a penalty of a \$10,000 fine or one year's imprisonment for violations. It also requires factories to file semiannual affidavits with the department of labor showing that they have not violated the law.

RECORD FOR INSANITY CASES MAY BE BROKEN

Multnomah county record for insanity cases within a month bid fair to be shattered this month. Only the fact that two of the 32 examined so far in July were found sane has saved the record so far. Last month 36 were sent to the asylum and several years ago there were 31 committed during a summer month. Four of those committed this month have been youthful drug users. Hot weather months bring many insane cases, according to Mr. Bulger.

U. S. Pays Rent on Canal Zone.

Washington, July 25.—The first annual rental of \$350,000 for the canal zone was paid to Panama today, the money, at the request of the Panamanian minister, being turned over to a representative of William Cromwell of New York, financial agent for the Panama government.

SUMMER HOME OF PRESIDENT WILSON IN NEW HAMPSHIRE

Washington, July 25.—The summer home chosen by President Wilson, in Cornish, N. H., is one of the finest in the state. It is a low, roomy house surrounded by others of similar architecture. The president's vacation began there June 28. Mrs. Wilson and two of the Wilson daughters will remain there during most of the summer. The other will stay at the White House in Washington to keep house for her father, who may be kept there during most of the summer while congress is considering the new currency bill.

The home is known as Harlington Hall. The view taken here is of the front, showing a rise of ground some 50 feet from the front door. In the back there are magnificent lawns, the village is occupied by many writers and artists in the summer and the Wilson family will be surrounded by them.

TO INSPECT AUSTRALIAN MEAT PACKING HOUSES

Dr. Joss of Animal Industry Bureau Ordered to Conduct Inquiry.

New York, July 25.—Practical failure of the government mediation board to reach a basis for arbitration of the differences between representatives of trainmen and officials of eastern railroads was admitted here this afternoon.

"The negotiations are at an acute stage," said Mediation Commissioner Hammer, "that it would be unwise to divulge the business already transacted."

It was learned, however, that the refusal of the railroad managers to withdraw their demands upon their employees has caused a hitch. The mediators are striving hard to preserve peace but all indications this afternoon pointed to an early strike.

REMORSE MAKES FUGITIVE 'SURRENDER TO OFFICERS

Albany, Or., July 25.—A fugitive from justice since December 8, 1912, since when the county has offered a reward of \$100 for his arrest, Paul Ackerman, who shot and seriously injured Jack Leih in a road near Shedd, while the latter was buggy riding with his sweetheart, gave himself up to the authorities yesterday afternoon. He was brought here last night and turned over to Sheriff Bodine for confinement in the county jail.

Although his victim has recovered from the injuries, Ackerman said that the incident continually preyed upon his mind and he assigned this as the reason for giving himself up. He has been tramping through California.

WOULD WARN JAPAN TO FEAR MONROE DOCTRINE

Washington, July 25.—Formal reaffirmation of the Monroe doctrine by congress as a "warning to Japan and others" was proposed in the house today by Representative Clarke of Florida. Clarke also introduced a resolution declaring that it is the intention of the United States eventually to withdraw from the Philippines. He said: "It is time that the United States renewed the faith of the Monroe doctrine and the intention to enforce it by the letter. In view of recent diplomatic developments, I think it high time that this government act so that foreign nations may clearly understand that its enforcement will be jealously observed."

BRIDGEMAN SUSTAINS INJURY.

BALLOT SUIT HEARD BY STATE COURT IN THE RECORD TIME OF HOUR

Mandamus Petition to Place Women's Eight Hour Law on November Ballot Filed.

(Salem Bureau of The Journal.)

Salem, Or., July 25.—All in an hour this morning a petition for a writ of mandamus to compel the secretary of state to put initiative measures on the special referendum election ballot was filed in the supreme court, an alternative writ issued, demurred to and the case argued. The court made a record-breaking burst of speed.

At 9 o'clock the petition was filed by W. E. U'Ren, attorney for Marie D. Equi and Mrs. J. R. Oatman, plaintiffs. At 9:15 an alternative writ of mandamus was issued. At 9:20 the attorney general filed a demurrer in behalf of the secretary of state, the defendant. The case was set for hearing immediately, and at 9:30 arguments were being made before the court. At 10 o'clock, just 60 minutes from the time the petition was filed, the case was in the hands of the court. Very likely a decision will be handed down next Tuesday.

The suit was brought to force on the special election ballot the initiative measure for a women wage workers' eight hour law. Another initiative measure has been filed which will be affected by the decision in this case. It is the proposed universal eight hour measure.

Attorney U'Ren admitted to the court that it was not the intent of the legislature to have initiative measures submitted at the special election, but he argued that there was nothing in the constitution to prohibit such measures being submitted and therefore they should go to the ballot.

Attorney General Crawford argued that the initiative was a definite plan of legislation by the people and that constitution provided that such measures should be submitted to the people at general elections when all the people are aware there will be an election, and that the court has no right to interfere by directing that initiative measures must be submitted at any special election called for another purpose. He pointed out that there would be no time in which to file arguments.
